

Rev. Dr. Samuel Craig Dies, Had Been Seminary Director

PRINCETON — The Rev. Dr. Samuel G. Craig, 86, minister, author, publisher, and former director of Princeton Theological Seminary, of 73 Stockton St., died yesterday in Princeton Hospital, suffering from uremia.

At the time of his death, Dr. Craig was president of the Presbyterian and Reformed Publishing Co. of Philadelphia. He was author of the books "Jesus As He Was and Is" in 1914, "Christianity Rightly So Called" in 1946 and "Jesus Yesterday and Today" in 1956. He also had contributed many articles to religious journals.

Dr. Craig edited "The Presbyterian" from 1915 to 1930, excepting for two years; and was editor

of "Christianity Today" from 1930 to 1944.

Born in Leland, Ill., June 11, 1874, he spent most of his youth in Tarkio, Mo. He received his bachelor of arts degree from Princeton University in 1895 and his master's in 1900. He was ordained in 1900 after receiving his bachelor of divinity degree from Princeton Theological Seminary.

Dr. Craig also studied at the University of Berlin from 1910 to 1911 and in 1923 was awarded honorary doctor's degrees from Grove City College and from Southwestern Presbyterian University.

He was appointed pastor of the first church in Ebensburg, Pa. in 1900, where he served until 1909. He held a pastorate in the North Church of Pittsburgh from 1912 to 1915.

Dr. Craig was a member of the organizing committee of Westminster Theological Seminary in Philadelphia and served as one of its trustees from 1929 to 1936. He directed the Princeton Seminary from 1925 to 1929.

In 1909 he was married to the late Carrie Hays who died in 1936. His second wife Ethel Wallace, whom he married in 1940, died in 1950.

Surviving are a son, Charles H. Craig of Nutley; two sisters, the Misses Lillie and Mabel Craig, both of Tarkio, Mo.; and four grandchildren.

Funeral services will be held at his home Monday at 2:30 p.m. Dr. G. Hall Todd, pastor of the Arch Street Presbyterian Church of Philadelphia will officiate.

Interment will be in Princeton Cemetery.

WILL DEPORT HUNGARIAN

NEWARK (AP)—A World War II Hungarian Army officer has been ordered deported from this country because he allegedly mistreated Jews in a concentration camp and concealed his residence in Hungary.

The order was issued yesterday against 52-year-old Laszlo Imre Agh, a Scotch Plains resident who works in the National State Bank in Newark. During the war, he served as lieutenant in the Hungarian army.

Some 33 witnesses gave testimony to the government in the case against Agh, but Agh claims there is no truth to the charges against him.

The government says that in 1942, Agh directed the partial burial of Jewish laborers as well as ordered them to do push-ups over bayonets so that they would be cut if they fell.
