PREFACE.

It might be thought a sufficient reason for deferring a "catalogue of books written by the alumni of the college of New Jersey," that the existing contents of the alumni alcove at Princeton intended for these works, are so far from being a complete representation of the compositions of the alumni. But that reason would postpone publication indefinitely; for even if we possessed all that was produced in the last century, we might not secure all that has been written in this. It has been found peculiarly difficult to gather the recent publications of our graduates; probably because it is difficult to trace them in the distant parts of the country where they have settled; while they themselves decline to volunteer what they have written. Persevering efforts have been made, by the Rev. Dr. S. D. Alexander, during three years past, to overcome these difficulties. The duty was committed to him by the trustees, under instructions so to expend a bequest of one thousand dollars, made by the late chancellor, A. O. Zabriskie, LL.D. More than seven hundred volumes are represented in this catalogue; and these consist so often of several sermons, addresses or other pamphlets bound together, that the total number of titles is more than a thousand (1069). A few of these composite volumes contain so many separate publications that they could not be catalogued in season for insertion in this index. The whole number of authors here referred to some class and year is two hundred and sixty. Among these are thirty professors, and eleven presidents, of American colleges; nine judges of the supreme courts, of states or of the general government; thirteen members of the house of representatives of the United States; ten senators of the United States; six cabinet officers; eight ambassadors to foreign governments; two vice presidents, and one president of the United States. A far longer enumeration might be made, of graduates who may not have written books, and yet have held these, or other places of honor or trust in the public service. Besides these, are three bishops of the protestant episcopal church.

Some of these have names which needed not to be decorated, with any of the titles which we have here gathered about them. Such are Addison Alexander, George M. Dallas, John H. Hobart, Charles Hodge, David Hosack, Charles P. McIlvaine, John Johns, Edward Livingston, James Madison, William Meade, Benjamin and Richard Rush, John and Thomas Sergeant, Samuel L. Southard, and Horace Binney Wallace.

The principal sources of the biographical information conveyed in the headings prefixed to the titles, were the triennial catalogues, and "Princeton in the eighteenth century." Of the latter book, prepared some years since by Rev. S. D. Alexander, D.D., besides that copy mentioned in this catalogue, the alumni alcove contains another, in which every biography, however short, is mounted on a sheet of Bristol board, fronted by a portrait, if possible, with ample space to receive other printed or manuscript information. The single octavo therefore, of Dr. Alexander, is thus expanded to four volumes folio, superbly bound. We know no college which has done greater honor to those children who have so honored her.
