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## A FOREWORD

The value and importance of Christian education are being recognized as never before. The home, the Church, the nation, missions, philanthropy—all are dependent upon Christian education for the creation of a true sense of human need, and for the production of an adequate body of workers to supply the demand. Alexander Duff, the great missionary, was asked what he would do with one thousand dollars if he wanted to place it where it would accomplish the most good. He unhesitatingly replied, "I would put it into a Christian School." Bishop McDowell says, "The Christian College is the world's greatest agency for controlling the world." All may not fully agree with a recent utterance of Governor Folk, but there is truth in his assertion, when he said, "We may calculate our wealth as the sands of the sea. The domes of our Capitols and the spires of our Churches may pierce the clouds and glitter amongst the stars, but all must crumble and fall away else it be welded and strengthened by the Christian education which is the foundation of enlightened citizenship."

One of the vital principles of Presbyterianism is the sovereignty of God and His Word, and the practical application of divine truth to the affairs of men in all their relations of life. No branch of this great family of Churches has been more insistent and consistent in the application of this principle than the Reformed Presbyterian or Covenanter Church. An educated ministry and an intelligent membership have always characterized this body of believers. Wherever they set up their tabernacle they established their school.

Geneva College was established by the Reformed Presbyterian Church in Western Ohio, just sixty years ago, when that region was a veritable wilderness. Her history and accomplishments have hitherto been unwritten, but an honest attempt is made in this volume to gather them together for preservation. This is cheerfully done because this Institution has accomplished an educational work of inestimable importance and permanent value, of which many are ignorant and some unappreciative.

Geneva College has never been a large or wealthy Institution, yet she has made for herself an honorable position among the true educational forces of our country. Her moral influence has always been greater than her numerical strength. Her high standard of instruction upon all subjects that develop true Christian character, and upon questions which affect civic life and industrial conditions, has justly placed her in the forefront of sociological schools.

Geneva College was not a co-educational Institution until 1865. While a Female Seminary was maintained in the same village and by some of the same teachers in the College, yet it was separate and distinct in relations and control until after the war. Because it was subsequently merged into the College, we have considered the students who finished the course in the Seminary as graduates of Geneva College.

Inerrancy is not claimed for this book. In the absence of catalogues of many of the earlier years of the College, we were largely dependent upon the memories of the students of those days. Some of these recollections conflict or lapse, and we have only recorded what the most reliable information justified. No historical stone has been left unturned, and every discovered archive has been carefully unfolded, to make this book a thesaurus of College information. Neither profundity nor exhaustiveness is claimed by this assertion, for we are conscious of leaving a wide and fruitful field for the future historian; but an honest and persistent effort was made, however, to include a laconic sketch of every graduate of Geneva College, and also of those students who completed the Sophomore year, or who have arisen to positions of relative importance in life.

If there are those who reached the aforementioned standing and yet do not appear in the Biographical Department, it has been unintentionally the sin of omission upon our part, or wilfully the act of neglect upon their part to respond to repeated requests for information. All such will still appear in the complete list of students. Plato once said, "As it is the commendation of a good huntsman to find game in a wide wood, so it is no imputation if he hath not caught all."

The other departments of this work, comprising a Complete List of Students of Geneva College (so far as the catalogues could be obtained), her Army Record, tabulated facts in Athletics and of the Literary Societies, those entering the Leading Professions, etc., will prove valuable in exhibiting some of the products of the Institution. The portraits of


all the Presidents and buildings, and the maps of the locations of the College, should prove an interesting feature and enhance the value of the work.

## HISTORY OF GENEVA COLLEGE.

## CHAPTER I.

#### GEOGRAPHICAL LOCATION AND PIONEER CONDITIONS.

The most notable clause of the Northwest Territory Ordinance of July 3, 1787 reads: "Religion, morality, and knowledge being necessary to good government and the happiness of mankind, schools, and the means of education, shall forever be encouraged." By this solemn compact Congress forever dedicated the aforementioned territory to freedom, morality and intelligence.

Out of that geographical section of our country, Ohio, one of the greatest States of the Union, was formed; and upon the moral sentiment expressed in that remarkable compact the Reformed Presbyterian Church has ever stood. It is not surprising, therefore, that the first educational Institution established by said Church should be located within this territory, and fostered for that grand purpose.

McArthur Township, Logan County, Ohio, the original site of Geneva College, lies in a section of our country celebrated in American History. When peace had been effected with Great Britain after the Revolutionary war, it is claimed that George Washington came upon horseback from Virginia and personally inspected these lands, and returned with the recommendation that they be granted to the soldiers of Virginia—and so the original patents read.

During the War of 1812, General William Hull made his celebrated but disastrous march to Detroit through this vicinity. He was preceded by Colonel Duncan McArthur (for whom the township was named) with a large retinue of soldiers, who cut a road some forty feet wide through the almost impenetrable forests, so that Hull's army of 2,500 soldiers could march northward with greater ease and speed. General Hull encamped for some time two miles west of the subsequent location of the College. Most of the army remained near the present site of Northwood while Fort McArthur, two miles west of Kenton, was being erected. Until recent years "Hull's

trace" was plainly distinguishable a little northwest of the

College.

McArthur Township was also the favorite spot of the Wyandotte and Delaware Indians. Solomonstown, two miles southwest of the future location of the College, was the home of Tarhe, "the Crane," a famous warrior and Wyandotte chief. Tarhe was present at the notable Treaty of Greenville, together with other equally brave chieftains, such as Black Hoof, Little Turtle, Blue Jacket and Buckongehalas, all of whom had made such relentless warfare against the pale faces for almost half a century. By this treaty finally ratified and consummated April 6, 1832, the aborigines quit these rich lands, and, in September, 1832, were conducted upon their sad march to the far West. Before leaving their favorite lands and sacred villages, however, they spent some time in solemn religious ceremonies; extinguished their council fires; destroyed their burial grounds, and then forever turned their backs upon the white man's civilization.

Solomonstown was located upon the present farm of Alonzo Core McClure, son-in-law of James S. Johnston, one of the founders of Geneva College. A quaff from the old "Indian spring," yet pure and wholesome, is one of the refreshing features of a visit to this hospitable home and historic site. Despite the precautions of the Indians, during a recent removal of an extensive gravel bank, many skeletons and war-like implements were unearthed.

Among the farsighted agriculturists who flocked in to possess these rich bottom lands and great forests along the headwaters of the Miami river, were some devoted Covenanters from Eastern Ohio and Northern New York. They were busily engaged in clearing away the primeval forests, and erecting temporary log cabins or more permanent bungalows, when the Rev. Gavin McMillan from Beech Woods, Preble Co., Ohio, rode into their midst as the "sky pilot" of the new religious colony. He gathered together the scattered Covenanter families into a central society, and there in the name of the Lord Jesus Christ, the King and Head of the Church, and by authority of the Western Presbytery, organized them into the "Miami" congregation. Abram Patterson, John Young and Matthew Mitchell, Jr., were ordained and installed ruling elders, October 16, 1831.

Among other pioneer families were those of Robert Scott, Samuel O. Mitchell, Isaac Patterson, Samuel Hyndman, John French, Joseph and Thomas Fulton, Mrs. King and Mrs. Hays. In 1832, a town was surveyed and platted

in the midst of a dense beech woods, crowning a beautiful hillock, and was called "Northwood."

The Covenanters, true to their tenets and traditions, soon built a log meeting-house on the south branch of the Miami river, about one-fourth of a mile south of the rising village. As the congregation grew in numbers and means, a substantial brick church was erected a few feet east of the log structure. For a time the infant congregation received an occasional sermon from an itinerant; but the "society meeting" was held with wonderful regularity every Sabbath day, in which the sage elders expounded the Word of God with peculiar aptness and fidelity; the children were catechized at length amid fear and trembling; the sweet Psalms of David were sung with evident unction (if not with musical precision) by the whole congregation, and thus the sacred fire was kept aglow upon the recently erected church altar.

The Rev. John Black Johnston was ordained and installed the pastor June 10, 1834. He was a graduate of Franklin College, Ohio; had studied theology under the celebrated Dr. John Black of Pittsburgh, and was a man of genial disposition and a preacher of scholarly attainments. In a short time after the settlement of a pastor, and also induced by the rich and cheap farming lands, a large number of intelligent and substantial families were attracted to the community and congregation. Among those who soon found abode in that neighborhood were William Pollock, James S. Johnston, Joseph Forsythe, Robert Boyd, James Gray, Samuel P. Johnston, Cornelius Jameson, Moses T. Glasgow, James and John K. Trumbull, Hugh Hervey, Robert Patton, Jonathan Richie, Robert McClure, Thomas Hosack, William Rambo, Dr. John Carter, Dr. Solomon Jenkins, Stephen Bayles, Henry George, and others equally worthy. By the time the College was fully established, many of these had such large families that in themselves they formed the nucleus of an educational constituency.

The pioneer conditions beggar description. In the great Miami Valley, which was represented as "flowing with milk and honey," were almost illimitable forests of a great variety of sturdy trees, whose fringes were but here and there brushed aside to make room for a cultivatable field yet to arise out of the roots and stumps. The narrow and crooked wagon roads were so impassably muddy at certain seasons of the year that a firm believer in non-imperialism might infer that he soon would be infringing upon the rights of China! On either side

of Belle Center, the subsequent railroad and post-town, there was a deep slough whose crossing tried the faith and broke the temper of many a Miltonian "Christian." The vast forests and minute prairies were interlarded with great quantities of grey squirrels, wild turkeys, wilder deers, and even the wildest hogs, about which the most extravagant hyperbolical declarations were made by the early settlers, when they claimed that roasted pigs were running through the woods with knives and forks stuck in their backs, and squealing out, "Come and eat us!" Six miles north was the great "Scioto Marsh" which not only produced an abundance of hay, but various kinds of game. The timber skirting the marsh was a favorite roost for wild pigeons, which might be seen in the gloaming flying thither in such immense flocks that the sky would be darkened; and they collected in such numbers as to break down the limbs of the trees. After dusk these roosts were visited by the fowler and the pigeons picked off by the hundreds.

My! My!! The fun, innocent and exhilarating, the young men and virgins enjoyed in those days! The frolics consisted of the singing school, spelling match, quilting bee; the log rolling, rail splitting, brush burning; the field clearing, house raising and corn husking. These occasions were interspersed with the enjoyment of the palatable cider, pumpkin pies and other goodies. Of course an occasional heel and toe movement may have been indulged in to aid digestion, but which would expose the participants to the citation of the church session. The old oaken bucket hung in the well. But hanging would be considered too good for the rusty, ironbound, moss-covered, germ-breeding utensil in these days of scientific pure food regulations!

At the opening of the College in 1848, a number of students came from Vermont, New York City, and Western Pennsylvania. To the home-born, existing conditions and customs were familiar; but to some of the city-bred, as well as to the hardier mountaineers, the isolated situation of the College in the "back woods," and the Acadian simplicity and provincial customs of the Northwooders, were a revelation that called forth both wonder and ridicule. Perhaps the trite maxim of a College being known as "a learned place," or "a seat of learning," had its origin at Northwood about this time, inasmuch as many of these charter students of precocious claims and conceited demeanor imagined they brought some intelligence to the place, and took no learning away, and hence it accumulated there!

## CHAPTER II.

## BARLY RELIGIOUS AND SOCIAL CONDITIONS.

The inner social life of Geneva College and Northwood during these early days, with its element of chivalry and touch of romance, would furnish a splendid groundwork for an interesting story. Some of the first students have become so enthusiastic and reminiscent in regard to their early impressions of Northwood, that they have poured upon the editor's table sufficient material for a large volume. It would seem a loss to modern literature that more of this phase of the life of the College could not be preserved.

Of social advantages in the earliest days there were none. It is true that the moral atmosphere of the village and community was good, as the "College was far separated from haunts of vice and dissipation," but it was equally far separated from centers of culture and advantage.

The religious influence was salutary and helpful, as it was "essentially Presbyterian" in the extreme. The old-time manner of conducting Church services, especially in the kirk of the Cameronians, was a revelation and a lesson to many students of uncertain piety. The explanation of the Psalm was usually one hour, the "long prayer" was self-explanatory, and the lecture that followed was sometimes nearly two hours in length. An interval of twenty or thirty minutes furnished an opportunity for stretching the limbs, partaking of a selfbrought lunch, and a stroll through the old churchyard viewing the sepulchres of the fathers or reviewing agricultural conditions of the season. Hard by the sanctuary, in the hillside canopied by friendly beech trees, flowed a cool spring whose waters slaked the thirst of the worshippers, and with which pure element many of us were baptized by Drs. J. B. Johnston or J. C. K. Milligan.

This recess was followed by a doctrinal sermon that reached on indefinitely until the going down of the sun. These exercises were interspersed with the lining and singing alternately of a Psalm by two precentors. Relief was in sight when the preacher pronounced "lastly," but it was only fully experienced when the benediction was pronounced. Even when William McClure, the Irish-Canadian, began to lead the

people "continuously" in the singing, many of the good folk shook their heads, sealed their lips, but thought audibly that the procedure was an unwarranted and unpardonable innovation. With no reflection upon the good intent and piety of the fathers, the fact still remains that such lengthy and "profound" services were more a weariness of the flesh than a strengthening of the soul.

But times and conditions have happily changed, and the strictest devotees to ancient forms have adapted themselves to modern usages, while holding tenaciously to every principle of faith and worship involved. Even the log cabins have given way to dwellings of the latest design and convenience, and who will say that the *principle of living* has been sacrificed? The narrow, crooked mud roads have been straightened and converted into splendid macadamized highways. The forests are largely cleared away, and highly cultivated fields greet the eye everywhere. Indeed that part of Ohio has undergone such a wonderful transformation that it is now recognized as the garden spot of the State.

Fugitive literature and innocent (?) amusements were not foreign to the earlier history of the College, and a brief reference to some mirthful episodes cannot be regarded as a diversion from a true history of the Institution. "The Northwood Catechism," an eight-paged pamphlet published in 1850, is a unique production with an element of humor, but devoid of real merit as a burlesque. However, it served a local purpose in caricaturing the peculiarities and alleged injustices of the existing Fiscal Board, and was also successful in revising the menu of some of the "Dollar-a-Week" boarding houses. Lest some forget we will append the poetic effusion of this celebrated Catechism, as the publication itself is too lengthy to be reproduced, but can be viewed among the archives of Geneva College.

HYMN FOR CHILDREN. [Air of Hebron.]

In Northwood, when the sun was low— When night came on—dark as a crow; The Board was sitting in a row All gabbling—gabbling rapidly.

But Northwood saw another sight
When the Board sat till dead of night;
Commanding writs with great delight
To cheer the College cleverly.

By torch and table close arrayed—
"Now we'll do it," they all said;
And furiously every sitter brayed
To do some act of tyranny.

Then shook the walls with crackling riven—
Then rushed the Board to sitting driven—
And louder than the thunders of Heaven
They issued their edicts terrifically!

But stronger yet the Board bid blow
Through Northwood streets of mud and snow;
And louder yet the chickens crow
In Northwood—hatching rapidly.

'Tis morn! And soon the big fat son, With busy Tom, was waked to run To carry writs to Will and John—
To drive them from the College.

"Run on, ye boys, we are the braves!
We'll rush to glory or to staves!
See how the great ejectment waves!
We'll show them Northwood chivalry!"

Few—few shall part where many meet;
The Board shall make their winding sheet;
And every time we take our seat,
We'll make a student's sepulchre.

"The hair cutting scrape" (almost scalp) of a few years later consisted of an allopathic dose of shears for an alleged case of chronic crankiness, while the applicants received an instantaneous transfer to another Institution for their fees. Evidently all parties were greatly and hopefully benefited by the application and translation. Their names may be found in piscatorial nomenclature.

In its multiplied forms hazing was practiced through the whole history of the College at Northwood. The masked cohort with the hangman's rope; the shooting from ambush or by decoy into some sequestered place; the "going sniping" into the meshes of some vast forest at midnight—all had the one end in view, viz.: the initiation of the precocious or verdant metropolitan youth into the common ways of the rural

community. At the opening of every College year a fair amount of raw material was forthcoming, which had to be utilized by some blood-curdling episode.

Sometimes the verdant youths were captured, taken into a large pasture field, and tied to the backs of a few bucking colts upon which never man sat. In order to encourage the equally unintiated equines to do their best upon such occasions, they were spurred and frightened to the point of mad-It was agreed that these victims put to shame any Wild West performance, or made tame the celebrated ride of Paul Revere, as they chased and counter-raced the six acre pasture field. But an unusual form of hazing came to light upon one occasion, which so amazed the Faculty that their ban upon the practice was about to be removed. Some members of a certain Sophomore class herded a bunch of Preps into a College room, where they gave them a heart-to-heart talk upon the sin of ignorance and the value of an education. The effect was so salutary that the Preps made perfect recitations, stayed in o' nights, and actually attended College prayer meeting. To haze a man by compelling him to study, or by appealing to his sense of shame for its neglect, was so exceptional as to be a trifle harsh, but nevertheless a practice which should be encouraged by all College authorities. In the latter days of the College at Northwood, the antic fever became so epidemic that vigilant committees under the supervision of the Faculty were necessary to effect a quarantine. Even the offer and attempt to remove the entire contents of the College, in the fall of 1879, to "Beaver Falls or Bust," was strangely misunderstood and evidently unappreciated by the Faculty, for it took them several weeks to recover from the shock. Trickery was carried on to a degree after the College came to Beaver Falls, but its removal to the cultured community of steel and cutlery evidently had the tempering effect of either polishing the students or sharpening the professors.

The reader must not infer, by the recitation of some of these pleasantries, that trickery was an essential part of the life of the old College. Not by any means. The standard of instruction was never higher, and the exercise of discipline was never more vigilant than in those days. It was rather the isolated conditions of a rural community that led many to vent their surplus energy along these lines. As in the industrial and mechanical world there are now ways into

which surplus power can be turned to usefulness, so in these days of College environment there are many libraries and places of amusement to which a student can turn with profit during hours of relaxation from his arduous studies.

Neither can there be any reflection upon the character of the students of the earlier days. Upon their entrance of the College curriculum, many of them from rural communities or humble homes, they would naturally appear somewhat unsophisticated; but after a few years of training in the College and experience in the active duties of life, they have arisen to positions of prominence and usefulness. Statistics also show that men who have been reared in rural communities, and educated in small and almost obscure Colleges, have proven the most reliable and substantial factors in the world's work.


One who was a student and pastor respectively in both locations of Geneva College, and who has subsequently been a Presbyterial member of the Committee on Education in dealing with theological students, bears his testimony to the fact that those who have been educated in the small or denominational Colleges are usually more thorough and better principled than many apparently more brilliant who have graduated from the largest Universities with broader views and often dangerous principles. The moral of the argument is that the small or denominational College has the opportunity to educate the whole man—body, mind and soul—which, in the last analysis, is the only kind of true education for permanent results.

#### CHAPTER III.

#### THE FOUNDING OF GENEVA HALL.

In 1836, James Stewart Johnston, brother of the pastor of the Miami Covenanter Church at Northwood, was conducting successfully a general store in the neighboring village of New Richland. To him belongs the honor of originating the idea of founding a College in that vicinity for the education of young men looking forward to the gospel ministry. A few public-spirited citizens of the community held several meetings in Mr. Johnston's store with the intention of establishing a school in that village. Some of the leading citizens of Bellefontaine, hearing of the movement in New Richland, urged that the coming Institution should be located in the County seat. However, nothing practical grew out of this conference in either place, and the project was temporarily abandoned.

In 1838, Rev. J. B. Johnston began to teach a class of young men in his study. Among these were John French, Joseph Forsythe, Samuel Jameson and N. Robinson Johnston. As the class grew in numbers and appreciation, the community recognized the exceptional advantages of the private school. Many of the pupils were sons of farmers, and a few months during the wintry season covered the period of instruction. Soon young ladies were admitted to equal advantages, and the classes were held during vacant hours in the old log school house in Northwood. In a few years the increase of interest and attendance naturally led to the renewal of the project of founding a Grammar School or College. The propriety of such a step was carefully considered for some time and was finally laid before the Presbytery, and in turn before the people under its care. The matter was received with favor, and the Lakes Presbytery of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, in October, 1847, decided to establish a Grammar School as an auxiliary to a Synodical Institute, and both auxiliary to a Theological Seminary. The Rev. J. B. Johnston was appointed to take charge of the School. In November, 1847, he issued the following

#### CIRCULAR.

The Presbytery of the Lakes, at their late meeting, resolved to found a literary Institution upon Scriptural principles, making the Bible, with a selection of the best Christian authors in the Latin and Greek languages, as the text book.

Presbytery further resolved that I should take charge of the School. I have opened it pursuant to my appointment, and feel encouraged to make an effort to secure a permanent Institution. This appeal is made to friends for pecuniary aid in the erection of an edifice for the use of the Institution under the control of Presbytery.

With faith in the feasibility of the project and confidence in the liberality of the people, Mr. Johnston did not wait for a financial return to his appeal, but proceeded at once to the purchase of lots and the erection of a building at his own risk. "Geneva Hall" was chosen as the name, and the high ground in the western section of Northwood overlooking the kirk, was selected as the site of the coming Institution of learning. The founder held the deed of the property in his own name, giving a title bond binding him to make a deed securing the property to Geneva Hall as soon as it was incorporated. The first building was a substantial brick structure, two stories in height, and contained five comfortable rooms. While Mr. Johnston had previously gathered students together for instruction, he did not formally open the College until the morning of April 20, 1848, which may be regarded as the birthday of Geneva College.

The first official circular was sent out over the Church early in 1849. The following is a reproduction of an original printed copy now in the possession of the editor. It was fairly well printed upon dark blue paper, 12 x 7 1-2 inches.

## GENEVA HALL.

This Christian College was founded by the Reformed Presbytery of the Lakes, April 1848, and located in Logan county, Ohio. The site is elevated, commanding an extensive view of the valley of the Miami, and of the surrounding beautiful and undulating country. The location is healthy, and in the neighborhood of medicinal sulphur springs; one of which is destined to be a place of resort for health and pleasure. It is within some 30 minute's walk of the Mad River and Lake Erie railroad, connecting Cincinnati on the Ohio river, and

Sandusky city on Lake Erie;—and by the Lakes opening the shortest and cheapest route from New York City and the North Eastern States. The Columbus and Indianapolis rail road, which will connect with the Philadelphia and Pittsburg, and with the Baltimore and Ohio rail roads, will cross the former railroad at Bellefontaine, near "Geneva Hall," thus affording facilities for ready conveyance from every part of the Union.

The society surrounding is of an enterprising and industrious, and of a moral and religious character, embracing almost all the different denominations of evangelical christians.

As the institution is what it professes to be, Christian, and not Pagan, the Bible, with a selection from the best christian authors in the Learned Languages, will be the text book. The Latin course will embrace the following: Beza's Latin Testament, Grotius de Veritate, Buchanan's Psalms of David in Latin verse, Witsii Oeconomin, Calvini Institutio Religionis, and Institutio Theologiæ Elencticæ Francisco Turrettino. The Greek course-The Greek Testament, Chrysostom and Septuagint. The Hebrew-The Bible entire. French-The Westminster Shorter Catechism, the New Testament, Psalms of David and a selection from the best christian French writers. Much of this extensive course, especially in the Latin and Hebrew is designed for students preparing for the christian ministry. It is designed that the whole course shall be thorough—raising, rather than lowering the standard of education. Students preparing for the ministry can well afford to take an enlarged course in the languages, such as are embraced in the class-books selected; all of which contain the very stamina of sound Theology. A graduate in this institution may be in advance of ordinary students of the second year, now in most of the Theological Seminaries in the United States. It is contemplated to prepare an entire system of moral science, based upon the Bible -The Moral Law being the rule of moral duties, and the foundation of all moral science, and should be our text-book. The best selection of text-books in the Mathematical course, and in the Natural, Mental and Moral sciences will be made, having regard to the christian character of the Institution. Students of almost any denomination can have access to their respective churches within ordinary church-going distance. None will be compelled to attend places of worship not of their own faith; but all will be required to observe the Sabbath, and preserve a strict moral decorum.

As a female department will be connected with the Institution, it will be conducted by a separate teacher; and recitations will be heard in a separate apartment.—All the branches usually taught in the best Female Seminaries, will be taught in this Institution by a finished and extensive scholar—a graduate of the Western University of Pennsylvania.

Boarding can be had as cheap as in any other part of the United States—being in Ohio, in the great Miami valley, teeming with luxuries and staple provisions surpassed, perhaps, by no other portion of the globe. The medium and usual price \$1 per week—lower to those who take rooms which will be given gratis in the College buildings. Tuition in College \$8 per session, or half year—in the preparatory school less.

Summer session will open last Monday of April.

In 1848 the Board elected the Rev. James McLeod Willson, of Philadelphia, as Principal of the College, and Prof. Robert Trumbull, of Albany, N. Y., to a professorship. Neither of the appointees accepted.

There was also an Executive Fiscal Board, composed of Revs. J. B. Johnston and J. C. Boyd, with Messrs. Cornelius Jameson, William Pollock, Samuel O. Mitchell and James S. Johnston. Their duties were to hold and defend all property, real and personal, belonging to the Institution; receive and disburse all monies; employ and direct all agencies; control and manage all donations and bequests; and, in the absence of the Presbytery and Board of Inspection, to manage all the interests of the Institution subject to the control of Presbytery, to which the Board was to report semi-annually.

It may be of interest to show the standard of the College by the curriculum.

## THE COURSE OF STUDY.

## COLLEGIATE DEPARTMENT.

## FRESHMAN YEAR.

First Term—Geometry, Buchanan, Septuagint (Historical Books). Second Term—Algebra, Buchanan's Psalms, Septuagint, Ancient Geography.

#### SOPHOMORE YEAR.

First Term—Algebra (finished), Plane and Spherical Trigonometry, Buchanan, Lactantius, Eusebius' History, Rhetoric. Second Term—Surveying and Navigation, Hebrew, Lactantius, Chrysostom, History.

## JUNIOR YEAR.

First Term—Conic Sections, Hebrew, Grotius, Septuagint, Logic, History. Second Term—Analytical Geography, Natural Philosophy, Hebrew, Septuagint, Calvin, Mental Philosophy.

#### SENIOR YEAR.

First Term—Calculus, Natural Philosophy, Astronomy, Hebrew, Greek Testament, Tacitus, Moral Philosophy. Second Term—Hebrew, Elements of Criticism, Evidences of Christianity, Moral Philosophy, Chemistry (by lectures).

## PREPARATORY DEPARTMENT.

Latin Lessons, Erasmus' Dialogues, Latin Testament, Buchanan's History (commenced), Greek Lessons, Greek Testament, Septuagint, English Grammar, Geography, Arithmetic, Algebra.

Attention was also given to English Literature and Elocution. The French and German languages were extra studies. There were two terms of five months each—April and November being vacations.

In 1849, the Theological Seminary had been removed hither from Cincinnati, and thus Northwood became the educational center of the whole R. P. Church. Many of the students pursued their literary and theological course at the same time.

In the spring of 1850, the relation between the Presbytery and the Fiscal Board was dissolved, as the Presbyterv did not wish to commit itself unnecessarily in financial matters. The whole affairs of the College were now managed by the following

## AN ACT TO INCORPORATE GENEVA HALL.

Section I.—Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, That John B. Johnston, William Pollock, William Rambo, Cornelius Jameson, Thomas Hosack, James S. Johnston and Samuel O. Mitchell, of the County of Logan; John C. Boyd and James Robeson, of the County of Crawford; William Adams, of the County of Licking; and Henry George, of the County of Adams, their associates and successors, be and they are hereby created a body corporate, with perpetual succession, by the name and style of "Geneva Hall," for

the promotion of learning, morality and religion; with full powers to acquire, hold and transfer property, real and personal; make contracts, sue and be sued, plead and be impleaded, to have and to use a common seal, to establish a literary and theological department, and shall enjoy all the rights and incidents, and be subject to all the responsibilities usual to similar corporations in the State of Ohio: Provided, That donations and bequests made for the benefit of the theological department, which shall be a corporation of perpetual succession, known by the name of "The Theological Seminary of the Reformed Presbyterian Church," shall be fully and faithfully applied according to the design of the donors.

SECTION II.—That the principal edifices of said corporation shall be located in the town of Northwood, or vicinity, in Logan County, Ohio.

Section III.—That said Trustees shall have power to add to their number, fill vacancies, appoint a President and professors, make such rules and regulations as may be necessary for the government of said corporations, and transact any business appertaining to the interests of said corporations: Provided, That such rules, regulations, and transactions be not inconsistent with the true intent of this act of incorporation, and of the Constitution and Laws of the United States and of this State.

Section IV.—That the President and Professors of said corporations shall constitute a Faculty, with power of conferring degrees in the arts and sciences; and the name and style by which said degrees shall be conferred shall be that of the President and Professors of "Geneva Hall," in the State of Ohio.

SECTION V.—That the capital stock of said corporation shall not exceed fifty thousand dollars, to be divided into shares of fifty dollars each.

SECTION VI.—That the corporate concerns of each of said corporations shall be managed by a Board of Trustees consisting of seven members, one of whom shall be elected president by the Board of Trustees, and four of whom shall constitute a quorum to do business. The persons named in the first section of this act, residing in Logan County, are hereby appointed Trustees until a successor may be appointed in place of any one who may resign, die, or refuse to act. In case all, or a majority of the Directors should die, resign, or refuse to act, the stockholders shall elect a Board of Directors.

SECTION VII.—That any person or persons in the first section of this act shall have power to open books and receive subscriptions to the capital stock of said company, and any three stockholders shall have power to call a meeting of the stockholders on giving notice of the time and place of such meeting; said stockholders shall be entitled to one vote for every share he may hold in said corporation, and may vote either in person or proxy.

SECTION VIII.—That any person or persons desirous of promoting the interests of said corporations, may convey to either of said corporations any lands, tenements, or property, and in said deed declare the purposes for which the conveyance is made and the conditions on which the same is made. and may in such deed declare that a violation of, or failure to comply with any one of said conditions shall operate to work a forfeiture of such conveyance, and to re-invest the original grantor, his heirs or assigns, with the full and complete ownership of all lands, tenements, or property so conveyed; and any violation of, or failure to comply with any one of the conditions as aforesaid, shall authorize said grantor, his heirs or assigns, to re-enter and take possession of, and own absolutely said lands, tenements, and property so granted as aforesaid; and any person making such conveyance as aforesaid shall have a right to declare in any such conveyance, the authority and control which said grantor, his heirs or assigns. shall have and exercise over said corporation; and, in the selection of the officers, agents, teachers, and professors of the same; and, if said conveyance is accepted or used for the purposes of said corporation, such acceptance or use shall be evidence that the terms and conditions of such conveyance are accepted by and binding upon said corporation.

## CHAPTER IV.

MINUTES OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES, 1850-1859.

In order that the fullest accuracy and authenticity may be preserved in the early history of the College, the original and written records of the Board of Trustees will be printed. In the "Minutes of the Organization and Proceedings of the Trustees of Geneva Hall" they record:

"Whereas: for two or three years prior to 1850, an Institution of learning has been conducted in the town of Northwood, Logan County, Ohio, which Institution was, to some extent, under the care and subject to the direction of a Presbytery of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, called the Presbytery of the Lakes. And, whereas, the said Presbytery, having the subject before it at the session held in April, 1850, not approving of the Act of Incorporation granted to the said Institution of learning; and, for other reasons, the Presbytery proceeded to dissolve its connection with the said Institution of learning, and adopted resolutions of which the following are copies:

"Whereas, Presbytery does not wish to commit itself unnecessarily in financial matters; therefore, Resolved, that the relation between the Presbytery and the Fiscal Board of Geneva Hall be, and hereby is, dissolved." "On motion, Resolved, That the whole affairs of Geneva Hall, so far as this Presbytery is concerned, be and hereby are resigned to the Fiscal Board."

In consequence of this proceeding of the Presbytery, a meeting was called by the friends of the Institution to organize under the Act of Incorporation, which meeting was to be held at Northwood, on the second Monday of June, 1850. It is henceforth noticeable that many of the Board of Trustees were ministers and members of other denominations.

NORTHWOOD, OHIO, 10th June, 1850.

Agreeably to notice the following persons, made Trustees by the Act of Incorporation, met in the college building, viz.: Rev. J. B. Johnston, William Pollock, Cornelius Jameson, William Rambo, James S. Johnston, Thomas Hosack and Samuel O. Mitchell. The Trustees proceed to the election of a President, Treasurer and Secretary.

William Pollock elected President; Cornelius Jameson, Treasurer; and Rev. J. B. Johnston, Secretary. The President took the chair. On motion it was

Resolved, That Rev. J. B. Johnston and Cornelius Jameson be a committee to examine and report on the present state of the property belonging to the Incorporation.

Resolved, That Rev. J. B. Johnston and William Pollock be a committee to report on the financial affairs of the Institution.

Resolved, That Rev. J. B. Johnston and Cornelius Jameson be a committee to report on Instruction and Professors.

Ordered that the above named committees be required to report at the next meeting of the Board.

William Rambo tendered his resignation of the office of Trustee, which is accepted, and the Rev. James Wallace [of the Associate Church, Huntsville, Ohio,] is appointed to fill the vacancy.

Mr. Samuel O. Mitchell tendered his resignation of the office of Trustee, which is accepted, and the Rev. Joseph Stevenson [of the Old School Presbyterian Church, Bellefontaine, Ohio,] is appointed a Trustee to fill the vacancy.

Mr. Thomas Hosack tendered his resignation of the office of Trustee, which is accepted, and the Rev. Samuel Wallace [of the Associate Reformed Church, Bellefontaine, Ohio,] is appointed to fill the vacancy.

Mr. William Pollock offered his resignation of the office of President, which is accepted, and the Rev. Joseph Stevenson is elected President.

The President not being present, the Rev. James Wallace is appointed chairman.

Resolved, That Revs. J. B. Johnston and Samuel Wallace be a committee to prepare and report By Laws for the government of the College.

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be a committee to publish from time to time in the Logan Gazette, so much of the proceedings of the Board as they may consider calculated to promote the interests of the College.

Resolved. That the Board now adjourn, to meet in the college building on Thursday, the 4th day of July next, at 10 o'clock A. M.

Northwood, Ohio, 4th July, 1850.

The Board met agreeably to adjournment in the College building. Members present, Rev. Joseph Stevenson, President; Revs. James Wallace, Samuel Wallace, J. B. Johnston, and Messrs. Cornelius Jameson, James S. Johnston and William Pollock. Opened by prayer by the President. The minutes of last meeting read and approved. Reports of Committees were called for.

The Committee on the state of the property of the Institution presented their report in writing as follows: 'The Committee on the State of the Property belonging to the Institution beg leave to report, That the real estate consists of two lots in the town of Northwood, Nos. 27 and 28, on which has been erected a two story brick building, 40 by 25 feet, and other improvements. The title of this property is in John B. Johnston, who is ready to convey the same under the direction of the Board. The personal property consists of a library of seven hundred books; a philosophical apparatus; furniture in the College building; a map of Europe; a pair of globes. This report is approved and ordered to be recorded.

Resolved, That Rev. John B. Johnston be requested to make a deed for the real property above described, to "Geneva Hall" and assigns, as soon as he can make it convenient to do so.'

The Committee on the Financial Affairs of the Institution presented a report in writing which is as follows:

"The Committee on Finance, appointed at the last meeting of the Board, beg leave to report, That the amount received in cash, on subscriptions, and donations, is as follows:

With this report there was handed to the Board detailed statements of accounts, and other documents.

Resolved. That the report of the Committee on Finance is satisfactory, and is ordered to be placed on the minutes.

Resolved, That all the documents accompanying this report be placed in the hands of the Rev. John B. Johnston, with instructions to collect all the unpaid subscriptions as soon as possible, and apply the money as fast as it comes into his hands to the payment of the present debts of the Institution, until the same are fully paid off.

The Committee on Instruction and Professors reported, and it was ordered that the report lay on the table for the present.

Rev. James Wallace offered the following preamble and resolution, which were unanimously adopted, with the exception of the Rev. Mr. Johnston who declined voting.

WHEREAS, the Rev. John B. Johnston has sustained all the burthen of collecting funds, and building up an Institution of learning in Northwood, in which he has been engaged for three or four years past, and as such labor could not be bestowed without expense, and a sacrifice of time and comfort, for which he ought in justice to receive some compensation, therefore.

Resolved, That the sum of two hundred dollars be paid to the Rev. John B. Johnston, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated. After the passage of the above resolution, Mr. Johnston arose and said:

"I feel under obligations to the members of the Board for their kindness to me. I embarked in this work with a sincere desire to promote the public good. In the present situation, and future prospects of the Institution, I have a sufficient reward for the labors bestowed, and I now make a donation to the Institution of the two hundred dollars which you have pleased to give me, and also of the sixty-six dollars and 81 1-2 cents, the balance which appears to be due me on the settlement of my accounts."

Whereupon the Board adopted the following unanimously:

Resolved, That the thanks of the Board are hereby given to the Rev. John B. Johnston for his very liberal donation to the Institution.

Resolved, That every member of the Board is an agent for the collection of funds for the Institution.

The report of the Committee on Instruction and Professors is now taken up, and after consultation, the following resolutions are adopted.

Resolved, That Rev. David A. Wallace [an Associate Reformed minister of Fall River, Mass.] is appointed Principal of this Institution.

Resolved, That the Board pledge to the Rev. David A. Wallace, in case he shall accept the office now conferred upon him, a salary which shall be three-sevenths of the tuition fees of the Institution, calculating the number of students at not less than forty.

Resolved, That William F. George is appointed professor of Languages.

Resolved, That John Knox Milligan is appointed professor of Mathematics.

Resolved, That the remaining four-sevenths of the tuition fees be equally divided between the two last named Professors

Resolved, That the President and Secretary be a Committee to write to the Rev. David A. Wallace informing him of his appointment as Principal of this Institution, and urge his acceptance.

Resolved, That William F. George act as Principal until a Principal is obtained.

Resolved, That the library be under the care of the Faculty, and they are requested to appoint a librarian.

Resolved, That the Board now adjourn to meet at the College building on Thursday, the 19th of September next, at one o'clock P. M.

Closed with prayer by Rev. Mr. Johnston.

GENEVA HALL, Sept. 19, 1850.

The Board met according to adjournment in the Hall. Members present, Rev. Joseph Stevenson, President; Rev. Samuel Wallace, Rev. J. B. Johnston, Cornelius Jameson and James S. Johnston. Opened with prayer by the President. Minutes of last meeting read. William Pollock appeared. Rev. J. B. Johnston reported and delivered a deed, made by him, to the real property of Geneva Hall. The deed was accepted and ordered to be kept by the Secretary.

The Secretary reported an answer from the Rev. David A. Wallace, intimating respectfully that from his own personal relations and circumstances, and from these only, he is constrained to decline the appointment to the Presidency of Geneva Hall.

The Committee on By Laws reported some progress, requested time, and were on motion continued with instructions to report at the next meeting.

Resolved, That tuition shall uniformly be ten dollars per session, adding twenty-five cents extra in the winter session for fuel; and that no student shall be permitted to enter college for a shorter period than half a session.

Resolved, That William F. George be appointed Principal of Geneva Hall.

Resolved, That the Faculty be authorized to fill the vacancy now in that body for the ensuing session.

Resolved, That the next session open on the first Monday of October.

Resolved, That William Pollock and J. S. Johnston be a committee to obtain an amendment to the Charter, so as to enlarge the Board.

Adjourned to meet here the first Tuesday of Feb. 1851, at 10 o'clock A. M.

GENEVA HALL, Nov. 10, 1850.

By special request of the President the Board met in the Hall, and was opened with prayer by the President, Rev. Joseph Stevenson. Members all present. The President stated the object for which the meeting was called, viz.: to consider a communication from the Rev. Dr. J. R. Willson, lrequesting the Board to grant certain privileges. The folowing is the communication.

"Northwood, Ohio, 1850, Nov. 8. "To the President and other members of the Board of Trustees of Geneva Hall:

"The undersigned, having no place in which to open the Reformed Presbyterian Theological Seminary, respectfully requests your honorable Board to grant him, on reasonable terms, the use of the south room in the lower story of 'Geneva Hall' edifice, for twelve months, and leave to remove from the middle room of the second story—Synod's library. He also asks the key of said lower room, and a key of the outside door, that he may have access at all times to the Divinity Hall.

Yours with consideration, Jas. R. Willson, Theo. Prof."

NORTHWOOD, OHIO, 1850, Nov. 8.

After considerable conference on the subject of Dr. Willson's paper, the following series of resolutions was offered by the Rev. J. B. Johnston, and seconded by Rev. James Wallace.

Resolved, That Dr. Willson, Theological Professor, have leave to occupy the lower south room of the college edifice as a recitation room at all reasonable hours during the term of the session of the Theological Seminary, and that he shall have access to the library of the Seminary, or may remove it.

Resolved, That the Principal and Faculty be directed by this Board to hold open said room to Dr. Willson at all times necessary for any reasonable purposes contemplated in the designs of the Theological Seminary as originally contemplated by the Presbytery of the Lakes in offering accomodations.

Resolved, That a Committee, with the Faculty, wait on Dr. Willson for the purpose of making an arrangement that may accommodate the Theological Seminary.

While these resolutions were under consideration, it was moved by the Rev. Samuel Wallace, that a Committee of four, in connection with the Faculty, be appointed to wait immediately on Dr. Willson for the purpose of making a compromise upon the basis of the above resolutions, and report this afternoon. On motion the Board took a recess until 2 o'clock P. M.

2 O'CLOCK P. M., Board came to order.

The Committee reported verbally that they had met in Dr. Willson's room, and read to him the above paper as the basis upon which the Board were willing to make arrangements for the accommodation of the Theological Seminary, and that he had utterly refused to make any compromise upon such principles, inasmuch as he claimed, as the agent of Synod, the exclusive right to the whole property. It was then

Resolved, That the Board rent the best room that can be had in Northwood for the use of Dr. Willson and the Theological Seminary. A room was then forthwith rented from Mr. Milligan, and a Committee appointed to make a tender forthwith to Dr. Willson of the room now rented. Rev. Samuel Wallace and James S. Johnston are that Committee. The Committee repaired forthwith to make the tender. Committee returned and reported that Dr. Willson accepted the room. Adjourned with prayer.

GENEVA HALL, Feb. 4, 1851.

The Board of Trustees met according to adjournment, and was opened with prayer by the Rev. James Wallace, the President being absent.

Rev. James Wallace was called to preside. Minutes of the former meeting, and of a special meeting, were read and approved.

The Committee on By-Laws reported little done. Prof.

George was added to the Committee, and the Committee continued and directed to report at the next meeting.

The following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, when a Charter for an Institution of learning in the town of Northwood, Logan County, Ohio, was solicited from the Legislature, it was contemplated to establish a Literary and Theological School; and that the former should be under the control of the Presbytery of the Lakes of the Reformed Presbyterian Church; and

WHEREAS, the Charter obtained was framed with this understanding, granting the corporators power to organize and establish one or both departments; and

WHEREAS, the Presbytery, which at that time had control of the Grammar School in the place, dissolved all connection with the Fiscal Board and gave the whole control into their hands, as appears from the extract from the minutes of said Presbytery. (See page 4.) And

WHEREAS, the Fiscal Board, when it organized, viewed the Charter as authorizing two distinct corporations, one to be known by the name and style of "Geneva Hall" and the other by the denomination of the "Theological Seminary of the Reformed Presbyterian Church." And

WHEREAS, mistaken views of the relation of the Theological Seminary of the Reformed Presbyterian Church to this Board have gone abroad, prejudicial to truth and to the interests of the Literary Institution, wherefore,

Resolved, 1, That this Board organized under that provision of the Charter granting power to establish a Literary Institution only—leaving entirely out of view the Theological Department not yet established under the Act of Incorporation.

Resolved 2. That this Board did then, and do still, decline acting under the Charter, so far as the Theological Seminary is concerned, and consequently claim no connection with or control over the Seminary or its property.

Resolved 3, That the Secretary be directed to publish the above preamble and resolutions in the Reformed Presbyterian and in the Covenanter.

Resolved. That the Board adjourn to meet here the last Thursday, March 27th, at 3 o'clock P. M. Adjourned by prayer.

## REPORT OF THE FACULTY.

To the Honorable Board of Trustees of Geneva Hall, the Faculty respectfully report:

The session just closed has been characterized by an unusual degree of peace and harmony among the students. Twenty-six have been enrolled during this term. The daily attendance was good, and the recitations were in general such as did honor to the several classes. Not a single case of discipline, so as to demand even the slightest punishment, has been before us.

The students have been courteous to one another, respectful to the teachers, and always prompt in their obedience to the rules and regulations of the Faculty. The weekly exercises of the literary society evidence talent, study and improvement. And we are pleased to observe that the students in general throughout the session have found time for their own business, and for that only. Although from various causes the number in attendance has not been as large as that of the former session, yet we are satisfied that the whole course of affairs during this term has done more for the character of the Institution than any previous session. We earnestly recommend to the Board the employing of some immediate and energetic measures for advancing the importance and

advantage of the Institution, so as to merit and enjoy the most liberal patronage and active support of our enlightened community. We recommend the adoption of a code of by-laws, and also of a full and thorough course of study, which will be at once available. All which is respectfully submitted.

The Board of Trustees met according to adjournment. Absent William Pollock and J. S. Johnston. Minutes read and approved.

Resolved, That the Treasurer procure a book in which he shall enter all business pertaining to his office, as required by the rules and by-laws.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be ordered to pay the rent contracted for a room for the use of the Theological Seminary of the Reformed Presbyterian Church.

The Secretary reported that he had notified Mr. David Paul of his election, and that Mr. Paul had accepted.

WHEREAS, An Amendment to the College Charter has been received, therefore,

Resolved, That this Board respectfully decline acting under so much of the Charter as refers to the Theological Seminary of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, but will act under that part granting power to increase their number.

Resolved, That the Board proceed to elect nine members in addition to the present number, when the following were elected: Rev. Thomas B. Clark [Presbyterian] of Logan Co., Ohio; Rev. Charles T. McCaughan [Associate Reformed] of Sidney, Ohio; Rev. James L. Bull [Associate] of Kenton, Ohio; Rev. James E. Marquis [Presbyterian] of Kenton, Ohio; Rev. George A. Gregg [Presbyterian] of Bellefontaine, Ohio; Rev. Leander H. Long [Associate Reformed] of Urbana, Ohio; Dr. George Watt [Presbyterian] of Kenton, Ohio; Robert Patterson, Esq., [Presbyterian] of Bellefontaine, Ohio; and Hon. William Lawrence [Methodist] of Bellefontaine, Ohio.

Resolved, That the 1st section of Article I of the By Laws be amended so as to read: "The Board of Trustees, limited to forty, shall for the present consist of sixteen; seven of whom shall be a quorum."

The Secretary reports that since his last report he has received \$49.00 paid on subscription to Geneva Hall, of which he has paid out in liquidating debt \$36.75. Balance in his hands, \$12.25. The Secretary is directed to make effort for the collecting of subscriptions and liquidating debt.

Revs. T. B. Clark and J. B. Johnston, with the Faculty, are a Committee to complete a catalogue of books, and order of study, for publication in the annual circular. Adjourned to meet here on 4th Wednesday of September, 1 o'clock P. M.

The Board of Trustees met by special call, and was opened with prayer by the Rev. Charles T. McCaughan. Members present, Rev. Joseph Stevenson, President; Rev. James Wallace, Rev. Samuel Wallace, Rev. T. B. Clark, Rev. C. T. McCaughan, Robert Patterson, Esq., William Pollock, Cornelius Jameson, James S. Johnston, and Rev. J. B. Johnston, Secretary.

The Act of Incorporation, By Laws, and minutes were read, when Messrs. Rev. T. B. Clark, Rev. C. T. McCaughan, and Robert Patterson, Esq., accepted the office of Trustee and took their seats in the Board.

The Secretary reported the resignation of President William F. George. His resignation was on motion accepted, and the following passed:

"Resolved, That in accepting President George's resignation this Board cannot but express the very high regard which they entertain for him as a scholar, a gentleman, and a Christian, and that he leaves with our kindest feelings and our wishes for his future success."

A petition from the Union Literary Society was received, read, and laid on the table for the present. The petition asks the exclusive use of the south room of the second story.

A petition from sundry students asking for special reasons, a change of the day of Commencement was received, read, and laid on the table for the present.

A petition from the students asking the election of Mr. James R. W. Sloane to the Presidency of the College was received, read, and laid on the table for the present.

Recess for one hour was taken.

Hour expired, the Board was called to order.

The petition of the Union Literary Society was called up, and, on motion, granted; provided that the control of the Board and the Faculty be not thereby prejudiced.

The election of President was called up, when Mr. J. R. W. Sloane was unanimously elected. A Committee was appointed to wait on Mr. Sloane and inform him of his election to the Presidency of the College, and that his salary, on condition of his acceptance, shall be three-sevenths of the tuition fees. Rev. C. T. McCaughan and J. S. Johnston are that Committee.

Mr. Sloane appeared and signified his acceptance of the appointment to the Presidency of the College. The Board understanding that he be, as a member of the Faculty, included in the Committee appointed to complete the order of study, to whom is referred that business.

Resolved, That the Board defray the expenses of publishing the Catalogue, and

Resolved, That agents appointed by the Union Literary Society to solicit aid in procuring a library, be recommended to the friends of literature, together with the object itself.

The petition of the students for a change of the day for Commencement was taken up, and, on motion suspending the rule for the present, for special reasons, was granted; and further the Board resolved to change its semi-annual meeting to the same day—Sept. 19.

Adjourned to meet here Friday, 19th, 2 o'clock P. M.

The Clerk reported the state of the finances, and informed the Board that the donation of Miss Livingston had

been diverted from the intention of the donor; upon which it was resolved that J. B. Johnston and J. S. T. Milligan be appointed agents of this Board to investigate the facts in regard to that matter.

The Treasurer's report was called for. A report was read and received.

Resolved, That the charge on each student for incidental expenses be hereafter fifty cents per session, and from students in attendance half session, twenty-five cents will be received.

Resolved, That Prof. Paul be authorized to procure \$10.00 worth of vessels, etc., in addition to the apparatus, and charge the same to the Board which it hereby engages to pay.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to put and keep in order things about the College, and procure wood and other things necessary to sustain the operations of the Institution.

An election of officers was held when the present ones were continued. Dr. John Carter appeared and took his seat in the Board.

Resolved, That an auditor be appointed to audit the Treasurer's accounts, and that Dr. John Carter be said auditor.

Resolved, That the Board take prompt, speedy and energetic measures for the securing of an endowment.

Resolved, That J. B. Johnston, J. E. Marquis, Dr. Watt, Joseph Stevenson and T. B. Clark are a Committee to report at next session of the Board. On motion Prof. Sloane was added to the Committee.

Prof. Paul tendered his resignation, which was accepted, and the Board hereby tender their thanks to Prof. Paul for his able and very acceptable services.

Resolved, That the Board recommend to the Faculty the appointment of R. A. McAyeal as a Tutor.

Resolved, That the labors of Prof. Paul be distributed between the other professors.

On motion adjourned to meet here to-morrow at 8 o'clock A. M.

# GENEVA HALL, Sept. 23, 1852.

The Board met according to adjournment. Minutes read. Report of Committee on Endowment was called for and made by the Chairman. The report was accepted and adopted, as follows:

"The Committee on the Plan of Endowment report—Messrs. Sloane, Marquis and J. B. Johnston. Sub-committee to obtain information on the subject and report as soon as information can be had, and recommend the calling of a special meeting of the Board to which a report of the information obtained shall be made.

The Secretary reported the death of the Rev. T. B. Clark, President; when the Rev. Samuel Wallace was chosen President of the Board.

Milligan are hereby appointed to solicit donations and subscriptions to Geneva Hall for the purpose of building a new College edifice for said corporation, and that they report to the next meeting of the Board.

Resolved, That the Secretary is authorized to appoint agents to solicit subscriptions and donations for the purpose aforesaid.

Resolved, That Hon. Wm. Lawrence be appointed Secretary pro tem, to certify the appointment of Rev. J. B. Johnston an agent to collect funds for the erection of a College edifice.

Resolved, That Alvin Clark, Dr. John Carter and Cornelius Jameson be a Building Committee to contract for the mason work of an edifice and for putting on the roof, or what is necessary to forward the building as far as the roof.

Resolved, That J. B. Johnston be permitted to pay Allen Reid out of the first available funds.

Resolved, That Rev. John A. Meeks [Presbyterian minister of Bellefontaine, Ohio.] be chosen a member of the Board to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Rev. T. B. Clark.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be directed to report to the next meeting a full statement of the finances.

In auditing S. P. Johnston's account as building agent and Committee to borrow money and pay off certain debts, we find the Hall owed him, December 1856, \$76.33, which he is authorized to charge on the Treasurer's book.

J. C. Smith's account was audited, and the endowment agent is to credit him with \$91.11 on his account.

Smith and Shields are to make out a report to Synod.

Belle Center, July 7, 1859.

Board met by mutual agreement. All members present. J. S. Johnston was elected President pro tem. The following series of resolutions were proposed and adopted.

Resolved, 1, That we will use the most efficient means in our power to carry out the directions of Synod, as expressed in her resolutions accepting Geneva Hall; and for this purpose, we request all the ministers and licentiates in the Church, to act as agents to collect money for carrying on the Institution and liquidating the debt.

Resolved, 2, That we earnestly hope that all subscribers to the endowment fund will act in accordance with the recommendation of Synod in the fourth resolution; and, inasmuch as the debt has been principally incurred in dependence upon interest due, and becoming due, we especially hope that this will be paid as soon as possible.

[Here endeth the records of the Board of Trustees of Geneva Hall, so far as they are extant.]

#### CHAPTER V.

#### THE FEMALE SEMINARY AND ENDOWMENT.

In the fall of 1850, the Rev. J. B. Johnston entered upon the project of establishing a Female Seminary distinct from the College, and erecting a suitable building. It was to be known as "Geneva Female Institute"—a school for young ladies. Among many flattering recommendations at hand, we present two from eminent lawyers and Congressmen who were ever interested in the success of Geneva College.

The Rev. John B. Johnston, of Geneva Hall, Logan County, Ohio, has explained to me his plan of establishing a Female Seminary in that vicinity. I have been well acquainted with Mr. Johnston about seventeen years. I cordially approve of his enterprise, and recommend him to the friends of female education as eminently qualified for the enterprise, and in every way worthy of their confidence and patronage.

The Rev. J. B. Johnston of Geneva Hall, in Logan Co., Ohio, proposes to establish a Female Seminary on liberal principles, the plan of which he has explained to me. For many years past I have been intimately acquainted with Mr. Johnston. He is a ripe and accomplished scholar, eminently qualified in every way to conduct the proposed enterprise with ability and success.

When it is considered that the Seminary is to be in one of the most healthy locations that could be selected, surrounded by a very moral and orderly community, and will furnish the means of education comparatively cheap; conducted by a gentleman of the high reputation and acknowledged learning of Mr. Johnston, it cannot fail to deserve the confidence and patronage of the public. I cheerfully commend this Institution and Mr. Johnston to the public as worthy of entire confidence and liberal support.

During the year 1851, the large Seminary building was erected in the eastern end of the village of Northwood. It was a three storied brick structure containing thirty-seven rooms. It was soon filled with an unusually large and refined class of young ladies, under the special care of the talented teacher and sweet-spirited friend-Mrs. Margaret Wylie (Milligan) Sloane, wife of President J. R. W. Sloane. After three years of most excellent service she fell asleep in Jesus in October. 1854, and lies buried in the Northwood Cemetery. She was greatly beloved, and many days of mourning followed her decease. An excellent class of young ladies came from the community, and also from Bellefontaine, West Liberty, Kenton, and some distant points. In 1853, High Schools were established in the County seats, and this diverted many from the Geneva Seminary. Miss Susannah Sloane heard some classes, and Thomas M. Elder was a teacher in the Seminary until 1855. In 1853, Prof. Robert Trumbull of Albany, N. Y., assumed the Principalship of the Seminary, but he was not permitted to labor long. He died of consumption the next year.

In 1854, the Misses Isabella and Elizabeth Schultz, of Edinburgh, Scotland, accomplished teachers of French, German, Art and Music, were Instructors in the Seminary. In 1854, they were assisted by the no less renowned and efficient Miss Annie J. Hammond (now Mrs. N. M. Johnston of Seattle, Wash.) as Principal, with Miss Isabella Wilson as Assistant, and Miss Mary Martin as a teacher and instructress in music. They were all alumnæ of the celebrated Female Seminary of Washington, Pa. In 1857, there were fifty-eight young ladies in the Seminary. Many of these completed the prescribed course of instruction.

The Female Seminary was separate and distinct from the College at that time, and was solely under the direction of its Proprietors and Teachers. The terms were: Boarding per session of twenty-two weeks, \$33.00. Washing, \$3.00. Tuition in the lower branches, \$6.00. In the higher branches, \$8.00. In the ancient and modern languages, \$10.00. Vocal and Instrumental Music, including use of piano, \$15.00. The Seminary suspended with the College in 1860.

From the time of the establishment of the College there was the purpose and need of a permanent and adequate en-

dowment fund. The revenue from tuition alone was not sufficient to sustain the professors and tutors, and there were growing needs arising with the increased popularity of the College. The original College building itself had been enlarged, in 1853, by the addition of one story and a large chapel in front, making the building a commodious three-storied brick structure crowned with a graceful cupola. With the exception of some interior changes and a side entrance made in 1874, the building stands the same to-day.

After years of serious consideration the Board of Trustees, May 8, 1854, adopted the following

#### PLAN OF ENDOWMENT.

- I. The payment of \$20.00 shall endow a single scholarship, which will entitle the subscriber to the tuition of one student during four years.
- II. The payment of \$25.00 shall endow a single scholarship, which shall entitle the subscriber to the tuition of one student during the entire course, or six years, including the preparatory studies.
- III. The payment of \$50.00 shall endow a family scholarship, which shall entitle the subscriber to the tuition of his own sons, or those of any family he may designate, or to the tuition, amounting in all to twelve years, of any student he may select.
- IV. The payment of \$100.00 shall endow a scholarship for forty years, or shall entitle the subscriber to the tuition amounting to forty years, of such persons as he may select.

Subscriptions on the above conditions shall not be binding on the subscribers, nor shall the College be required to fulfill its part of the contract, until a sum from \$30,000 to \$60,000 shall have been subscribed, at which time the books shall be closed, the subscriptions shall become due and bear interest, and the subscribers shall then be entitled to the privileges of scholarships as above stated. The Trustees will then issue certificates signed by the President and Secretary of the Board, guaranteeing to the subscribers the privileges above enumerated according to their respective subscriptions, which certificates shall be transferable as any other property, provided notice of such transfer be given to the Board; and these certificates shall be delivered to the subscribers upon the payment of their subscriptions. The subscribers will not be required to pay their subscriptions until three month's notice

shall have been given in the public papers and periodicals of the Church.

By order of the Board of Trustees of Geneva Hall, done this eighth day of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

In the fall of 1855, the original Charter of the College was repudiated on the ground that the Legislature had added provisions which the framers had not authorized, and because it did not sufficiently secure the property to the Reformed Presbyterian Church. The following is a copy of the Charter accepted by the Board in 1855:

#### GENEVA HALL CHARTER.

State of Ohio, Logan County:

J. B. Johnston, J. K. Milligan, J. C. Smith, M. T. Glasgow, S. P. Johnston, James Dunlap, William Pollock, Cornelius Jameson, and J. S. Johnston, Trustees of the incorporated College of "Geneva Hall," and residents of Logan County, in the State of Ohio, where said College is situated, for the purpose of accepting and applying, so far as shall be necessary, to the said Geneva Hall, the provisions of the Act of the General Assembly of the State of Ohio, entitled "An Act to enable the Trustees of Academies, Colleges, Universities, and other Institutions for the purpose of promoting education, to become bodies corporate," and the several acts supplementary and amendatory thereto, and for becoming a body corporate under the provisions of said acts, are, and have associated themselves together under the following

#### ARTICLES OF ASSOCIATION.

- I. Said Association shall be and is hereby continued a body corporate under the name and style of "Geneva Hall." The Corporators may be increased to any number not exceeding twenty-five, with perpetual succession and power to fill vacancies.
- II. The objects of said Association shall be the diffusion of knowledge in all the branches of Academic, Scientific, Exegetical and Religious instruction usually taught in similar Institutions.
- III. Said Association shall be and remain forever under the direction of the persons known and acknowledged members of the Reformed Presbyterian Church; and all property, real, personal or mixed, the title whereof is, or shall be, vested in said body corporate, shall be forever held and used for the benefit of said Reformed Presbyterian Church. For the above purposes and to secure the aforesaid objects, the said persons hereto subscribe their names and submit their application, this twentieth day of December, One thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

#### CHAPTER VI.

#### EARLY STATUS AND FORM OF GOVERNMENT.

From the beginning, the College secured a high standing in the community and in the Church at large. The founders held a broad view of education, and planned for a wide and successful future for the Institution. They made provision in the original Charter for both a Theological and an Agricultural Department. While these departments were never fully established, the failure was on account of a lack of means rather than a great purpose. Under the first Charter the wider design of the College was evident from the selection of eminent ministers and laymen of the Associate, the Associate Reformed, the Presbyterian, and the Methodist Episcopal Churches, as well as the Reformed Presbyterian Church, as Professors and Trustees.

At one time the President-elect was a minister of another denomination. The original idea was to secure caretakers of eminent character and scholarly interest.

These conditions prevailed during the palmy days of Dr. Sloane's administration when the College entered upon its most successful era. There were those, however, who were not satisfied with this method of government. The Reformed Presbyterian Presbytery of the Lakes, under whose auspices the College was established, had refused to become morally or financially responsible for its maintenance, and should have been the last to object to the methods prevailing. Out of this condition naturally grew a difference of opinion as to the status and administrative authority of the Trustees. retirement of Dr. Sloane a new Charter was obtained, and the new Articles of Association required the Trustees to be known and acknowledged members of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, and the property to be held for the benefit of said denomination. While this condition prevails, the selection of Consultative Trustees from the Alumni Association, regardless of denominational affiliations, is a new vision of the original ideal to give the College the widest possible constituency amid competitive advantages.

The first teachers in Geneva College were men of talent and learning, and devoted the best of their earlier years to this then small and obscure Institution. Those who followed them in the management were no less cultured and heroic, and made an honest effort to sustain the high standing achieved by their predecessors. The original building was small and inconvenient, and the appliances meagre and somewhat crude. These were serious hindrances to educational progress. Notwithstanding these disadvantages, the character and breadth of the instruction were the attraction. Many students of promising careers, skeptical and atheistical in their views, were attracted to Geneva College in her earliest days.

While many of these students were not in sympathy with the inherited faith of the professors, yet they appreciated the liberal brains and honest convictions of their preceptors. recent letter from one of these students, who has never identified himself with any religious society, and who was born in the South, says: "I, being of Southern birth, often noticed a certain incident that Northwood was a prominent station of the "Underground Railroad," and many slaves from my own locality in Virginia were passed on to Canada. I do not say this because I was educated there, or ever in sympathy with their views, but we had the best of teachers. It was often said that there was more talent in Northwood at that time than in all the rest of Northwestern Ohio, and my teachers were Sloane, the Milligans. Paul and McAyeal." Another early student, born in Virginia, replied to a question why he had not graduated at Geneva, "because they were niggerlovers."

The advancement of many students to positions of great responsibility was a gratification and often a surprise. The failure in the future careers of other promising students was a disappointment and often a surprise. Of a student of brilliant possibilities it was once said, "He will be heard from in a few years." He was. For some time he beat a gong at a railroad restaurant!

The primal purpose of the Institution to educate young men for the gospel ministry was only partially accomplished, inasmuch as many students of both learning and piety entered the educational, medical and legal professions, many of the latter attaining the distinction of Judges and Congressmen.

At our distant viewpoint, and under improved conditions, we have little conception of the difficulties and even hardships which the founders of the College endured for her sake. Rev.

J. B. Johnston staked all upon her success. He evidently devoted the most of his time and means to nurture the Institution. This was done not only by the expenditure of his own energies and resources, but largely by the sacrifice of the complete education of his own family, who were busy caring for the students. Strife among brethren, and the failure of many subscribers to pay their endowment notes, caused a suspension of the College about the time of the breaking out of the civil war. Some recompense, however, can be seen in the splendid character of the men and women who were educated at Geneva and whose records can be scanned in the Biographical Department of this work. They are an honor to any Institution, and the work which they have accomplished in both Church and State is worth the sacrifices made to prepare them for it.

The loyalty of the students of Geneva College to their country was manifest in the large enlistment of students during the war of the rebellion, and some during the Spanish-American war in later years. No less than seventy students were found upon the field of battle where they either sacrificed their lives or defended successfully the principles of the flag. one, or perhaps two, were on the side of the Confederacy. sides these, however, two of the former teachers in the College. who were of Scottish birth and had gone South before the war. became spies for the Southern Confederacy. They were apprehended and imprisoned by the Federal Government. Two of the students became prominent Generals in the army, and are still living. Many held important offices in both the army and navy. It is not strange that such a large percentage of the students was in favor of the cause of the North. Pro-slavery sentiments were well nigh impossible about Geneva College under the teachings of such men as Revs. Johnston, Milligan, Sloane, Smith, Milroy or McCartney. In the whole community about Northwood the anti-slavery sentiment was very strong, and this was one of the prominent stations of the Underground Railway.

One of the grave mistakes of the Reformed Presbyterian Synod was the removal of the Theological Seminary from Cincinnati to Northwood in 1849, just after the establishment of the College. The error was twofold, in that the College had already provided in her Charter for a Theological Department when it became necessary; and the presence of "divinity students" educated elsewhere did not increase the respect or appreciation of the regular College students for that line of study. Trouble soon arose which resulted in the suspension of

the Theological Seminary in 1851, and a depletion of the attendance at Geneva College. While suggestions have been subsequently made to combine or locate the two Institutions at the same place, the Church has been wise enough to profit by the experience of the past, and keep them separate and distinct in government and location.

Notwithstanding the high standard of instruction and efficient management of the affairs of the College during her early years, there was a feeling of unrest and uncertainty that militated against her highest interests. She never seemed to be safely anchored. The lack of means was no less a drawback than the lack of unity among the brethren. The troubles that arose in the 50's were only forgotten during the excitement of the civil war. The large number of students enlisting depleted the attendance and was one of the causes of suspension. During the immediate post-bellum days an honest and persistent effort was made to re-establish the Institution under control of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, and met with encouraging success. In this undertaking too much credit cannot be given, and too little praise has been attributed, to the sacrificial spirit and indomitable energy of this distinguished triumvirate—Revs. Drs. N. R. Johnston, J. L. McCartney and S. J. Crowe.

## CHAPTER VII.

# TEACHERS AND FEATURES FROM 1848 TO 1860.

From the founding of the College in 1848 to 1850, the Rev. J. B. Johnston was the Principal. Associated with him were John Calvin Knox Milligan, as professor of Languages and Mathematics, and James Saurin T. Milligan, who was at the head of the Preparatory Department. Rev. James McLeod Willson, of Philadelphia, was chosen President in 1848; and Prof. Robert Trumbull, of Albany, was elected a Professor, but both declined.

In 1850, Rev. David A. Wallace of Fall River, Mass., was elected President, but declined. William F. George, an alumnus of Franklin College, was chosen a Professor; who, upon the declination of Dr. Wallace, was elected President of the College. He was Professor of Mental and Moral Science. In 1851, David Paul, an alumnus of Muskingum College, and for many years subsequently its President, was Professor of the Latin and Greek Languages.

The first official Catalogue was issued in 1850-'51. ing that year there were seventy-eight students in the College proper. The next year there was quite a falling off in attendance for various causes. By the transferring of the Theological Seminary from Cincinnati to Northwood some difficulties arose, as the Charter for Geneva College already made provision for a Theological Department. After two years of doubtful success the Seminary was suspended, and many of the students remained and pursued their course under the College professors. Late in the fall of 1851, President George resigned that he might devote himself to the work of preaching the gospel. Prof. James Renwick Willson Sloane, an alumnus of Jefferson College, and late President of Richmond College. Ohio, who had come to Northwood to study theology, was heartily elected President and was inaugurated with appropriate ceremonies on March 24, 1852. During 1852-'53, Luther Smith was Principal of the Prepartory Department, and Agricultural Science was introduced as a part of the curriculum. In 1852, Professor Paul resigned to enter the active ministry of the Associate Reformed Church.

In July, 1853, Prof. J. C. K. Milligan was ordained copastor with the Rev. J. B. Johnston over the First Miami Covenanter congregation. As a result of a controversy on the deacon question, the Second Miami congregation was organized in 1851, and, in 1854, the Rev. William Milroy was settled as the pastor. He was an alumnus of Union College, N. Y., and an eminent scholar.

In 1853, Prof. Robert Trumbull of Albany, N. Y., became Principal of the Female Seminary. He died the following year. Robert A. McAyeal became a tutor in the College. During this year also the College building was enlarged and reconstructed.

In 1855, John Calvin Smith, a graduate of Indiana University, was elected Professor of Mathematics and Natural Sciences. In 1856, Henry Hosick George, an alumnus of Geneva, was chosen Professor of the Greek Language. Samuel Black Taggart, an alumnus of Jefferson College, Professor of the Latin Language. David Hackston Coulter, Tutor.

In the fall of 1855, President Sloane gave notice of his intention to offer his resignation to take effect at the close of the next term, as he expected to accept the pastorate of the Third R. P. Church of New York City. The Board expressed its deep regret at his decision, and passed a series of resolutions expressive of their high appreciation of his work, to which Prof. Sloane feelingly replied.

The Rev. J. C. K. Milligan was elected President of the College, and conducted the affairs with great acceptance for two years. He resigned in 1858, partially on account of his health, and in order to be free to accept a call to the First R. P. Church of New York City. In 1855, the Board of Trustees appointed a Committee to ascertain the cost of a printing press, with the view of establishing a paper and a tract concern. The project, however, was not carried out. The endowment fund secured to the College amounted to about \$32,000, one-fourth of which was never paid. During the year 1856-'57, there were sixty-six students in all departments of the College. In the absence of Catalogues we are at a loss to perpetuate all their names. The Board of Trustees called the attention of the Church to the condition and claims of the College in the following

#### CIRCULAR.

"This Institution was founded at a time when, in the Reformed Presbyterian Church, there was no such school in either Scotland, Ireland or America. It was not designed as a rival to any other Institution. Its design, as entertained by its founders, was to advance the cause of perpetuating and increasing the gospel ministry, particularly in our own Church. Its friends have steadily and perseveringly pursued their object till the present time. Often they have been discouraged; often they have met and surmounted difficulties. Still an encouraging Providence has continued to smile upon their efforts to sustain and raise the Institution to a degree of importance to the interests of the Church. Its Alumni, when the circumstances are considered, are not inconsiderable either in number or merit. Some are filling well important stations in the field of the gospel both in our own and other Churches.

The present prospects, in many respects, are more encouraging than at any other or former period of its history; and the present calls for increased and persevering operations more distinct. Now we have a College. The number of students—near sixty—most of them the children of the Church, and designed for the ministry—four Professors employed, no sinecures—edifices erected sufficient for all the necessary purposes for a quarter of a century to come, unless under circumstances more than ordinary; a location central to the whole Church, and especially to those sections of the Church furnishing most of her candidates for her future ministry—a location healthy and easy of access from every corner of the Church—a location unsurpassed for its cheapness of living—being at least one-third less than in any city, East or West, both to the Professors and students.

From the above statement it will be seen that the number of students is increasing, and the prospects for continued increase are encouraging. We have thus far managed every jot and tittle of the affairs of the Church in connection with Geneva Hall. We have again and again called for a scrutinizing investigation of our management of affairs in every fiscal detail. For this we hold ourselves responsible and ready to answer. But to aid us in meeting our responsibilities to the Church, others must meet theirs to us.

By Order of the Board."

In 1856, Rev. N. Robinson Johnston was elected a Professor, but declined. In 1857, James R. Newell, of Pittsburgh, was elected to a Professorship, and declined. On account of President Milligan's health he urged his resignation; but it was not accepted, except to the extent of relief in case Rev. J. R. W. Sloane, who was recalled to the Presidency, would accept. Dr. Sloane declined, and President Milligan continued another year. Rev. J. B. Johnston was elected President of the College, but after due consideration, declined. Rev. N. Robinson Johnston was now elected President, but he also declined. Prof. J. C. Smith was in charge of the College from 1858 to 1860. Robert Shields, Charles D. Trumbull and David H. Coulter were teachers. Miss Mary Martin, a graduate of Washington Seminary, Pa., was a teacher in the Female Seminary.

As the College had now been taken under the care of Synod, a Committee was appointed to examine the books and papers of the Board of Trustees, and found the following facts:

The said property of Geneva Hall is held as follows:

The College Building and lot (four-fifths of an acre), and the four houses and lots, are secured by deeds to Geneva Hall, and said deeds are legally recorded and are in the hands of the Board.

The said Board of Geneva Hall is organized under the general laws of Ohio for the corporation of Colleges and Academies, and the Charter of said Board secures that "all property, real, personal, or mixed, the title whereof is or shall be vested in said corporate, shall be forever held and used for the benefit of said R. P. Church." The present members of the Board are all members of the R. P. Church, and are as follows: William Pollock, James S. Johnston, J. Calvin Smith and Samuel P. Johnston. The Board of Geneva Hall and the Lakes Presbytery, which has the supervision of the educational part, petition Synod to take the Institution under its care. Your Committee, therefore, unanimously resolve that the consideration of the whole matter be referred to Synod.

Respectfully submitted, J. C. Boyd, Chairman.

In accordance with the report of this Committee, the Synod adopted the following resolutions at its meeting May 31, 1859:—

"Resolved, That this Synod accept the offer of Geneva Hall made by the Trustees and the Lakes Presbytery.

Resolved, That Synod appoint a Committee to define the relation which this Synod shall sustain to the Institution, mature a plan of operation, and report at the next meeting of Synod.

Resolved. That Synod leave the Institution under its present management until a permanent arrangement can be made, directing the Board to take the most efficient means in their power for carrying out the Institution and liquidating the debt.

Resolved, That it is inexpedient to force the payment of the present endowment subscriptions; but that Synod recommend to those who have subscribed that so far as practicable they continue their subscriptions."

Rev. David Scott, of Rochester, N. Y., Chairman of Synod's Committee with reference to the Institution, spent some time in Northwood and vicinity during the summer of 1859, and reported the following:

"I am, as the result of my inquiries, more than ever satisfied of both the need of the College and of the certainty of its being sustained under the patronage of our Church in that part of Ohio. Nothing is wanted but a zealous and enlightened prosecution of the enterprise by Synod to give it a large and

permanent success. To say nothing of the Eastern part of the Church, the West demands something of this kind, and Synod is looked forward to as alone able to meet the want. neglect the present opportunity, or follow it up coldly, the Church may have reason to regret it when it may be too late. Synod authorizes, or rather instructs, the Board to proceed with the payment of the debt due by Geneva Hall, but they have no source of revenue—no means of doing anything in this way until Synod makes some arrangements. One of the resolutions passed was to the effect that the former subscriptions should not be enforced. Perhaps, on the whole, this was the right direction. But if the subscribers would pay the interest of the subscriptions till Synod meets, the Board could proceed with the College business without going into debt; or, if they would generally pay their subscriptions, a part of the debt could be liquidated.

If those who have subscribed see their way open to pay up the interest due on their subscriptions, I am satisfied it would be for the future interests of the College. It would, in fact, be doing what will have to be done when Synod proceeds to superintend the matter. The means of endowment have to be raised by some mode. It will matter little under what it is given to those who are able and willing, if only the College is sustained."

The following resolutions were passed by the Board of Trustees of Geneva Hall:—

# Northwood, Ohio, July 7, 1859.

Resolved 1, That we will use the most efficient means in our power to carry out the directions of Synod as expressed in her resolutions accepting Geneva Hall; and for this purpose we hereby request all the ministers and licentiates in the Church to act as agents to collect money for carrying on the Institution and liquidating the debt.

- 2. That we earnestly hope that all subscribers to the endowment fund will act in accordance with the recommendation of Synod in the fourth resolution; and, inasmuch as the debt has been principally incurred in dependence on interest due and becoming due, we especially hope that this will he paid as soon as possible.
- 3. That we request all the friends of education and the benevolent throughout the Church, to contribute of their substance to the support of the Institution.

4. That a copy of these resolutions, with a calendar for the ensuing year, be sent to our periodicals for publication.

Notwithstanding the effort that was put forth in 1860 to sustain the Institution, it became financially embarrassed. The subscribers failed to pay their subscriptions to the endowment, the friends were unable to raise a new endowment, and the buildings fell into the hands of creditors as private property. In 1861, the civil war broke out and many of the students enlisted in the army. The College was suspended, the Board became insolvent, and the doors of Geneva Hall were closed.

#### CHAPTER VIII.

THE RECONSTRUCTIVE DECADE FROM 1862 TO 1872.

The year 1862 appears in the darkest period of our country's history as well as that of Geneva College. The Board of Trustees of Geneva Hall had become insolvent and the Sheriff of Logan County sold the property to the highest bidder. The United Presbyterians of Northwood proposed to purchase the College building presumably for church purposes, but many believed for school purposes.

In April, 1862, the Rev. David Strang, a Scotch minister of the United Presbyterian Church, opened a school which attracted an encouraging attendance. From the beginning he was assisted by his daughter, Miss Martha Strang. In September, 1862, Miss Agnes Strang, and, in November of the same year, Miss Margaret Ann Strang, all accomplished teachers, were associated with their father in the conducting of a splendid Institution for two years.

In January, 1864, the College building was bought for \$1,500 by a few stanch friends of the old Institution of Geneva Hall, and were desirous of opening the College under the auspices of the Reformed Presbyterian Church. The stockholders offered the use of the property free to any one who would use it for educational purposes. Their generosity is revealed in the following paper:—

"We, the undersigned, in order to purchase Geneva Hall and its appurtenances, agree to pay the sums annexed to our names severally, upon the following conditions:

- 1. The property shall be held by the shareholders as common stock.
- 2. The shares shall not be transferred without the consent of a majority of the stockholders.
- 3. The property shall be held by the stockholders and their assigns for the promotion of Learning, Morality and Pure Religion.
- 4. It shall be managed by a Board of Control of five members, to be chosen by the stockholders, one hundred dollars entitling to one vote.
- 5. When a vacancy occurs in the Board it shall be filled by the stockholders.

- The members of the Board shall hold their office for the term of two years.
- 7. Whenever, from any cause, it ceases to be used for School purposes, it may be sold and the proceeds divided among the stockholders in proportion to their stock. January, 1864.

At the meeting of Synod in 1864, this body proposed purchasing the property, and appointed a Board of Education which was not authorized to act until another year. A local Committee composed of Henry George, Hugh Hervey and William Rambo was appointed to obtain the deed to the property and make all necessary repairs. During the summer of 1864. the Rev. J. L. McCartney, pastor of the First Miami congregation, visited the British Isles, having been requested to make appeals for funds to carry on the work of education for colored youths. He succeeded in securing about \$3,000 for this purpose. In the fall of 1864, correspondence was entered into with the Rev. N. Robinson Johnston, pastor of the R. P. congregation of Topsham, Vt., to induce him to undertake the Principalship of the Institution and thus save it to the Church. After due consideration he accepted the offer and repaired to Northwood. He issued a circular announcing the opening of "Geneva Collegiate Institute," and, on the crisp cold morning of January 10, 1865, the old College bell rang out the welcome news of the revival of the College under denominational con-Mr. Johnston was assisted in teaching by his estimable and cultured wife, Mrs. Rosamond Rogers Johnston, and by her no less accomplished sister, Miss Almira Rogers of Vermont. Miss Louisa M. Campbell was the efficient instructress in music, drawing and painting. During the summer and fall, the now celebrated authoress, Mrs. Virginia (Sharpe) Patterson was the teacher of music. During the first term about twenty students matriculated. As yet there was no controlling Board, and the affairs of the Institution were not in a satisfactory condition to the Principal. At the meeting

of Synod in May, 1865, the Rev. J. L. McCartney made a strong appeal for the School, and Mr. Johnston reported as to the prospects. The Synod adopted a set of resolutions endorsing the proposition to revive the College under Synodic control, appointed a Board of Education, and favored the project of making the education of promising colored youths a special feature of the Institution. The following persons composed the

Synod also appointed a delegation, composed of the following persons, to repair to Europe for the solicitation of funds. viz: Revs. A. M. Milligan, S. O. Wylie and J. M. Willson, with elder John Caldwell of Philadelphia. During the summer of 1865 this delegation crossed the ocean upon their mission, but "little more was accomplished than to give the quarto a free voyage to and from Europe." An appeal was made to the Church at home for funds, but the response was not hearty or large. One condition of the taking of the property was that \$1,300 were to be raised at Northwood and vicinity, and a still larger amount by the foreign delegation. In order to fulfill the conditions and retain the school, Rev. J. L. McCartnev persuaded one of his parishioners, Mr. Hugh Parks, to donate \$1,000. This he generously did, and the school was at once placed on a fair financial basis. These questions of management, location, and means being settled, the Board proceeded, Aug. 6, 1865, to the election of the following four professors, viz: Rev. J. C. K. Milligan of New York City; Prof. James R. Newell of Allegheny, Pa.; Rev. N. R. Johnston and Mrs. R. R. Johnston. Messrs. Milligan and Newell did not accept, and the school continued under the management of Mr. Johnston.

In Feb. 1866, the Board re-elected Mr. Milligan as President of the Institution, and Prof. John J. Stevenson, Principal of the High School of Norwalk, Ohio, as a Professor, but they declined.


It was an uninviting and tremendously difficult task toresuscitate an Institution under financial embarrassment, and located in a community still surcharged with factional differences. No one seemed anxious for the undertaking.

At the meeting of Synod in May, 1866, the Rev. Joseph McCracken of St. Louis, Mo., was chosen President of the College, with power to appoint additional Professors. Mr. McCracken visited Northwood, canvassed the field, appreciated the troubles, and declined. Rev. J. L. McCartney was appointed to take temporary charge of affairs. In addition to the teaching corps, Richard Turnbull, an alumnus of Monmouth College, and Messrs. William McKirahan and Joseph W. Carson were Instructors.

Prof. McCartney made negotiations with State Superintendents of Southern schools for suitable young men and women of color to induce them to come North and receive a practical Christian education at Northwood. A rather highly colored article appeared in the Missouri Democrat of St. Louis, which is worth preserving:

# "EDUCATION OF THE FREEDMEN.

A very praiseworthy undertaking is now receiving the consideration and enlisting the efforts of some of the noblest philanthropic spirits of the country, the object of which is to secure a higher grade of education for Freedmen, and thus bring the evident talent possessed by many of the colored youth into requisition for the advancement of the race. Last June the R. P. Synod established for this purpose the "Lincoln University," and appointed a very efficient Board of Education. The locality selected for the University is the village of Northwood, in Central Ohio. It possesses the peculiar advantages of easy access by several leading railroads, of being composed of a moral and religious community, and an isolation that protects it from influences that habits, manners, and prejudices have widely engendered. The plan is to secure, if possible, \$50,000 of a fund, and invest permanently a portion of it for the endowment of at least two professorships. Four delegates have already been sent to Europe for the purpose, and agents have been appointed at home. From the many schools in the South only the most talented and promising youth, of both sexes. will be selected; and these by means of a thorough training, it is believed, can be made useful instruments as Missionaries among their own people, of accomplishing great and permanent good. The Board have appointed agents to

solicit funds and already some very liberal subscriptions are on the list. No one can possibly object to this benevolent object, nor the modes by which its benefits are to be obtained. The negroes are now free, and they certainly will prove a safer element in our midst as an enlightened class, directed and influenced by thoroughly educated men of their own color, than as an ignorant and degraded herd, subject to the passionate incentives and motives of unprincipled leaders.

The Board remark very correctly that oppression, long and systematic, has degraded the race but has not destroyed them. The germ of moral and intellectual life has survived the fiery ordeal to a degree altogether surprising. They can be built up and made a prosperous people, but their education must necessarily be a slow process, and should be conducted with system and comprehensive views."

The following is a partial characteristic list of the prominent colored students entering in 1866:

- 1. JOHN FRANKLIN QUARELS, Macon, Ga.; son of a colored clergyman, and of Scotch-Indian-African descent. Color: dark yellow. Features: good, not striking; good head. Peculiarity of talent: good memory; lover of history and elocution. Moral character: unquestioned.
- 2. Daniel Webster Boxley, Rolla, Mo.; light mulatto, good features, quite humorous, yet genteel, pious and faithful.
- 3. MARY ANNA RAMSEY, Natchez, Miss.; very beautiful, light mulatto; kind, religious and studious. She was a slave.
- 4. Welby Williams, Natchez, Miss.; an orphan from the Mission; Indo-African descent; unpretentious, quiet and pleasing in manners.
- 5. LEWIS JOHNSTON, Blairsville, Pa.; son of an elder in the R. P. Church; was somewhat advanced in his studies when entering.
- 6. SQUIRE WILLIAMS, Natchez, Miss.; from the Asylum; gave unmistakable evidence of talent, but too much genius as an explorer and traveler, and soon found his way back to the sunny South.
- 7. BENJAMIN FRANKLIN PEPPER of Macon, Ga.; great mind for technicalities and criticism; legal turn of mind.
- 8. HUGH PRESTON RILEY, of New Alexandria, Pa.; formerly a slave; fine singer and natural orator.
- 9. WILLIAM JOHN ROBERTS of Southern Illinois; promised well, but soon abandoned his studies.

As the colored students were receiving all or partial aid from the Church, each one was required to subscribe to the following declaration:

"We, the undersigned, hereby pledge ourselves to the Board of Education of the R. P. Church, that in applying for and receiving aid from the Board in procuring an education, it is our purpose to devote ourselves specially to the moral. intellectual and religious elevation and improvement of the colored race in the work of teaching or of preaching the gospel."

The following edict was read to each:

"We will expect you to labor two hours every day, and half the day on Saturday, in such a way and at such a time as not to interfere with your studies. Are you willing to enter on these terms?" By turning to the Biographical Department the future attainments of many of these youths may be learned.

In the spring of 1867, the Rev. N. R. Johnston and wife resigned the management of the College to accept the Principalship of an Academy at New Castle, Pa. At the meeting of Synod in May, 1867, Mr. Samuel John Crowe, an alumnus of Westminster College, and a Reformed Presbyterian theological student of the second year, was elected Principal. Mr. Crowe accepted the position, and began his labors at Northwood, Sept. 17, 1867. Associated with him in teaching were his talented wife, Mrs. Amanda Geddes Crowe, and the celebrated mathematician, Mr. Wait Wright. Revs. J. L. McCartney and William Milroy, pastors of the local Covenanter congregations, heard some classes. The following is a brief summary of the work done during 1867-68:

"Whole number of students in attendance, 83; average attendance, 65; net receipts, \$858.20; funds raised by exhibitions for repairs, \$51.15; expenditures for teachers, \$707.00; for the janitor, \$47.56; for fuel, \$134.78." The Local Board of Examiners was composed of Revs. John Williamson, William Milroy, J. L. McCartney, James W. Taylor and Preston H. Wylie. The Faculty was composed of Samuel J. Crowe, Principal, and Professor of Latin Literature, Political Economy and Astronomy. Wait Wright, Esq., Professor of Mathematics. Mrs. Amanda G. Crowe, Principal of Scientific Department. William McKirahan, Tutor. M. McClinton, Professor of Penmanship and Bookkeeping. Miss Mary Lloyd, Professor of Instrumental Music. Rigid rules and regulations were enforced, among which were that "no student shall use

tobacco or intoxicating drinks; no student shall avow or propagate infidel principles, or engage in the profanation of the Sabbath; students shall not be permitted to be out of their rooms after 9 P. M."

The College building, and a majority of the stock of the Seminary building, were donated to Synod, and the remaining shares were leased to Synod for ten years, so that Synod assumed no responsibility other than the management of the College and to see that the Professors were paid. The expenses were moderate. The average price of boarding was \$3.00 per week, including a furnished room, but exclusive of light, fuel and washing. A contingent fee of \$1.00 per term was required. The tuition per term in the Classical department was \$10.00; in the Scientific, \$0.00; in the Musical. \$10.00. Children of ministers received their tuition free. the close of the year 1867-'68, a petition was presented to the Board from the students and citizens, speaking in the highest terms of the character and qualifications of Mr. Crowe as a teacher, and earnestly desiring him continued as Principal. Mr. Crowe accepted the office for another year, and the number of students greatly increased under his efficient administration.

During the year 1868-'69 the following persons composed the Faculty:—Samuel J. Crowe, Principal, and Professor of Latin, Natural Philosophy and Astronomy; Samuel R. Galbraith, Professor of Greek and Chemistry; Rev. Preston H. Wylie, Professor of Political Economy and Adjunct Professor of Greek; Thomas C. Sproull, Professor of Hebrew and Assistant Professor of Latin; Wait Wright, Esq., Professor of Mathematics and Mental Philosophy; Mrs. Amanda G. Crowe, Professor of Instrumental Music; William McKirahan and J. Renwick Wylie, Tutors.

The number of students increased to nearly one hundred, and the general affairs of the College were in a flourishing condition. The prejudice against the Institution on account of negro students reciting and associating with other students was fast passing away, and a number of promising colored persons were receiving their education during these years.

While the teaching force, and the number attending the College, were quite satisfactory, Synod was not placing the Institution upon the firm financial basis expected. In 1870, the Principal and several of the Professors resigned in order to complete their theological course. The Board of Education

also resigned. Synod must now either define its relation to the College by assuming promised financial responsibility, or else return the property to the donors according to the terms upon which it was given.

Synod appointed a new Board in May, 1870, composed of Revs. H. H. George, P. H. Wylie, J. S. T. Milligan and elder James Brown. Prof. Crowe consented to manage the affairs and teach another year. During the spring term Thomas J. Allen and Elihu C. Simpson, alumni of Westminster College, were teachers.

After the self-sacrificing efforts of Rev. N. R. Johnston to save the Institution to the Church, and the most hopeful resuscitation effected by Prof. S. J. Crowe, it would appear to be criminal neglect and base ingratitude for Synod not to carry out its obligations to assume control.

In 1871, Prof. Crowe, and those associated with him in teaching, finally resigned. Rev. William Milroy was appointed President *pro tem* until some definite action was taken.

Rev. N. R. Johnston and wife were again chosen Professors. Their work during the year was faithfully performed, but their salaries were not paid out of the tuition receipts—the number of students being about fifty. No other ways or means were provided for meeting the financial obligations. Things could not longer remain in this condition. Naturally Mr. and Mrs. Johnston resigned at the close of the year, and subsequently took charge of a flourishing Female Seminary at Blairsville, Pa.

The shades of the night of death were again falling around Geneva College. Some remedial help must come quickly or the experiences of the decade preceding would be repeated. Upon the action of Synod in May, 1872, hung the destiny of the College. What shall it be?

## CHAPTER IX.

THE RE-ESTABLISHED COLLEGE IN 1872, AND THE CAUSES WHICH LED TO THE REMOVAL IN 1880.

The "hope deferred" which made "the heart sick" was now about to be realized. The "quivering age" should terminate with 1872. A "new era" begins, and Geneva College is to see better days. So decreed the sponsors of the Institution. At the meeting of Synod in York, N. Y., May 29, 1872, the whole matter of the status, condition, need, and prospect of the College was soberly and carefully considered, and as a result the Rev. Henry Hosick George, an alumnus of the College, and pastor of the R. P. congregation of Cincinnati, Ohio, was unanimously chosen President. This was not only an expression of the confidence which the Church at large had in Mr. George, but it was the correct answer to the problem with which the Board had to contend for so many years. The local pastors at Northwood were satisfied, and a hearty co-operation upon the part of all insured a successful administration for the incoming President.

The College opened Tuesday, Sept. 10, 1872. Dr. George was inaugurated amid great demonstration, and from the whole neighborhood the friends gathered to observe the gala day. Dr. J. R. W. Sloane published a stirring appeal in the Church papers for co-operation, students, and money. old Charter was revived and redrawn. The Institution was hereby changed from "Geneva Hall" to "GENEVA COLLEGE." The town of "Northwood" became so wedded to the College that it changed its name to "WEST GENEVA." During the year 1872-73 one hundred and twenty-four students enrolled. The following efficient Faculty imparted instruction:—Rev. Henry Hosick George, President, and Professor of Greek, Hebrew and Moral Philosophy; Rev. William Milroy, Professor of the Latin Language; Rev. John L. McCartney, Professor of Natural Science; J. Ralston Wylie, Professor of Mathematics; Asa C. Elliott, Instructor in Commercial Department; Miss Lottie B. Stewart, Teacher of Music: Joseph A. McKirahan, Tutor.

A good philosophical and chemical apparatus, valued at \$1,000, was secured; a splendid Reading Room was fitted up; books to the amount of \$500 were placed in a well selected Library; the College campus was improved, enlarged, and fenced. The Aletheorian Literary Society, which was the legal successor of all that preceded, now had a friendly rival in the organization of a new society called the "Adelphic." They fitted up a comfortable room beside the Aletheorian, and these societies became splendid training departments of the College.

In 1873, the town of Bellefontaine offered the Board a lot of four acres of ground and a pledge of \$20,000 for buildings if the College would remove to the County seat. The Board, however, did not recommend its acceptance, but the offer indicated the value which a live town placed upon the possession of such an Institution. During this year also the salary of President George was raised \$500 per annum. In order that more interest might be taken in the College from various parts of the Church, provision was made for a Trustee from every Presbytery. Mr. Hugh Parks donated a sum of money sufficient to erect a large boarding house, which bore his name.

In 1873, two new departments were established in the College. The Normal and Preparatory Department was under the care of Prof. Josiah S. Gamble. The Commercial and Banking Department was under the supervision of Prof. J. Ralston Wylie. The attendance during 1873-74 reached the high water mark of one hundred and seventy. This led to the election of two new Professors in 1874, Rev. Joseph McCracken of St. Louis, Mo., to the chair of Mathematics; and Prof. John Knox McClurkin of Westminster College, Pa., to the chair of Greek. During the spring of 1874, the first contest was held between the Literary Societies. Feeling the need of increased funds to carry on the enlarged work, Synod appointed the following Committee on Endowment, viz: Revs. T. P. Stevenson, H. H. George, J. McCracken and David McAllister, with Elders David Torrens, John A. McKee and Walter T. Miller. As an expression of gratitude to the Board for not entertaining a proposition to remove the College from Northwood, the citizens of the town and vicinity raised \$2,500, in 1874, for improvements. As a result the College building was remodled by enlarging some of the class rooms, effecting a large side entrance under a tasty portico, which led up a wide stairway to the rooms above. New flagstone pavements were laid along the main street between the College and Seminary buildings;

handsome maple trees adorned the boulevard, and another boarding house was erected opposite the Seminary building. New life greeted the return of the students, and the prospects of the College were never brighter. In order to encourage the endowemnt fund, which was now bordering on \$6,500, President George generously relinquished \$200 per year of his salary. Some changes took place in the personnel of the Faculty which are noted in the complete list of the Professors in another part of this work.

In the midst of this flourishing condition of the College. and when the reconstruction had been so successfully completed, an agitation arose for the removal of the Institution to a more eligible location. Drs. George and McCartney, while canvassing the Church in the interests of the endowmentfund. found a strong sentiment in the Eastern section of the Church for removal. Most of the pledges and notes in Central Ohio. and especially in the vicinity of Northwood, were made on condition that the College would not be removed. About \$30.000 were now paid or pledged to the endowment fund. Large sums were forthcoming from generous donors in the East if the College was removed. The agitation was hurtful to the interests At the Synod of 1878, a Committee of nine of the Institution. persons was appointed to determine whether the interests of the Church could be advanced by a removal of the College from Northwood, and a decision was to be given by Dec. 1. 1878. This Committee was composed of Revs. A. M. Milligan, D. B. Willson, J. C. Boyd, J. W. Sproull, with elders John Hunter, W. S. Kernohan, Samuel Bell, D. S. Erwin and Henry Martin. The Committee was anxious that the matter should be settled as quickly as possible, and gave every opportunity to various sections to present their offers by the time specified.

Up to Feb. 1, 1879, two months over the time granted, not a single offer was made to the Committee. The Committee then made the proposition to the people of Northwood that if they would raise \$15.000 for buildings, including what they could secure for endowment, they would report to Synod in favor of permanently establishing the College at Northwood. They immediately responded by raising \$10,000, and claimed that \$8,000 of subscriptions to the endowment were available for buildings, and that the terms were fairly fulfilled. The Committee held, however, that a legal difficulty might arise in regard to the use of endowment pledges for building purposes, and, in order to remove all causes of complaint, that a renewal of the call for proposals should be made, assuring that


only bona fide offers would receive attention, and that these must be forthcoming by May 20, 1879.

At the meeting of Synod in May, 1879, the Committee presented the respective claims of Beaver Falls, Pa.; Morning Sun, Iowa; Northwood, Ohio, and Bellefontaine, Ohio. Advocates of each place were allowed one half hour, the Faculty one half hour, and then the subject was open to Synod for discussion. After a full and free consideration of the matter, Synod ordered the vote taken by members rising to their feet; and that the place which received the smallest number of votes on the first count should be omitted from the next vote, etc. Beaver Falls was then chosen by a large majority over all places proposed, and this selection was made unanimous. This rang the death knell of Northwood! It was now ordered that the condition upon which this choice was made, viz: the gift of ten acres of ground and \$20,000 for the erection of a building, be placed upon record.

The Committee then recommended the following resolutions:—

- 1. That Rev. R. J. George, Dr. S. A. Sterrett, Messrs. David Gregg, J. R. McKee, Henry O'Neill, J. B. Jordan, J. D. McAnlis, A. B. Copeland and Rev. David McAllister be appointed a Committee, of which Revs. H. H. George, J. L. McCartney and John Lynd, professors in Geneva College, shall be members ex officio, to represent Synod in all the business connected with the location of the College at Beaver Falls, and that this Committee be authorized to add to their number as found necessary in the prosecution of the work.
- 2. That this Committee is hereby authorized to close the contract, locating the College at Beaver Falls, on or before July 31, 1879, on condition that a site of ten acres of ground be furnished, and \$20,000 for a College building be secured in cash, or subscriptions known to the Committee to be as good as cash, and convertible into cash as the demands of the building contract may require.
- 3. That this Committee be and hereby is authorized to agree finally upon a site for the building at Beaver Falls, and to receive the deed of the ground conveying it to the Reformed Presbyterian Church, and to transfer this deed to Synod's Board of Trustees.
- 4. That this Committee be and hereby is authorized to receive all moneys subscribed for the erection of the College building, and that they be instructed to receive no notes nor other paper which cannot be made available in their disbursements as the work of building progresses.





- 5. That said Committee be and hereby is authorized, upon obtaining possession of this deed, to prepare a plan and specifications, receive bids, and conclude a contract for the erection of a suitable building for the College.
- 6. That whatever expenses may be necessary for grading and laying out the grounds, and for providing roads, walks, and fences; the same must be met from the \$20,000 pledged, or by additional subscriptions, so that the whole property shall come to this Synod free from debt.
- 7. That this Committee be instructed to press the work forward as expeditiously as may be consistent with thoroughness, so that a full account of this work may be rendered to Synod at its next meeting, and so that the building may be occupied and the work of instruction begin in it with the opening of the fall term in Sept. 1880. The same Committee was instructed to report to the next Synod a Constitution or Plan of Organization for the College.

The College was to remain undisturbed at Northwood for the ensuing year of 1879-80. But notwithstanding this act of Synod there were some disturbances about Northwood. The people of that vicinity who had loyally supported and nourished the College through its many helpless years, felt that they had not been fairly treated, inasmuch as they claimed they had fulfilled the conditions which insured its permanent establishment in their midst, and had recently added a good sum for improvements to their previous generous pledges to the endowment. As many of these endowment pledges were conditional upon the College remaining in Northwood they were not collectible.

The attendance at College fell off alarmingly after the decision to remove. The Senior Class of 1880, which formerly contained nineteen members, was graduated with eleven students. In the midst of the enthusiasm for the projects of the new location in Beaver Falls, some things were sadly neglected at Northwood. While the action of Synod was evidently in the interests of the evolution of the College, the Faculty were performing a revolution, and many of the students were in a state of rebellion.

In this unsettled and unsatisfactory condition, things continued until about Commencement time in May, 1880, when the Faculty decided that it would not be worth while to furnish music for the occasion as was their custom. Then the Senior Class decided that there would be no Commencement.

But there was the most largely attended Commencement in the history of the College, and the music furnished by the Faculty was never sweeter. As the College was forever closing its doors at Northwood, the last graduating class fittingly commemorated the occasion by turning from the spirit of apparent rebellion, and heartily joined the Faculty in the work of revolution in these respects: the Commencement exercises were held in the evening; instead of the conventional black suits and silk hats, the male Seniors unexpectedly appeared upon the rostrum in light walking suits and straw hats, and the ladies in silk gowns to match; the subjects of orations were at least novel if not striking, some of them being: "Who Does My Thinking?" "Turned Loose." "Inner Conflicts." "How Will All This End?" "Shinny On Your Own Side." It is only fair to state that these subjects had no connection with, or reference to, existing conditions. The day following Commencement the graduating class and many friends made an excursion to beautiful Silver Lake, and in the evening held a final banquet at the Miltenberger House in Bellefontaine. Thus closed the history of Geneva College at West Geneva. Upon the plea of wilful desertion, if not of cruel treatment, the village obtained a divorce from the College and assumed its maiden name of "Northwood," with which it was christened in 1832. For several years a successful Normal Academy was conducted in the old College buildings at Northwood, but of late the buildings have stood vacant or were transformed into dwelling houses.

There are some who still believe that had the proper interest been taken in the College by the Church at large, and had new buildings been erected as at one time proposed, that Northwood was a central and desirable location. Others again are just as firmly convinced that the removal of the College was not only a necessity but a wise policy, inasmuch as it unified sentiment in the Church and called forth more princely gifts for her support. And so if some poetic muse had been summoned to express the preference, he might have said:

Sectional strife—begone and perish!

Knowledge alone we prize;
Geneva's name we'll ever cherish

Where e'er her buildings rise.

The College lives, what e'er one calls her!

Her fame survives all scorn;
So YOU may be a Beaver Falls-er,

But I was Northwood-born!

## CHAPTER X.

#### THE COLLEGE AT BEAVER FALLS SINCE 1880.

A celebrated artist determined to paint a Madonna. was to be the crowning work of his life, into which he would put the best of his soul. There were many beautiful Madonnas, but all were to be excelled by his ideal. He set out for a model that would possess extraordinary qualities and express perfection in every detail. Days, weeks, months of fruitless quest were spent in neighboring towns and cities for the ideal face, but all were rejected. In wild enthusiasm he set out upon a foreign trip that would only end when he had found the object of his search. The months now lengthened into years as he peered into every nook and corner of the earth—but all in vain! Disheartened in his hopeless search he returned to his native village, and had proceeded but a short distance when to his amazement there stood before his eyes the ideal of his heart and the object of his dreams. He had searched the world over to find her at last at the door of his native hamlet. How many there are who go afield for the beautiful and useful, while at their own doors exists the ideal often unrecognized or unappreciated!

This illustrates Geneva College and College Hill. You cannot find a better school in which to educate your children than Geneva College. No section of the country is more picturesque and romantic than the natural scenery along the Beaver river about College Hill and Morado! For the ideal of either, why search elsewhere?

The thrifty manufacturing city of Beaver Falls is happily situated upon a plateau on the west bank of the Beaver River about three and a half miles above the point where it empties into the Ohio River at Beaver. "The everlasting hills" which surround the city rise some two hundred feet above the river, and break off into shaggy cliffs or rear up into bold bluffs, comprising a most picturesque scenery.

The population of Beaver Falls proper is about sixteen thousand. Including the surrounding towns of College Hill, Patterson Heights, New Brighton, Falston, Beaver, Rochester, Monaca, and Freedom, which are inseparably connected by

trolley lines and business interests, the population would reach about forty thousand.

As early as the Revolutionary war the exceptional possibilities of the water power of the falls of the Beaver attracted the attention of prospective manufacturers. When these lands were offered for sale and settlement by the Legislature in 1793, General Broadhead purchased four hundred acres including the present site of Beaver Falls.

Originally "the falls" were in the form of deep and dashing rapids, and were located and known as follows: the "Upper Falls" near the present Fetterman bridge; the "Middle Falls" near the present Tenth Street bridge; and the "Lower Falls" near the Falston bridge.

As early as 1801, saw and flour mills were operated by water power. In 1803, a forge or blast furnace was established. In 1806, a town plot was made by Isaac Wilson and Co., who were then operating an iron blast furnace, and were manufacturing pig iron, stoves, etc. The town was named "Brighton." in honor of the English town from which the surveyors hailed. In 1815, a town was laid out on the east side of the Beaver river and was called "New Brighton." To maintain its prestige the original town appended an adjective and was known as "Old Brighton." For many years various manufacturies located along the stream and the town grew in importance. In 1820. James Patterson, from Philadelphia, purchased most of the property on the west side of the river, and was instrumental in not only reviving the operation of mills previously erected, but also in establishing new and improved industries. enlarged the town in 1840, and for a decade the interests were so promising that he successfully disposed of the largest part of the village and lands to the Harmony or Economite Society in 1859. They in turn platted the town up the river for some distance, secured many additional industries, and incorporated the rising city as "Beaver Falls" in 1868. The principal commodities manufactured are out of steel, iron, glass and clay, but are too numerous and extensive to find description in this volume. Beaver Falls is now recognized as one of the leading manufacturing centers of Western Pennsylvania, and possesses exceptional natural advantages and railroad facilities.

The religious interests of the city are well conserved in the maintenance of a church of nearly every denomination. The Reformed Presbyterian Church, under whose auspices

Geneva College is controlled, has had a steady and substantial growth in this city.

As early as 1807 a Covenanter congregation was organized in the vicinity of New Galilee, and continues to this day. 1855, a preaching station was established in the town of Rochester. In 1869, Mr. John Cook removed from near Enon Valley to the new city of Beaver Falls, and he was soon followed by Robert Paisley of Allegheny, James D. McAnlis of New Galilee, and others. Rev. N. M. Johnston, pastor of the Covenanter Church of New Galilee, preached to the society in Beaver Falls once a month, and until the organization of the first Reformed Presbyterian congregation of Beaver Falls. November 10, 1874. At this time John Cook, Robert Paisley and James D. McAnlis were chosen ruling elders. Rev. Robert J. George, of Canfield, Ohio, was installed the first pastor in June, 1875, and continued in charge for seventeen years. In 1892, he accepted the chair of theology in the Allegheny Seminary. The new congregation purchased a splendid property at Ninth street and Seventh Avenue, in 1875, and for a time worshipped in a frame church which soon was replaced by a modern and substantial brick edifice. Dr. George was instrumental in securing Geneva College to Beaver Falls in ,1880, and soon a large and influential congregation was built up under his faithful ministrations and by the removal of many substantial families hither for educational advantages.

In 1892, a second congregation was organized, being located on College Hill, as many of the people were too far distant from the down-town church. This congregation was known as "Geneva," and has since worshipped in the chapel of Geneva College. In the fall of 1893, the Rev. W. Melancthon Glasgow of Kansas City, Mo., succeeded Dr. George as pastor of the First Church; and, in the summer of 1894, the Rev. Henry G. Foster was ordained and installed pastor of Geneva congregation.

In 1896, a division occurred in the Geneva congregation, and a third congregation of Covenanters was organized, known as "College Hill." They built a comfortable frame church on College Hill, and the Rev. Renwick H. Martin was settled as the pastor in 1898. Mr. Glasgow having resigned the First Church in the fall of 1899, the Rev. John S. Thompson, of Utica, Ohio, succeeded to the pastorate. With three vigorous congregations and efficient pastors, Covenanterism is well entrenched about the denominational College.

The educational interests of Beaver Falls are well provided for in the existence of several splendid school buildings, a High School, and two Commercial Colleges.

As early as 1833, a Female Seminary was established in New Brighton by Prof. Marcus T. C. Gould of Rome, N. Y. In 1837, the "Beaver County Institute," of New Brighton, was organized for "the promotion of science and literature, but more especially of natural history."

Beaver College, under the auspices of the Methodist Episcopal Church, was founded in 1853, and has a prosperous following. Geneva College is located in College Hill Borough, immediately north of Beaver Falls. Just above the Institution, along the picturesque river, lies Morado Park. College Hill has no distinct post-office, but mail is delivered every few hours from the main office in Beaver Falls.

The Committee appointed by the Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church to locate the College in Beaver Falls met in this city for the first time on the morning of July 31, 1879, and spent the forenoon in looking over the proposed site, then one mile and a quarter north of the center of the town. The Committee then organized by the election of Rev. R. J. George, Chairman, Prof. John Lynd, Secretary, and James R. McKee, Treasurer.

John Reeves, Esq., acting in behalf of the Economite or Harmony Society, graciously made a tender of ten acres of ground as a site for the College building, which was accepted with sincere thanks by the Committee. It was ascertained. however, that the subscription lacked \$2,400 of the amount named by Synod as a condition of removal, and the Committee could not act finally until these conditions were met. amount was made up by citizens of Beaver Falls and members of the Committee, and others present, and the deed of the ground was directed to be made to Synod's Board of Trustees. It is a warrantee deed, encumbered by no conditions only that it shall be used for the purpose named, and could not be alienated for a period of fifteen years. A Building Committee was 'appointed, and four or five competitive architects were to bid on the construction of the building. The plan of building adopted by the Committee combined in itself the elements of strength, beauty and convenience. The main College structure is of native stone, with brick partitions, three stories high, with a splendid basement. The building is 102 by 70 feet, and the extension back is 38 by 52 feet. It contains twelve recitation rooms, literary halls, reading room, library, and coat rooms. The chapel is capable of seating seven hundred persons, and contains a gallery. It is provided with all modern conveniences, and surrounded by a spacious campus well laid out and ornamented with shrubs, trees and flowers. The original cost of the main building was to be \$20,000, but on account of a rise in the cost of material and labor, and a failure upon the part of the original contractor, which caused a delay of nearly a year, the cost of the building was about \$35,000.

The building not being ready for occupancy at the opening of the College year in Sept. 1880, classes were held in the old building and basement of the R. P. Church in Beaver Falls, and elsewhere. Not until the opening of the College year in 1882, were the buildings and grounds fully occupied.

# GENERAL RULES FOR THE ORGANIZATION AND GOVERNMENT OF GENEVA COLLEGE.

#### CHAPTER I.

# The Government of the College.

- 1. The general government of the College shall be vested in the Board of Trustees.
- 2. The immediate government of the College shall be vested in the President, Vice President and Professors, styled the Faculty of the College.
- 3. The ultimate authority over the whole College, according to the provisions of the Charter, is inherent in the Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church.

#### CHAPTER II.

# The Board of Trustees.

- 1. The Board of Trustees shall consist of twelve members, four of whom shall be lay members, and the others ministers of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, and all the twelve residing in the vicinity of the College; and of a number, in addition, corresponding to the number of Presbyteries—one from each Presbytery. The President of the College shall also be ex officio a member of the Board.
- 2. The Board of Trustees, at present [1880] numbering twenty-two members, twelve resident and ten Presbyterial, shall in the first instance be elected by Synod, and in three classes, as follows: Four resident members and four Presbyterial members for three years; four resident members

and three Presbyterial members for two years; four resident members and three Presbyterial members for one year.

- 3. The Board shall henceforth be perpetuated in the following manner: It shall elect annually four (4) resident members, and as nearly as possible one-third of the Presbyteries shall elect in order one member each for a term of three (3) years.
- 4. The officers of the Board shall be a President, Secretary and Treasurer, to be elected by the Board, and to hold office at its pleasure.
- 5. It shall be the duty of the Board to elect or remove members of the Faculty of the College and Instructors, and to determine the amount of their salaries. They shall also decide who are professors and who are instructors, and how many there shall be of each.
- 6. The election of the members of the Board, of its permanent officers and of the members of the Faculty, shall be at the regular annual meeting of the Board.
- 7. The Board shall hold one stated regular annual meeting on, or as near as possible to, the day before each College Commencement. A special meeting may be called at any time by the President of the Board. At the written request of any five members of the Board, or at the written request of the President of the College, the President of the Board shall order a special meeting.
- 8. The Treasurer of the Board may, with the approval of the Board, appoint or hire such assistants as he may judge to be necessary for the details of the work of his position, and he shall report in writing at each stated annual meeting, the general condition of the finances, giving also a detailed account of all College funds, and of all receipts and expenditures for the past year.
- 9. There shall be an Executive or Prudential Committee of the Board, consisting of three members, elected annually at the stated regular meeting, who shall in the intervals of its meetings, represent and act for the Board, subject at all times to its laws and special instructions.
- 10. The Board shall appoint Examining Committees, who shall attend the examinations of the various classes of the College at the close of each term, and such Committees shall report to the Board.
- 11. The Board shall, on consultation with the Faculty, lay down rules concerning the admission and matriculation of students, courses of study, rates of tuition, examinations,

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commencement exercises, misdemeanors and punishments, societies, the library, degrees, and whatever else may require their action in the government of the College.

- 12. The Board shall appoint one of the Faculty librarian, who shall have charge of the library and reading room; another of the Faculty inspector, who shall have charge of the College grounds and buildings; and still another of the Faculty marshall, who shall regulate the external order of Commencement and other public exercises; the proposed action of these members of the Faculty in all cases to be subject to the approval of the whole Faculty of the College, and each of these officers to report annually to the Board.
- 13. The election or removal of any regular member of the Faculty shall be by a two-third vote of the members of the Board present at the stated annual meeting. The appointment or removal of Instructors, or the temporary suspension of a professor in case of serious charges against him, the temporary filling of his place, or the acceptance of the resignation of any member of the Faculty, may be attended to at any special meeting by a two-third vote of the members present.
- 14. The Board of Trustees shall present an annual report to Synod, giving a statement of the condition of the College, and an account of their own proceedings of the year, together with an exhibit of the finances, including receipts and disbursements—said report to be published in the Minutes of Synod. And in no case shall the annual expenditures exceed the annual income of the College.
- 15. Seven members of the Board shall constitute a quorum for any special meeting, and ten members shall be a quorum at a stated annual meeting.

#### CHAPTER III.

# The Faculty and Instructors.

- 1. The Faculty of the College shall consist of the President, the Vice President, and the Professors in the various departments. Instructors and special temporary lecturers or teachers shall not be members of the Faculty.
- 2. The President of the College shall have authority to convene the Faculty for business or advice whenever he may think it expedient, and shall preside at all meetings.
- 3. In any case of absence of the President, or of any other cause preventing him from so acting, the Vice President shall have full authority to act in his place.

- 4. The Faculty shall hold stated meetings as often as they judge best, and the President shall order a special meeting at the written request of any two members of the Faculty.
- 5. At the beginning of each collegiate year, it shall be the duty of the Faculty to appoint one of their number Secretary, who shall keep a record of all the proceedings to be submitted to the meeting of the Board of Trustees on the day before Commencement.
- 6. The Faculty shall have the authority to enforce the laws adopted by the Board of Trustees, and to adopt and enforce such other rules and regulations, not conflicting with the laws adopted by the Board, as they may judge necessary. They may also propose to the Board of Trustees any laws, or modification of laws, which they believe to be necessary or useful for the government of the College.
- 7. The choice of text books in the different departments, and the order of recitations and College exercises generally, shall be determined by the Faculty at their meetings, subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees.
- 8. If any member of the Faculty wishes to dissolve his connection with the College, he shall give three month's notice to the Board of Trustees; and, in case of his removal, he shall be entitled to three months' notice from the Board.
- 9. No member of the Faculty shall engage in any occupation or pursuit that would interfere with the stated, punctual and efficient discharge of any of the duties of his office, without permission of the Board of Trustees.
- 10. Every member of the Faculty, and every Instructor, immediately after the daily examination of each student shall record in a book kept for the purpose, the numerical value of such examination, according to a uniform scale agreed upon by the Faculty. In the same books shall also be recorded whatever cases there may be of absence or tardiness of students without sufficient excuse. And it shall be the duty of the Faculty to make out at the close of each term a report of the conduct and standing of each student, and send the same to the parents or guardian.
- 11. A majority of the members of the Faculty shall be a quorum at any meeting.

## CHAPTER IV.

#### A mendments.


This Constitution may be amended at any meeting of Synod.

In reference to the disposition of the property at Northwood, the Synod decided:—

- 1. That the notes given to the endowment by persons in the vicinity of Northwood, on condition that the College remain in that place, be returned to those who make this request.
- 2. That the Board of Education as connected with the College in Northwood, Ohio, be continued in existence until all business matters relating to the transfer of the College to Beaver Falls shall be fully accomplished, and that the Executive Committee of the Board be authorized to make a quitclaim deed to a Committee to be appointed by members of the Church at Northwood, of all the buildings then belonging to Synod, on condition that the Northwood Committee meet all the expenses afterwards accruing.
- 3. That the movable property of the College, such as the library, apparatus, etc., be removed to the College building at Beaver Falls, Pa.

The satisfactory completion of the College building was accomplished by Mr. William Pearce, an elder of First Beaver Falls congregation. A strenuous effort was made by Drs. George and McCartney to raise an adequate endowment fund, and they met with a cordial reception and received generous subscriptions in almost all parts of the Church. With many delays, disappointments, and the failure of some to meet their subscriptions, the building fund of the College was largely underestimated, and the cost greatly increased. The College was far separated from the town of Beaver Falls, and there were no connective pavements or means of transportation. Inadequate boarding and rooming facilities added to the discomfiture of many of the students, all of which were discouraging hindrances to the progress of the work in the College. In time these were overcome.

Another unexpected difficulty arose when application was made for a Charter. Under the new Constitution of Pennsylvania there could be no special arrangement made for the incorporation of the College according to the outline of the Board. This necessitated the modification of the aforementioned plan of organization. A Charter containing these modifications was prepared and finally granted by the Court, and ratified by Judge Hice of the Court of Beaver Co., Pa., June 18, 1883. [This Charter can be found recorded in full in the Records of Beaver Co., Pa., Charter Book No. I, page 329.] Under the provisions of the Charter the Board of Trustees met June 19, 1883, and organized by the election of



the Rev. Dr. J. R. W. Sloane, President; Rev. R. J. George, Secretary; and James R. McKee, Treasurer.

At the removal of the College to Beaver Falls in 1880, it was necessary to reconstruct the Faculty. President George and Prof. McCartney were the only Professors who came with the College to the new location. Rev. David McAllister of Walton, N. Y., was elected Professor of Political Science on the foundation of the endowment subscribed for that chair, Greek being added to this department. He was also elected Vice President of the College. While the salaries of the Professors were less than previously given, there was the promise of an increase when the receipts justified it.

Prof. William M. Milroy of Northwood, Ohio, was elected to the chair of the Latin language, but declined. of candidates appeared for the chair of Mathematics, and finally Edward P. Thompson of Biggsville, Ill., was chosen and accepted. James S. Stewart of New Castle, Pa., was chosen as teacher of Latin for the year. The establishment of the Normal and Musical Departments was postponed for a year on account of the Committee in charge failing to secure suitable Rooms in which to conduct the College were secured from the R. P. Church. An old frame building in the rear of the Church, and the use of the basement of the new structure, were secured for \$100 per year. The College formally opened in these rooms on the third Wednesday of September, 1880. On account of affliction in his family, Prof. McAllister was soon compelled to relinquish his work and return to his home in Walton, N. Y. Dr. Sloane delivered a series of lectures on Political Science, and Prof. James A. Ritchey, of Franklin College, Ohio, was chosen professor pro tem of Greek and English Literature. It was necessary to appoint a financial agent to collect the endowment funds, and Mr. John B. Jordan of Austintown, Ohio, was A loan was negotiated for the building so appointed. fund. Steps were taken to secure a Charter for the College. The completion of the endowment fund was left with President George, whose salary was raised on account of this extra work.

In 1881, Rev. John Lynd, of Belle Center, Ohio, a former Professor, was elected to the chair of Greek and English Literature; and the Rev. George Kennedy, of Northwood, Ohio, to the chair of Latin and Philosophy. Both declined.

Thomas H. Acheson and David G. Wylie were appointed agents to canvass the Sabbath Schools of the Church for funds

to furnish the new College building. Rev. W. Pollock Johnston, of Washington, Iowa, was elected to the chair of Latin and English Literature, and accepted. He was also appointed Vice President pro tem during the continued absence of Dr. McAllister. Prof. Thompson was chosen librarian. Miss Eva McClurkin, of New Concord, Ohio, was chosen as instructress of Music. Instruments were secured, and funds raised for their purchase. In conjunction with the City Council of Beaver Falls, the College authorities secured a better walk to their property.

During the year 1882, it was decided to establish a system of honors or rewards in order to encourage and recognize attainments in study. The tuition was raised from \$10.00 to \$12.00 per term, and a contingent fee of \$1.00 per term was required. Mrs. J. L. McCartney taught German during the year. Appropriations were made to the Mathematical and Scientific departments in order to increase the apparatus. Valuable additions were made to the library. Religious services were established in the College building. Prof. Johnston was appointed College pastor, to preach alternate Sabbaths with the other ministerial members of the Faculty. Mrs. Robertson, of Blair Beth, Scotland, donated one hundred pounds to the Department of Natural Science, and the Board directed its use under the supervision of Prof. McCartney. A few subscribers to the endowment were excused from the payment of their notes on the ground of inability.

Rev. George Kennedy, of Northwood, Ohio, was elected Professor of Greek, and Miss Mary E. Milligan, a recent graduate, Superintendent of the Female Department. Both accepted. An effort was made with the Economite Society to secure an addition to the College grounds on the southern side of the property. A Committee was appointed by the Board to make an effort to raise a company for the purpose of erecting a suitable boarding house in proximity to the College. The College lost a true friend and generous donor by the death of Dr. Samuel A. Sterrett of Pittsburgh.

In 1883, much inconvenience and some difficulty was experienced in the unsatisfactory heating apparatus placed in the College by a Pittsburgh firm. Payment being withheld, suit was entered, but a settlement was effected by a partial payment and the withdrawal of the heaters.

The pledge of the citizens of Beaver Falls for \$800.00, to meet the conditions for the locating of the College in their midst, was not fulfilled, and a Committee was appointed to confer with the representatives of such subscribers.

A strenuous effort was now made to increase the endowment fund by \$100,000. Mr. John Hunter, of Sterling Valley, N. Y., proposed to give \$25,000 on condition that the total endowment be \$100,000. Dr. Samuel A. Sterrett, of Pittsburgh, had given \$5,000 before his death; and his widow, out of the sale of a valuable property, donated \$10,000 to this fund. Others who gave \$5,000 each were John A. McKee of Pittsburgh; David Gregg of Allegheny; Andrew Alexander and Thomas E. Greacen of New York. The Secretary of the Board, with true and appreciative vision, said of the above benefactors: "When the history of Geneva College is written these names will be woven into it like a thread of gold." And the historian would add the names of Drs. R. J. George, A. M. Milligan, J. R. W. Sloane, David McAllister, H. H. George and J. L. McCartney to the list of those who deserve unstinted praise and merited recognition for their self-sacrificing labors in establishing Geneva College at Beaver Falls, and also in providing an adequate endowment that she might not be encumbered by debt. Although we are now distant some twenty-five years from those days of anxiety and toil, a true sense of appreciation is still outgoing to those who made the permanent establishment of the College possible. During the first five or six years of the College at Beaver Falls, the work was laborious and attended with some discouragements. attendance of students did not reach over one hundred and twenty-five, and the lack of means was an annoying hindrance to the enlargement of the work. The failure of the original contractor, the unsatisfactory conditions of the heating plant—all caused anxiety and occasioned additional expense. In 1883 the College building was completed by Mr. William Pearce, and he received the hearty thanks of the The sum of his outlays was \$29,853.61.

When the Charter was obtained, in 1883, there was the creation of a Board of Corporators, which chose the Board of Trustees. The original Incorporators were twenty-five in number, and represented the various Presbyteries of the Church. The original Trustees were twelve in number, and all resided near the College.

Dr. McAllister entered fully upon the duties of Professor of Political Science and Rhetoric in the fall of 1883. Prof. Kennedy taught German. A regular course was established in Music, and a diploma awarded at graduation. There was also a desirable re-adjustment of branches to be taught, and an increase of salaries for the Professors. A new steam heat-

ing apparatus was installed at a cost of \$3,500. The Laboratory equipments were largely increased and a nominal fee charged for their use.

In 1884, Mr. Andrew Carnegie made a donation of standard scientific and literary works worth at least \$1,000.00. A bell was secured for the main College building. A code of By Laws for the government of the Board of Corporators and Board of Trustees was adopted. In 1885, endowment notes to the amount of \$605.00 were returned to the subscribers, as they were made on condition that the College would remain in Northwood. The College and Church lost another valuable friend and heroic defender in the death of Rev. Dr. A. M. Milligan of Pittsburgh. Suitable action was taken by the The chair of Mental and Moral Science is in his memory, and that of Political Philosophy in memory of Dr. S. A. Sterrett. Miss Mary E. Milligan resigned the Superintendency of the Ladies' Department, and was succeeded by Miss Mary R. Bunn of the High School of Allegheny, Pa. The College Chapel was exquisitely frescoed. In 1886, the first doctorate degrees were conferred upon Rev. James Kennedy of New York City, and Rev. Josiah Chancellor of Belfast. Ireland. A small telescope was purchased and installed. Another severe loss was sustained by the College in the death of Rev. Dr. J. R. W. Sloane, March 6, 1886. He was President of the College at Northwood, Ohio, 1852-1856, and had been President of the Board of Trustees since 1880. Dr. Sloane was an eminent scholar and profound theologian, and had been Professor of Theology in the Allegheny Seminary since 1868.

In February, 1887, the Chapel was unroofed by a storm. The College discipline had always been watchful and dignified, but the authorities had a difficult case to deal with in 1887. Four prominent students had been suspended for committing depredations and destroying College property. Proof was at first difficult. Upon the fullest investigation the Faculty was sustained in its action of suspension by the Board of Trustees. The students were subsequently re-instated by acknowledging their complicity, confessing the wrong of it, and paying the damages. They were all members of the Senior Class, and the episode perturbed the peace of the College community for some time.

The Board of Trustees were desirous of borrowing from Synod's Board of Trustees a sufficient amount of funds in their hands for investment to erect a suitable Dormitory. It was resolved that any monies over and above the \$100,000.00 of new endowment that have been given with the expressed wish of the donors that they be used for Dormitory purposes, be thus appropriated. It was also proposed to form a Stock Company having eighty shares of \$50.00 each, interest bearing and redeemable at the pleasure of the Board. A Committee drew up a plan of corporation.

Prof. J. L. McCartney having resigned the chair of Natural Science, was made professor-emeritus. Prof. W. C. Gorman of Waterford. Pa., was elected to this chair. A prominent Trustee entered his dissent against the election of so many Professors outside of the R. P. Church. Out of respect to his wishes the election was withdrawn, and a Committee appointed to select candidates within the bounds of the R. P. or U. P. Churches. The salary of President George was raised \$300 annually. The office of College pastor was abandoned. Rev. Robert H. Abraham, a Presbyterian minister of Birmingham, Ontario, Canada, was elected Professor of Natural Sciences, but declined. Rev. S. J. Crowe was elected Financial Agent. The Board of Trustees made a subscription of \$100.00 to the proposed Hospital on College Hill. Shares to the amount of \$3,550 were subscribed for the new Dormitory, and orders were given for the erection of a suitable building on the College grounds. Miss McClurkin resigned the position as Instructor in Music. Prof. Samuel B. Wylie of Bloomington, Ind., was elected to the chair of Natural Science, and accepted. Rev. Prof. David McAllister resigned the chair of Political Science to accept a pastorate in Pittsburgh. Johnston was chosen Vice President of the College in his stead. A Committee drew up lengthy rules defining the duties and responsibilities of Professors and students. William J. Coleman of Utica, Ohio, was elected Professor of Political Science, and accepted. Prof. F. E. Cluff, of Boston, Mass., was chosen instructor in the Musical Department.

In 1888, a Gymnasium was erected upon the College grounds, and equipped with all modern appliances. An appropriation of \$300.00 was made for the Library. The Preparatory Department was organized into an Academical Department distinct from the College, but under the same control, and under the supervision of a Principal. \$8,000.00 were raised by a Stock Company and loan for the erection and furnishing of the Dormitory, which was now completed and under the care of Mrs. Letitia Dodds as matron. The College was being well manned by efficient Professors; suitable and

well equipped buildings were being erected, and an encouraging attendance of promising students made the outlook hopeful. In their annual report for 1888 the Board says: "The star of Geneva is in the ascendant. She does not move with the flash of the meteor or sweep the skies with the flaming tail of the comet, but pursues her course regularly from year to year as the planets in their orbits, and shines with the soft steady light of the fixed stars. Her bands are as the bands of Orion, and they grow stronger and stronger; and her sweet influences as of Pleiades are extending wider and wider. May the Star of Bethlehem ever be her central Sun, and her mission be to reflect His light into all this dark world."

Prof. Reuben Frazer, of Montgomery, N. Y., accepted the Principalship of the newly organized Academical Department, in 1888. After one year's most acceptable service he returned to his former position of Principal of the Montgomery Academy. In 1889, it was a cause of great satisfaction to the friends of the College when the Board reported that all financial burdens had been lifted and that the current expenses had been fully met by the income from the tuition and endowment. The Alumni Association was permanently organized, and delegates from this body were admitted to the deliberations and counsels of the Board of Trustees as consultative members. The Librarian gave a most satisfactory account of the condition and contents of the College library, reporting one thousand seven hundred and eighty-three volumes on the shelves, and a large number of popular magazines and papers on the tables of the Reading Room. A fine large portrait of Rev. Dr. A. M. Milligan was presented to the College by Mr. John Tibby of Pittsburgh, and hangs upon the wall of the Chapel as a tribute to his interest in the College.

Prof. Newton C. Long, a recent graduate of the College, was elected Principal of the Academical Department; and Rev. C. H. Brelos, a pastor of Beaver Falls, as Instructor in German.

President George sent the following communication to the Board of Trustees:

"BEAVER FALLS, PA., Aug. 19, 1889.
To the Board of Trustees of Geneva College,

Gentlemen:-

I hereby notify you that I will tender my resignation as President of the College sometime during this year. I have been suffering with nervous debility since January

last, and the advice of a skilled physician is that I should not longer attempt to carry the responsibility of the position. For this, and other reasons, I will present it to you in time for you to make provision for the next year.

H. H. GEORGE."

The letter was received, placed on record and filed.

A number of handsome subscriptions were made this year to the endowment fund, in addition to those already noted. Among these donors were Henry O'Neill of New York, \$5,000; David Torrens of New York, \$5,000; John Hunter of Sterling Valley, N. Y., \$5,000; James R. McKee of Pittsburgh, Pa., \$2,000; John D. Carson of Pittsburgh, Pa., \$1,000; Samuel McNaugher of Allegheny, Pa., \$1,000; Rev. R. J. George of Beaver Falls, Pa., \$500. Several notes had been paid and claims settled. Arrangements and conditions were made by which the degrees of Master of Arts and Master of Science were to be conferred.

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees, Feb. 24, 1800, the resignation of President George was accepted. Among a series of complimentary resolutions passed by the Board we quote: "Resolved, That we make grateful recognition of the faith and courage which enabled Dr. George eighteen years ago to take hold of our Institution by accepting his present position when the College had no endowment and few students. As we contrast the condition of our College then with its present wealth and prestige, we heartily accord to President George the honor of being the pioneer and prominent among many noble and greatly honored workers who labored faithfully and long in securing our beautiful buildings and large endowment. We also recognize the excellencies of Dr. George as a teacher of marked ability. He has strong natural gifts and enlarged experience, and by control in his recitation room he maintains good deportment in his classes." The Board also expressed confidence and approval of his administration of discipline, and sympathy with him in his affliction. largely signed petition was presented by the students requesting the Board not to accept Dr. George's resignation. Rev. John Knox McClurkin, D.D., Professor in the Allegheny Theological Seminary, was chosen President to succeed Dr. George. Dr. McClurkin declined the position. Rev. William Pollock Johnston, Professor of Latin, was then elected President, and accepted the high and responsible office. He was formally inaugurated amid appropriate ceremonies on September 3, 1890. Other changes took place in the personnel of the Faculty, as follows:

Prof. E. P. Thompson resigned the chair of Mathematics. and Prof. Newton C. Long was chosen to this position. William M. Milroy was elected to the chair of Latin; William McCracken to that of Natural Science; James S. Martin as Principal of the Academical Department; and Charles O. Bemies as Instructor in Athletics and in charge of the Gymnasium. Early in 1891 the College suffered a great loss in the death of Prof. Long. Prof. William H. Wilson of Hastings College, Neb., was chosen as Professor of Mathematics. The Department of Physical Culture was established with Prof. Bemies in charge. Prof. Cluff resigned the control of the Musical Department. Rev. and Mrs. D. C. Martin of Allegheny, Pa., presented an elegant piano for use in the Gymnasium. Prof. W. M. Sloane, of Princeton University, presented a fine portrait of his father, the Rev. Dr. J. R. W. Sloane; and Mrs. Callie Cash of St. Clairsville, Ohio, presented a similar portrait of her father, the Rev. Dr. J. B. Johnston, the first President of Geneva College. These were hung upon the Chapel walls. Mr. John Tibby, of Pittsburgh, made valuable additions to the library.

During the year 1891, the Reformed Presbyterian Church was agitated and disturbed by the exercise of discipline which resulted in the loss of many ministers and members. The Board says of these experiences: "It is most gratifying that the vexatious questions disturbing the peace of the Church have not been permitted to break in upon the quiet Academic shades of our Literary Institution."

In 1892, Prof. Brelos resigned the position of Instructor in German, and Miss Grace P. Moorhead, of the Class of '91, was chosen to fill the vacancy. Arrangements were made by which free yearly scholarships were offered to the honor graduates of High Schools in the larger towns of Western Pennsylvania and Eastern Ohio, which were to be for one year only and non-assignable.

Prof. W. J. Coleman resigned the chair of Political Science, and accepted a call to Allegheny, Pa. Rev. Richard C. Wylie of Wilkinsburgh, Pa., was chosen to this position, but declined. The Board and College were called upon again to mourn the loss by death of two faithful and generous Trustees—David Gregg and John A. McKee of Allegheny. President Johnston also passed through a severe ordeal in the loss by death of two of his children. James M. Coleman.

of the Class of '87, was chosen Professor of Political Science. Prof. J. S. Martin resigned the Principalship of the Academical Department. His sister, Miss Margaret J. Martin, so acceptably filled the unexpired term that she was elected to the position, and remained for one year.

In 1893, John B. White, a graduate of '85, and Principal of the Academy of Chestnut Level, Pa., was elected Principal of the Academical Department. Miss Kendig resigned as teacher of Music and Elocution. On Jan. 27, 1893, James R. McKee of Pittsburgh, another trusted friend and liberal supporter of the College, passed to his reward. Mention is made of the death of these Trustees because they were strong pillars upholding the College. For the year, German was assigned to Prof. White. Rev. Dr. R. J. George, who had efficiently and faithfully served as Secretary of the Board of Trustees for fifteen years, resigned. Rev. J. Renwick Wylie was chosen Secretary.

In 1894, Prof. Bemies resigned as head of the Physical Culture Department, and T. David McCloskey was chosen in his stead, and also as Principal of the Academical Department made vacant by the resignation of Prof. White. Miss Grace P. Moorhead was chosen teacher of the German and French languages.

The Conservatory of Music and Oratory recently established under the care of the Misses Winn. Waddle and Heath, attracted more than usual attention and greatly added to the number of students, the total number during the year being 245. The standard of education was advanced, and a system of grading adopted which placed the College on a plane with the best Institutions. The missionary spirit among the students, and the tone of spirituality about the College, had been encouragingly increased by special meetings, addresses and organizations.

In 1895, the Geneva Company (Limited), which erected the Dormitory, becoming involved in debt for the same, were solicited individually to surrender their claims and interest in the Company to the Board of Corporators of the College. An appropriation was made for the repair and improvement of the College chapel, and also for the enlargement of the work of the Conservatory of Music. On account of special privileges enjoyed by Colleges holding their Charters under a recent act of Legislatures, it was agreed to so amend the Charter of Geneva College that she might enjoy equal advantages with other Institutions in Pennsylvania. President

Johnston was authorized to raise funds for the erection of a Science Hall, which project was successfully accomplished during the year 1896, at a cost of \$8,000. Large additions were made to the Library, and a system of circulating books and literature was successfully adopted. Funds were obtained for the purchase of ground for an Athletic Field.

In 1896, Prof. McCloskey resigned the Principalship of the Academical Department and Physical Culture, and J. Herbert Morton was chosen to the position. For several years a successful Summer Normal School was conducted in the College. In July, 1896, the Board placed upon their minutes a testimonial to John R. McBurney, who had recently deceased, and had been a valuable Trustee and generous contributor to the College. The curriculum of the College was re-adjusted by adding a year to the course in the Preparatory Department, and making some changes in the Scientific course. The practicability of establishing a Commercial Department was considered for some time. Prof. William McCracken was granted a leave of absence to prosecute his studies in one of the leading Universities, and Archibald H. McCracken, his brother, was substituted in the Natural Science Department.

In 1897, Miss May E. Faris was elected an assistant in the Academic Department. In 1899, A. Theodore Smith, of the University of Cincinnati, became Principal of the Academical Department and teacher of Rhetoric; Charles B. Phillis, Instructor in Chemistry, and Charles C. Arbuthnot, Instructor in History.

Some abuses that had crept into the popular game of foot ball, principally the custom of hiring players who were not students, were removed. Some other harmful features were also eliminated. At the fiftieth anniversary of the first commencement in 1899, there was a large and representative gathering of students and friends of the Institution. An increase of \$1.00 was made to the tuition fee. In 1900, several changes were made in the teaching force. Prof. William H. Wilson resigned the chair of Mathematics, and Rev. Robert I. McIsaac, Principal of Knox Academy, Selma, Ala., was chosen to fill the position. Prof. McCracken having resigned the chair of Natural Science, Prof. Benjamin C. Barnard was elected to this position. George A. Baldwin was an Instructor in the Academic Department, and Miss Florence V. Aiken most acceptably filled the Principalship of the new Department of Art.

In 1901, Prof. Smith was succeeded by George M. Johnston in the Academic Department, and from this time on several Assistants have been employed in the Laboratory, Library and Departments of History and Rhetoric. The Conservatory of Music was enlarged by employing Instructors in various lines of instrumentation and voice culture.

In 1903, Prof. Milroy was assisted in the Department of Latin by Prof. McIsaac, and Otto F. H. Bert was chosen Professor of Mathematics. The chair of Natural Science having been vacated, Prof. S. A. Sterrett Smith, of Indiana University, was elected to this position. Several minor changes were made among the Instructors. In 1904, Prof. McIsaac was transferred to the Department of Mental Philosophy.

During the years 1906 and 1907. President Johnston received leave of absence for a part of the time to devote himself to the difficult task of raising the endowment to \$200,000 and thereby secure a generous donation from Mr. Andrew Carnegie. In this work he was surprisingly successful, and will long be remembered for his devotion to the interests of the College. Not only the increased endowment, but the magnificent buildings that adorn the College campus, are monuments to the indefatigable efforts of President Johnston.

During the year 1907, some problems arose with reference to the work of the College. For some years there were those in the Church who objected to the extent to which Athletics had been encouraged, and especially the manner in which Rugby foot ball was played. For a time the wishes of these people were granted, and the game was not permitted. But those who opposed the game did not increase their interest in the College, while students were diverted from it on account of the ban. In a modified form the game has been restored. In some cases, it was alleged, members of the Board of Trustees did not devote the time or give the attention to the interests of the College which the conditions demanded. One or two Professors had leave of absence, and altogether the Board of Trustees deemed a re-organization of the Faculty necessary. They asked for the resignations of the Professors in order that the work of the reconstruction of the teaching force might be accomplished. Most of the Professors resigned, and many were re-elected. President Johnston also offered his resignation, but the Board urged that it should not take effect for one year. Dr. Johnston, however, insisted upon its immediate acceptance that he might be relieved o the responsibilities of the office, and devote himself for the

year to the completion of the endowment fund and to the work of soliciting students. Dr. Johnston's resignation was then accepted, and he was made President emeritus. Rev. William Henry George, of Vernon, Wis., youngest son of ex-President Dr. H. H. George, was chosen to the Presidency. Of these men, and the changes, the Board says: "Geneva College has attained a high degree of success during the administration of the Rev. W. P. Johnston, D.D., LL.D., its worthy President. His gentle manners won the hearts of the students. Many young people have been inspired to a high and noble life by his words, counsel and example. Through his efforts Science Hall was erected. All the new endowment that has been secured was through his labors. The field now used for Athletics, owned by the College, is due to his faith and energy. He has borne the responsibilities of Geneva through times of trouble. The students who have gone from the College love Dr. Johnston. When he canvassed for money he made friends by his gentleness and courtesy. His character commands the admiration of the Church and the people of the vicinity of the College, and he is honored wherever he is known.

Rev. W. Henry George is the son of the Rev. H. H. George, D.D., who for eighteen years was the efficient President of Geneva. He is the pastor of the Vernon congregation, Wisconsin. He graduated at Geneva, Harvard, the Allegheny Theological Seminary, and took a post-graduate course in the Princeton Theological Seminary, and from the latter place received the degree of Master of Arts. In all these places of learning he was respected by students and professors. He is a scholar, and we believe that he possesses those qualities of heart and judgment, and also has that Christian character, that will make him a great power for good in the College and in the Church. He is young in years but mature in judgment, and we believe that he lives near to Christ; and we know that, with the Divine blessing, he will succeed. We ask that he may have the loyal support of the Church."

The reconstructed and re-organized Faculty of 1907 was composed of the following Professors:

Rev. William Henry George, M.A., President, and Professor of Mental and Moral Science.

Rev. George Kennedy, D.D., Vice President, and Professor of the Greek Language and Literature.

William M. Milroy, M.A., Ph.D., Professor of the Latin Language and Literature.

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Rev. Robert J. McIsaac, B.A., Professor of Mental Philosophy and English.

S. A. Sterrett Smith, B.A., Professor of the Natural

Sciences

Robert C. Colwell, B.A., Professor of Mathematics.

Miss Gyla A. McDowell, Teacher of English, and Preceptress of the Dormitory.

Miss Janette E. Crowe, A.B., Teacher of French and German.

Miss Frances E. Waddle, Director of Music and Instructor on the Piano.

Miss Dora M. Conlin, Instructor on Stringed Instruments. Prof. William R. Gardner, Instructor in Vocal Music.

Miss E. Pearl Howe, Instructor in Oratory.

Miss Ava M. Allen, Instructor in Art.

Several Assistants and Tutors were employed as the necessities required.

An effort was made to collect a complete file of the Catalogues, and also of the volumes of the College Cabinet. While there was a reconstruction of the Faculty, there was also some change in the personnel and officers of the Board of Trustees. Rev. J. Renwick Wylie, after fourteen years of faithful service, resigned as Secretary of the Board of Trustees, and the Rev. Renwick H. Martin was chosen to this position. Rev. Alexander Kilpatrick, D. D., who for eighteen years had most graciously and efficiently presided over the Board, was succeeded by the Rev. Richard C. Wylie, D. D. distinct Committees were formed as follows: Faculty and Curriculum. 2. On Grounds and Buildings. On Finance. Fire escapes were adjusted about the College buildings. New boilers were provided for the heating apparatus in the Main Building and Science Hall. The President's room was refurnished and equipped, and other rooms were renovated. These repairs amounted to \$3.500, and involved the current account in some temporary debt. New rules and regulations were made governing all the officers and professors of the College.

In 1908, still further changes were made. Prof. J. M. Coleman resigned the chair of Political Science, and it is filled by President George. Prof. Smith resigned the chair of Natural Science, and Prof. Robert M. Barrus of Keuka College, New York, fills this professorship. Miss Jennie E. Crowe resigned the position of German and French, and Miss Helen E. McClintock has been chosen as her successor. George C.

Wertz is continued in charge of Athletics and the Gymnasium. Miss McDowell takes the chair of English, and will assume the title of "Dean of Women" in the Dormitory. The Literary Societies are under the direct oversight of the Faculty. The new departments of History and Biblical Literature are under Prof. McIsaac. The College has assumed control of the Summer School as a Teachers' Training Department. A new course known as the Latin Scientific has been added to the curriculum. Prof. George Ordahl has been elected to the new department of Psychology and Pedagogy, and Prof. William C. Purdy, Instructor in Biology, Botany and Geology.

The present policy of the new administration is in advance of any plan yet adopted by the College, and involves some radical changes which give more elasticity to the curriculum and offer larger opportunities for elective work.

Extra class work in the advanced studies is now obtainable, while individual research and extensive writing constitute a part of the recitations required. The whole round of student life is amply provided for and jealously safe-guarded. Geneva College is well equipped for her work, with adequate and suitable buildings and an endowment of \$200,000. educational Institution is more beautifully located, and combines with its unsurpassed residential attractions that atmosphere of culture and refinement which characterizes the most popular College towns. College Hill is also conveniently connected by electric lines with Morado Park on the north, and the thriving young cities of Beaver Falls, New Brighton, Beaver, Rochester, Freedom and Conway on the south and east. Situated but twenty-eight miles from the great city of Pittsburgh, and with two splendidly equipped railroads thither, special opportunities are enjoyed by these advantages.

Geneva College has always possessed a distinctively Christian character, and has sought to mould the moral nature, develop the mental faculties, and train the physical powers. There is no better or safer educational Institution for young people, where the instruction so well qualifies her students for the various activities of life.

#### CHAPTER XI.

#### THE LAST VISIT TO NORTHWOOD.

A recent visit to the now quaint yet homey town of Northwood, with a stroll about the old College grounds and through the antique structure, was full of interest but tinged with sadness. Truly her glory has departed, but the days primeval have not been forgotten!

As we approached the village by way of the turnpike from Belle Center, and emerged from the woods upon Samuel P. Johnston's farm, the old College building loomed up on the distant hillock like a lonely sentinel. As we turned to the left past the old water-mill, and up the slight hill past the U. P. Church to the College structure, we realized that the shades of Academia were falling about us. The sighing of the autumn wind, as it sangits requiem through the extant locusts of the campus, lent its note of sadness to the already solemn occasion. When we crossed the dusty portals, where the feet of many great men have trodden, and ascended the creaking stairway that had not been startled for many a day, we were impressed with the desecration and dilapidation of the College building. Its once hallowed walls were shamefully disfigured by writing, and the pews in the once sacred Chapel were marred by the cutting into them of names and initials. And yet amid the apparent sacrilege, one could not refrain from believing that many of those seeming mutilators had since written their names high upon the scroll of fame, and carved for themselves a more enduring character.

A stroll through the various class rooms recalled days of study and sacrifice upon the part of students and professors. Upon the third floor, west end, were located the once brilliant and crowded literary halls—now a heap of ruins. The figured carpet, the pillared paper, the flickering lamps—are all faded and extinguished! The echo of those enchanting songs and inspiring dissertations still fell upon the ear, stirred the heart, and refreshed the mind. Men who have subsequently orated from the statesman's forum, preached from the sacred pulpit, or taught from the professor's chair, received their first incentives for higher and nobler service in those classic halls!

A walk up the deserted street to the eastern end of the village revealed but few changes except those wrought by time. The Female Seminary building, however, has been reduced from the original three-storied structure to a modest dwelling house. The halls and parlors of this once coveted assemblage place were the scene of social functions, where, amid gaiety and mirth, young love was nurtured and sometimes instantaneously matured. The locust and pine trees in the spacious grounds bear mute testimony to the life and glory of the past. And who can be so ungrateful as to forget those roads that met, forked, and angled so near the Seminary, suggestive of the thought that the two young people. who agreed, could walk together down those dusky dusty highways on nights of the full moon, or even when luna failed to appear! With no lights above save a few silvery stars: with no lights below save in McGlade's corner; with no watchman save the image of the man in the moon (or the vigils of Peppers), the whole wide world was at the student's bidding upon such occasions!

A visit was also made to the old churchyard down on the creek, where the first kirk of the Covenanters stood. This is sacred ground. Here rest the remains of father, and mother. and sisters—waiting the sound of the resurrection trumpet. As we read familiar names upon the imperishable marble. and called to mind those endeared to us of the past, tears unbidden coursed down the cheeks. Turning away from the sepulchres of a former generation along another road past the College building and away from the village of Northwood, we could not repress the thought that the cheery, sunny, youthful College days are truly gone! The heart-inspiring songs have died away! Familiar faces have somehow disappeared! Redolent memories are fast fading! Soon we will all reach "the great divide." What visions of the beyond? Shall we see the King in His beauty in the land of far distances? A compensative thought for the evident changes of time may be found in this—that in the face of Jesus Christ, and by companionship in Him, a re-union of friends is possible where knowledge is perfect and separation unknown.

Upon the removal of the old College bell to the belfry of the United Miami Covenanter Church, in 1901, the following poem was written by Dr. Charles S. Herron, of '62, and published in the *Bellefontaine Examiner*. Poetically and figuratively we are glad to hear its familiar voice once more. 15.

#### RELIGIOUS ORGANIZATIONS.

Geneva College was founded to promote true Christian education, and every branch of study is taught in the light of the Christian religion. The Bible has always found a fundamental place in the curriculum, and a chair has been established in Political Philosophy to emphasize the nation's duty to God and His royal Son, and to propogate the truth that the Bible should be the fundamental law of all lifecivic, ecclesiastical or individual. Not only have Chapel exercises been conducted every morning, but a weekly prayer meeting which all the students are expected to attend. Attendance upon the services of some Church upon the Sabbath day is the rule, and a Bible class has usually been conducted in the Chapel by one of the Professors every Sabbath morning. While meetings for Christian fellowship, and informal organizations for religious work, have existed from time to time, no practical or definite organization for distinctive Christian work was effected until 1882.

THE MISSION UNION.—In March, 1882, the "Mission Union" was organized to awaken an interest among students in Missions and to read missionary literature. The officers of this organization were Harry W. Temple, President; Miss Eva McClurkin, Recording Secretary; Mrs. C. R. McCartney, Corresponding Secretary; Joseph W. McNaugher, Treasurer. For a few years this organization accomplished a good work in stimulating an interest in missions in general.

THE YOUNG MEN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.—In the fall of 1890, Prof. Bemies organized a "Young Men's Christian Association," which continues as an educative factor in the religious life of the students. The first officers were: Charles O. Bemies, President; Robert M. Blackwood, Vice President; James W. Stott, Recording Secretary; T. M. David McCloskey, Corresponding Secretary; James McCune, Treasurer. All these offices have been filled annually by a distribution of the honor and responsibility among the members of the Association.

The Young Women's Christian Association.—In 1893, the young ladies were organized into a similar Association, and have accomplished an equally valuable work in religious

culture and practical Christianity. The first officers were Miss Edith O'Neill, President; Miss Margaret E. Love, Recording Secretary; Miss Jennie M. McConaughy, Corresponding Secretary; Miss Jennie S. Duncan, Treasurer. Comfortable and convenient rooms have been furnished for both these Associations, and they are recognized as an important adjunct in the religious life of the College.

THE VOLUNTEER MISSION BAND.—In the autumn of 1893 a number of students consecrated themselves to the work of Missions in foreign lands, and pledged themselves to enter upon it when their collegiate or theological education was completed. They associated themselves together in "The Volunteer Mission Band" and were officially connected with the organization of the National and International Movement. The first officers were William P. McGarey, President; J. Herbert Morton, Secretary; Walter McCarroll, Treasurer.

The Mission Study Class.—In 1903, a "Mission Study Class" was organized, of which Joseph B. C. Mackie was the first Chairman. As its name suggests it is for the study of the subject of Missions, and to obtain an intelligent understanding of the fields, their needs and workers. Through these various organizations, lives and money have been consecrated and given for the great work of evangelization in home lands and missionary operations in foreign countries. Geneva College is largely and effectively represented by workers in foreign lands and under the Boards of different denominations, and thus one great primal purpose of her establishment is being accomplished.

## THE LITERARY SOCIETIES.

The history of the Literary Societies of Geneva College is involved in some obscurity. The earliest records are lost, and the memories of the earliest students are somewhat imperfect. But if two negatives make a positive, we are still in possession of some reasonably reliable and interesting facts. Inasmuch as there have been but two Societies, unchangeable in name for thirty-six years, the history of the literary work of the College will be given under these extant and euphonious appellations.

#### THE ALETHEORIAN LITERARY SOCIETY.

In April, 1849, one year after the establishment of Geneva College, two literary societies were organized—the "Aletheorian" and the "Philo-Christomatheon." For two years they flourished and then floundered. There were two potent factors which demanded a consolidation in 1851. The students of the Theological Seminary were members of the Societies until this date, but when this religious adjunct suspended operations, the number of members was somewhat reduced. Still a better reason for the union. In 1851, the Female Seminary was established distinct from the College. and the young ladies formed a Lyceum or Society of their own, known as the "Partheno Kosmean Literary Society of Geneva Female Seminary." For these two reasons it was deemed expedient, if not necessary, to consolidate the two original societies under the suggestive name "The Union Literary Society." This organization continued uninterruptedly until the suspension of the College in 1860.

A few facts concerning the Society of the Female Seminary may be of interest. There lies before me a neatly printed address of the Hon. William Lawrence, of Bellefontaine, Ohio, delivered before the Partheno Kosmean Literary Society of Geneva Female Seminary, March 23, 1853, on "The Claims of Female Education Founded on the Duties and Responsibilities of American Women." It is a scholarly production, and doubtless was as eloquently delivered as we have heard the Honorable Judge acquit himself upon subsequent occasions at the College. The correspondence on the first page of this pamphlet is as follows:

Miss Canby is dead years ago. Miss Johnston is now Mrs. J. S. T. Milligan of Pittsburgh, Pa., and Miss Pollock is now Mrs. R. F. Howard of Morgantown, W. Va. This Society also continued in name and efficiency until the work of the Institution was suspended about the time of the war of the rebellion.

The exercises of the Union Society were held in the South room, lower floor, of the original five-roomed College building. The room was fitted up according to the best style of that day. In 1853, they occupied a larger hall in the third floor. Let us quietly enter the classic auditorium and note the furnishings. The floor was laid with a splendid ingrain carpet. I. S. T. Milligan and J. M. Dickson (both living) were appointed a Committee to repair to the neighboring town of Hunstville to purchase said carpet. They employed the only citizen of Northwood who possessed a two horse spring wagon, to convey them tenderly and safely to the textile establishment. On the return trip the driver had occasion to give the team a sudden and sharp cut with the whip, and either the forwardness of the steeds, or the backwardness of the seat. or a conspiracy of both, caused the aforementioned Committee and carpet to be instantaneously deposited upon one of the muddiest roads of the Buckeye State, to the despoiling of the cargo and the filling of the atmosphere with expletives that are not now found in theological lore. But the carpet was saved and laid, and resaved and relaid, for some thirty years!

The walls of the hall were embossed with a large pillardesigned paper evidently copied from some Athenian temple. The windows were festooned with huge Venetian blinds, the falling of whose verdant slats resembled an earthquake and endangered the 8 x 10 window panes. A platform in the north-west corner of the room supported the officers, and a similar one in the opposite corner served as a rostrum for the performers. The furniture consisted of huge walnut arm chairs, a larger one being reserved for the President. rude wooden pillars, upon either side of dainty steps, were placed phosgene lamps of oriental design; and along the walls were sparsely distributed pyrophorus utensils whose flickering rays were conveniently dim for the enjoyment of cooing couples, and the protection of unprepared performers. Between these "side lights" were hung paintings "Italian Landscape" or a "Storm at Sea."

The Society met every Friday evening. Officers were elected every six weeks. The members were originally di-

vided into two main classes—one for declamation and the other for essay. The censor and two critics chose four members for debate, and assigned the side of the argument they were to support. Open or public meetings were frequently held, when everybody enjoyed the humorous paper except the subjects of ridicule. Grave and weighty questions were debated. Many stars were discovered in the literary sky, and as one differs from another in glory, some of the most brilliant should be constellated. W. H. Jeffers was noted for his deep and elongated reasoning. J. M. Armour for his philosophical and metaphysical essays, having struck the keynote of his College life with a production on "It's a Queer World, Ham!" J. M. Johnston and T. M. Elder were recognized among the best declaimers. J. Renwick Johnston, Isaac A. Jordan, Armour M. Carnahan and William Aiken were noted as comic speakers. D. J. Shaw, J. S. T. Milligan, N. M. Johnston and Matthew Wilkin were renowned as debaters. Doubtless in after years there were those equal or superior upon the forum, but these members of the original society deserve mention. During the Strang administration (1862-'64) there is no evidence of an organized Society, although literary exercises were conducted. In 1865, under the administration of Rev. N. R. Johnston, a Society known as the "Æsthetic" was organized, and met in the same "furnished room." It continued for five years. In the catalogue for 1867 we find the following: "The Æsthetic Literary Society, in connection with the College, is in a flourishing condition. The hall is large and commodious, and furnished in a neat and elegant manner. There is a library in connection with it, and we hope the friends of education will aid them by donations of books and money. There is another hall to be appropriated to a second Literary Society as soon as the Faculty shall consider its location necessary." September, 1868, a second Society must have been deemed necessary, as this marks the date of the organization of the "Philomath." Its existence cannot be justified in view of subsequent events. The Æsthetic claimed squatter's right to the "furnished room," and as the Philomath had neither a staked homestead nor the stakes to furnish one, a threatened uprising was evaded by the Faculty decreeing the consolidation of the two, which was accomplished Oct. 7, 1870.

The unifying effect was so beneficial that all the members became "lovers of truth," and they decided that reverence for the original Society, and regard for present condi-

tions, suggested the appropriateness of "Aletheorian"—and so it was called. While the consolidation had its advantages, it exhibited some antipathies. The accession of the ladies at this time was a most desirable element in the merger, but the "color line" was drawn upon a number of students from the Southland. It may have been but a faint echo of the irrepressible conflict so recently waged, but some felt that there was an unwarranted crossing of the social Mason and Dixon line. Out of these difficulties, and some evident needs, a second Society was organized in September, 1872, known as the "Adelphic." The truce has not been broken for thirty-six years, and the two Societies continue unto this day in friendly rivalry.

When the College was removed to Beaver Falls, in 1880. the great majority of the members of the Aletheorian Society being opposed to the change, withheld the property and money, and these largely continued with the Normal Academy which succeeded the College at Northwood. first meeting of the Aletheorian Society in Beaver Falls was held in the old German Church, and was attended by the following five members who had come with the College from Northwood, viz.: Miss Flora A. Orr, Messrs. S. Dell Johnston, Solomon F. Kingston, Renwick S. Denholme and O. Brown Milligan. They were much discouraged as to the outlook, and doubtless the Society would not have been continued had it not been for the faith and courage of Miss Orr (now Mrs. J. M. Hays of Creston, Iowa). When the College building was completed in the fall of 1881, and an assignment of halls to be made, the Adelphic Society very graciously left it to the older organization to make choice of the rooms.

But the Aletheorians were equally as generous and only accepted the offer on condition that the Adelphics would receive \$10 for the preferment. The hall was furnished and equipped, and formally opened amid gala proceedings on the evening of Nov. 25, 1881. The following members of the old Society at Northwood made congratulatory addresses in the order named, viz.: W. M. Glasgow, A. M. Milligan, J. R. J. Milligan, J. M. Wylie, and Misses Elizabeth M. Porter and Ella H. Johnston. The President, Professors, and others, took part. Mr. J. B. Temple of Belle Center. Ohio, presented both the Societies with paintings of the old College building at Northwood. The original Constitution of the Aletheorian Society of 1849 was but slightly revised and unanimously adopted, which is another strong evidence of the Society's

lineal descent and legal representation of the first Literary Society of the College. The motto of the Society is "Ars longa, vita brevis."

From time to time the hall has been refurnished and beautified, and the Society possesses a most comfortable and handsome assembly room.

## THE ADELPHIC LITERARY SOCIETY.

The Adelphic Literary Society was organized in September, 1872, in the bed chamber of J. Renwick Wylie and Samuel A. George. Among other charter members were William I. Sproull, Alfred D. Crowe and Robert M. McKinney. Robert A. George and Joseph L. French were taken into their confidence and attended the first meeting, but took no part in the proceedings. At this meeting a Constitution and By Laws were adopted, and the name "Adelphic" chosen as the watchword of the new organization. For a year or so the meetings were held in the College Chapel. For some time the Society experienced its own difficulties—poor and homeless -it compared most unfavorably with the wealth, strength and prestige of the Aletheorians. But misery not only loved company, but drew sympathy. For a year or so none but men joined the Society, but after awhile some courageous ladies took compassion upon the lonely condition of the social exiles and joined their ranks at the peril of the sentiment of the community.

In 1873, several of the stanch supporters of the Society graduated from the College, and this left the organization in a weakened condition. But the residue rallied, worked hard at solicitation for members and by giving splendid performances. Soon the prejudice against the Society passed away, and their ranks were strengthened by many students of cleverabilities. President George, and some of the Professors, encouraged the work. Under the leadership of Messrs. Sproull, McKinney and Crowe, two profitable entertainments were given in 1873 to furnish the new hall alongside of the Aletheorian. The walls of the hall were plastered by some of the

members themselves, and the proceeds of the entertainments applied to the furnishings. The victory of the Adelphic Society in the first contest with the Aletheorian, in the spring of 1874, greatly aided the work of obtaining members. In the spring of 1875, they began the custom of holding a special open meeting with a diversified program on the last Society evening of the Collegiate year. This was also done by the Aletheorian Society, and vast throngs of people from neighboring towns were attracted to the performances.

When the College was removed to Beaver Falls, in 1880. the Society was only eight years of age. But the infant organization determined to get an equal footing upon the new soil of Pennsylvania, and went to work with a will and wish to succeed. They met in the basement of the R. P. Church during the first year, and closed their accounts with a balance of \$60.00, which could be applied to the furnishing of a hall in the new College building. Rev. W. J. Sproull, one of the founders of the Society, and then a missionary in Syria. presented the Society with \$40.00 for furnishings. For two or three months in the fall of 1881, the Society held its meetings in the library and Greek recitation room. On the 28th of October, 1881, the new hall was dedicated with appropriate ceremonies and amid great rejoicing. Rev. R. H. McCready, who had won in every contest engaged, was the chief speaker. Joseph H. Wylie, President George, and other speakers, graced the occasion. When the first contest was held, in the spring of 1884, the Adelphics suffered such a signal defeat at the hands of the Aletheorians, that their chagrin and disappointment led them to challenge their victors for another battle the same fall. In this they were victorious by two points. There were no more contests for six years.

The Society continued to grow in numbers and ability, and in the matter of members, outranked the Aletheorians. In March, 1903, the annual debate with Westminster College was inaugurated. One debater was selected from each Society of Geneva College. The Adelphics were represented as follows: In 1903, by A. W. Leech; in 1904, by W. R. East; in 1905, by S. G. Finney; in 1906, by E. A. McGarey; in 1907, by Carey Clifton.

During the summer of 1904, extensive improvements were made in the hall. Previously a steel ceiling had been constructed, and now a new carpet adorned the floor, revarnished chairs sparkled in the gas light, and the walls were garnished with exquisite burlap. This involved the Society

in some debt which was soon cancelled by generous members and Alumni. At the present time the Adelphic Society has the largest membership in her history, the most beautiful hall in all her existence, and the brightest future in her career.

## ANNUAL CONTESTS.

There are four Contests held each year, as follows: The Inter-Society Contest, The Inter-Collegiate Debate, The Tri-State Contest and the Inter-Class Contest.

- 1. The Inter-Society Contest is held in the College Chapel on the Thursday evening preceding the holiday vacation.
- 2. The Inter-Collegiate Debate is held between Geneva and Westminster College, and was established in 1903. One

contestant is chosen from each of the Societies at the beginning of the spring term.

The Tri-State Oratorical Contest was organized in Pittsburgh, Pa., Feb. 12, 1896, for the purpose of improving the standard of College oratory. It is called "Tri-State" because it includes the following Colleges of Western Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio, viz.: Waynesburgh, Muskingum, Bethany, Geneva, Allegheny and Westminster. Contests are held annually in the above order of Colleges. Each College pays \$10.00 for a medal to be presented to the victor. 4. The Inter-Class Contest is under the supervision of a Committee of the Faculty. It consists of orations open to members of the Senior and Junior Classes; and declamations open to the Sophomore and Freshmen Classes. There is also "The Geneva College Oratorical Association," which is composed of members of the two literary societies, to promote literary work among the students and to encourage contests among other Colleges.

#### PRIZES AND SCHOLARSHIPS.

The following five prizes are awarded at the Commencement each year, viz.:

- I. THE FACULTY PRIZE. It offers \$15.00 for the first, and \$10.00 for the second best original oration, open to members of the Senior and Junior Classes.
- 2. The Trustees' Prize. This Board offers \$15.00 to the first, and \$10.00 to the second best declamation, open to members of the Sophomore and Freshman Classes.
- 3. THE RHETORIC PRIZE. A prize of \$15.00 for the first, and \$10.00 for the second best essay on an assigned topic in connection with the work of Rhetoric.
- 4. THE MARTIN PRIZE. Mrs. D. C. Martin, of Pittsburgh, offers a prize of \$15.00 to the first, and \$10.00 to the second student making the greatest improvement in the Department of Music during the year.
- 5. THE ALUMNI PRIZE. The Alumni Association offers a prize of \$25.00 to the student who represents Geneva College in the Inter-Collegiate Oratorical Contest.

#### "THE GENEVA CABINET."

College Journalism has played an important part in advertising and reflecting the life of Geneva College. Previous to 1878 the College had no distinct exponent, but depended upon local newspapers or correspondents for Church magazines. In the autumn of 1878, David Gourley Wylie, of '79, launched the first issue of "The College Cabinet" as a monthly magazine devoted to the interests of Geneva College. Before me lies a copy of the first issue with its once red cover now faded to pink. The first page of the crimson-backed magazine reads as follows:

"THE COLLEGE CABINET. September, 1878. Terms: \$1.00 Per Annum. Single Copies, 10 cents. D. G. Wylie, Editor and Prop. West Geneva, Ohio. Printed by Miller and Thompson, Ada, Ohio." Then follows the "Contents." The pamphlet contained twelve pages of fine print, with bristling editorials, interesting personals, and valuable selected articles.

After the initial number, in October, 1878, William Melancthon Glasgow became the Associate Editor. The aforementioned gentlemen bear the honor of establishing the College magazine which continues to this day. From time to time the paper has been enlarged and improved, and compares favorably with the best publications of the College world. Until 1883, the journal was published as a private enterprise by the editors, but since that year by the "College Cabinet Joint Stock Co.," which elects an Editor-in-Chief and Assistants each year. 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# THE ALUMNI ASSOCIATION.

Upon many happy occasions a number of the graduates of Geneva College have met together, and, in an informal way amidst festive enjoyment, renewed former acquaintances and formed new bonds of friendship. These meetings were usually held during the sessions of the Synod of the Reformed Presbyterian Church, and attended largely by her ministry. In the spring of 1879, a specially large and representative meeting was held at the College in Northwood, upon which occasion eloquent addresses were made by Revs. Drs. Josiah M. Johnston of '54, and J. Lovejoy Robertson of '55. A brief history of the Alumni was read by Miss Margaret S. Mitchell of '75. Toasts were responded to as follows: "Graduates in

the Ministry," by Dr. H. H. George of '53. "Ladies of the Alumni," by Rev. M. F. McKirahan of '73. "Co-Education," by Rev. W. S. Fulton of '73. "Our Former Professors," by Rev. J. R. Wylie of '73. A banquet was held in the Seminary building. An Alumni Association was organized of which Dr. H. George was President, and William M. Milroy was Secretary. An Executive Committee was appointed to arrange for a similar gathering in two years.

By the removal of the College, in 1880, olden associations were somewhat broken by the geographical distance, and it was several years before a sufficient number of the graduates could be assembled in the new location of Beaver Falls to secure a successful meeting. It was not until the spring of 1888 that a permanent organization was effected to conserve and advance the interests of all things Genevan, and to promote the mutual acquaintance of the increasing Alumni. Since that time a successful organization has been maintained. An annual fee of \$1.00 entitles to membership. For many years during the annual meeting of the Association a banquet was held at the College on the evening preceding Commencement, but latterly the Alumni have become so numerous and renowned that the great social event is held in one of the leading hotels of Pittsburgh in the early spring. From the Association three members are annually chosen as Consultative Members of the College Board of Trus-

#### MUSICAL CLUBS.

Music has always been the refined handmaid of literature. From the establishment of the Female Seminary, in 1851, groups of musically inclined students rendered an enjoyable part in the social and literary exercises of the Institution. So far as known music has been taught in the College from the beginning. During the first decade exceptionally fine musicians were employed in this art. In 1874, the Silver Cornet Band came into being, and enlivened many a festive occasion with enchanting strains whose charm soothed the savage breast. While this band was not strictly a student-volunteer-movement, yet, being a member of this famous organization for several years, we can testify to its efficiency and service.

At the coming of Miss Elizabeth May Swing, of Cincinnati, to the Musical Department of the College, in 1878, an impetus was given to musical culture never before experienced. She was not only an adept in various lines of music, but a splendid organizer of entertainments. She organized the famous "Geneva College Quintette Club" which first startled then charmed Western Ohio with music and oratory. Inasmuch as this was one of the most popular musical clubs of the College, the names of its members deserve perpetuation.

With the establishment of a regular Conservatory of Music and School of Oratory, in 1893, the musical feature of the College became more pronounced and successful. A well equipped and trained College orchestra, which had few equals in Western Pennsylvania, for years discoursed sweet music upon social and more public occasions. Each literary society had its band or club. Vocalists and instrumentalists from the Conservatory have graced Church choirs and charmed large audiences, and from time to time they lent their talents to entertainments of various kinds in the vicinity and often at a

distance from the College. One of the attractive features of Geneva College is the exceptional advantage offered for a musical education.



#### DEPARTMENT OF ATHLETICS.

#### I. BASE BALL.

Athletics, in some form, found a place among the sportive diversions of College life at Geneva during her whole history. Doubtless the game of "town ball" or "three-cornered-cat" was played in the earlier days upon the commons of Northwood. The greatest athletic feat of those days, however, was the walking to and fro from College to the neighboring country boarding houses, or to the post town of Belle Center for commodities or the mail. The "turning pole" in the far end of the campus, or the "swimming hole" down in the Creek, offered the rarest opportunities or barest possibilities for physical culture. Occasionally an excursion was taken to the neighboring city of Bellefontaine, and to Lewistown Reservoir for fishing or boating purposes.

When the soldiers returned from the civil war in 1865 and 1866, many of them still young and vigorous, they entered with zest into the new and popular game of base ball. The "Red Stockings," of Cincinnati, were the champions of the diamond in the Middle West and inspired the whole country to the organization of clubs. Among the first base ball clubs organized in the vicinity of the College was the "Eagles" of Belle Center, whose fame was well merited, as they were seldom defeated in the popular game. As they frequently played with and against the subsequent College team they deserve mention in this connection.

In the spring of 1868, the first base ball club was organized at Geneva College. President Crowe not only believed in harmless and healthful exercise for students, but organized

the club and became its first Captain. The following persons composed the first team:

In those days the ball was pitched, which permitted a large number of scores to adorn the card; and no youngster who could not accurately count one hundred was eligible as scorer. Home runs were frequent, and a large field was necessary for the sport. In later years the game was much improved by new rules, and the skill with which the splendidly equipped teams conducted the sport was a matter of justifiable pride upon the part of all the students of the College.

In the later '70s the College possessed some splendid players, among which were the McKee brothers and the Milligan brothers of Pittsburgh, John P. Curran of Philadelphia, and some local prodigies who arose to renown upon the diamond and then quietly slid in.

During the last four years of the College at Northwood (1876–1880), a regular College team was maintained. The large number of victories which they achieved from other Colleges and neighboring towns in Ohio won for them a distinction which was actually shared in by the Faculty. During the last season at Northwood the team never lost a game, defeating the then celebrated semi-professional club of Northwestern Ohio University twice in one day.

The names and record of this famous club deserve perpetuation in this department.

J. C. B. French, Layton Simpson, C. R. Beattie, and others, frequently substituted. Elsie M. Smith was the faithful scorer. The *College Cabinet* for 1878, 1879, and 1880, contains the record of many of these contests on the diamond, from which magazine, and other sources, we append a few results:

Upon one occasion the illustrious College team returned to Northwood, flushed with pride on account of several dangling scalps taken in battle, and challenged the newly organized second nine, known as the "H. H.'s," to play a game 2 to 1. But the H. H.'s trimmed the champions to the tune of 19 to 9.

After the College came to Beaver Falls, in 1880, the first play-ground was the knoll just below the College building. In 1888, the citizens of Beaver Falls made a Park, called "Geneva Park," above Twenty-sixth street, and east of Eighth Avenue. This was used until 1892. In 1892, a foot ball field was laid out on College Hill, south of Thirty-third street, near the School House. This was used for four years. The present Athletic Field, composed originally of five acres, was purchased in 1896 for \$6,700.00. More property was bought and added to it in 1906. The gymnasium was completed and equipped with all necessary appliances for physical culture in 1890.

A base ball team was organized by the students at Beaver Falls in the spring of 1881. Their first game resulted as follows:

File Work's Club, 21; Geneva, 14.

Subsequently the score was reversed as follows:

Evidently some poor playing was done on both sides.

For two years the College did not maintain a representative team, but clubs from different classes played against each other and some local organizations. In the spring of 1883, O. B. Milligan broke his leg in a game, and appeared on the platform on Commencement Day by the aid of crutches. In the fall of 1884, a strong College team was organized and accomplished some effective work on the diamond. It was composed of the following players:

recorded until October, 1890, when Geneva gained the following victory under Captain Kuhn:



For several years base ball has received little or no attention among the College Athletes, their efforts and skill being turned into other lines of sport.

#### II. FIELD MEETS.

After the organization of a regular Athletic Club at Geneva College, in 1890, the first Field Meet was in the spring of 1891. The score stood:

The 440 yard run won by F. B. Wilson, 59 1-8 seconds. Shot Put by A. G. Ellis, 33 feet.

Geneva took one first—the hammer throw; second in the bicycle race; and third in the mile walk.

Sterrett won the two mile bicycle race in six minutes and fifty-two seconds.

- N. L. Euwer took third, and D. E. Torrens second place in both hurdles, 120 and 220 yards; Charles Bell took third in both events.

In the mile walk, D. C. Todd won, time 8 minutes and 24 seconds. R. J. G. McKnight, second.

- S. A. Sterrett took second place in the half mile run.
- R. H. Martin threw the hammer 89 feet and 10 inches, taking first place. M. R. McBurney was a close second.

In the 220 yard dash, V. V. Wick scored third place.

Charles Bell easily won the broad jump at 19 feet and 3 inches.

Ebert Long took the third place in the quarter mile bicycle race.

In the mile bicycle race, W. J. Sterrett took second, and Ebert Long third, place. Sterrett took second place also in the 5 mile bicycle race.

Seventh Annual Field Meet, May, 1896.

The results were as follows: Washington and Jefferson College, 61 1-2 points; Western University of Pa., 33 1-2 points; Geneva College, 25 points.

Whitmyer, of Geneva, took first place in the mile run, time 5 minutes and 3-5 of a second. He also won in the half mile race, time 2 minutes and 6 3-5 seconds, thus bringing to Geneva the Intercollegiate record for Western Pennsylvania.

Gibson, of Geneva, took the third place in the 440 yard dash.

Geneva secured all places in the hammer throw, as follows: Hunter, first, distance 88 feet and 8 1-2 inches; Sterrett, second; McBurney, third.

- N. L. Euwer secured third place in the Shot Put.
- D. C. Todd won second place in the high kick.

The feature of the day was the winning of the broad jump from Deevers by James May, of Geneva, distance 21 feet 6 1-2 inches (his previous record being 19 feet 4 inches).

Leech won the hammer throw, distance 92 feet and 1 1-2 inches.

Limerick won the 220 yard hurdle in 29 seconds. Leech put the Shot 32 feet and 11 1-2 inches.

The subsequent records are quite incomplete or wanting altogether. It is safe to say that Geneva's record was not of the first magnitude during the past few years.

## III. FOOT BALL.

The first regularly equipped foot ball team at Geneva College was organized in the fall of 1890 by W. H. Coverdale and J. G. Reed. Coverdale was the Captain. The team consisted of the following players:

Geneva scored a total of 283 points against its opponents 6 points. Great credit is due Captain Thompson for holding the squad together in such fine shape, while Coach Craig was making a foot ball playing machine out of them. The most spectacular game was that with W. and J. at Washington, Pa., Nov. 14, 1903, when Geneva chartered a special train and fully five hundred friends from the Beaver Valley accompanied them. No game had been played with this team since the experience of 1897 when Geneva received such unfair and brutal treatment. The old jealousy and enmity were but slumbering, and an official determined from the beginning that Geneva should lose, and several times penalized them without reason. By unfair substitution of players at critical points, the entrance of rooters upon the field with the intent of stopping the game, and the calling of the game on account of darkness, when Geneva had the ball in possession about the center of the field and six minutes vet to play, all demonstrate the unfair elements that led to the defeat of Geneva upon this memorable occasion.

The season of 1904 and 1905 is a dark period in Athletics at Geneva College. Most of the team had either graduated or failed to return to College, and Coach Craig could not be secured. A squad of raw recruits, under a new system, taxed the ingenuity of Coach Alford, who unfortunately soon sprained his ankle and had to relinquish the leadership. 

JOHN BLACK JOHNSTON, D. D., was born near Clarksburgh, Indiana Co., Pa., March 13, 1802; reared at Hopedale, Ohio; graduated from Franklin College in 1829; studied theology under Rev. John Black of Pittsburgh, Pa., being licensed by Pittsburgh Presbytery in 1832; ordained by Western Presbytery as pastor of First Miami R. P. congregation, Northwood, Ohio, June 10, 1834-Nov. 10, 1858; founder of Geneva College, and its first President from 1848-1850; preceptor of theology, 1851-1856; connected with the United Presbyterian Church, in 1858; pastor of St. Clairsville, Ohio, May 17, 1859-June 9, 1874; Postmaster of St. Clairsville, Ohio, 1870-1881; died at St. Clairsville, Ohio, Oct. 24, 1882. D. D., from Franklin College in 1869. Moderator of the R. P. Synod in 1845. Published several books and numerous articles. Married Miss Sarah Bruce of New Athens, Ohio, April 29, 1828; Miss Elizabeth Boyd of Huntsville, Ohio, Nov. 2, 1841.

WILLIAM FINNEY GEORGE, M. A., was born near Venice, Washington Co., Pa., Nov. 19, 1821; graduated from Franklin College in 1845; professor in Muskingum College, New Concord, Ohio, 1846–1848; studied theology in the Seminary of Cincinnati, Ohio, 1848–1849, and at Northwood, Ohio, 1849–1850; President of Geneva College, Northwood, Ohio, 1850–1852; licensed by Lakes Presbytery in 1851; ordained by the same Presbytery as pastor of the R. P. congregation of Macedon, Ohio, May 12, 1853–April 20, 1858; Church Hill congregation, Coulterville, Ill., March 2, 1860–May 17, 1871; Staunton, Ill., May 13, 1872–until his death, April 14, 1880. He was also a physician and an educator. Married Miss Martha Speer of New Concord, Ohio, Sept. 2, 1847.

JAMES RENWICK WILLSON SLOANE, D. D., was born in Topsham, Orange Co., Vt., May 29, 1823; reared at Hopedale, Ohio, and Oakdale, Ill.; graduated from Jefferson College in 1847; teacher at Hopkinsville, Ky., 1847-1848; President of Richmond College, Ohio, 1848-1851; studied theology in the Seminary of Northwood, Ohio; licensed by Lakes Presbytery in 1852; President of Geneva College, Northwood, Ohio, 1852-1856; ordained by Lakes Presbytery as pastor of the R. P. congregation of Rushsylvania, Ohio, Jan. 13, 1855-May 21, 1856; Third Church, New York City, May 26, 1856-Oct. 27, 1868; professor of theology in the Seminary of Allegheny, Pa., 1868- until his death, March 6, 1886. Pastor of the First Church, Allegheny, Pa., 1877-1884. D. D., from Westminster College in 1860. Moderator of the R. P. Synod in 1867. Married Miss Margaret A. W. Milligan of Sparta, Ill., Oct. 23, 1849; Miss Margaret C. McLaren of Geneva, N. Y., May 4, 1858; Miss Frances B. Swanwick of Warriston, Ill., Jan. 17, 1865. A speaker and lecturer on theological and reform questions.

JOHN CALVIN KNOX MILLIGAN, D. D., was born at Ryegate, Caledonia Co., Vt., Feb. 1, 1829; reared at New Alexandria, Pa.; graduated from the Western University of Pennsylvania in 1848; professor in Geneva College, Northwood, Ohio, 1848–1858, and President of same, 1856–1858; studied theology in the Seminary of Northwood, Ohio, being licensed by Lakes Presbytery in 1852; ordained by same Presbytery as co-pastor of the First Miami R. P. congregation, Northwood, Ohio, May 12, 1853–April 20, 1858; First Church, New York City, June 16, 1858–May 3, 1892; connected with the United Presbyterian Church; pastor of Washington Heights U. P. Church, New York City, Oct. 10, 1893–until his death, Oct. 30, 1906. Editor of Our Banner, 1874–1891. Moderator of the R. P. Synod in 1870, and of the New York U. P. Synod in 1899. D. D., from Western

University of Pa., in 1882. Married Miss Rachel W. Farrington of Newburgh, N. Y., Oct. 3, 1854. Published many magazine articles, and aided in preparation of Psalter.

JOHN CALVIN SMITH, M. A., was born at Bloomington, Monroe Co., Ind., Oct. 29, 1831; graduated from the University of Indiana in 1851; teacher at Bedford, Ind., 1851-1852; in the Model School of the University of Indiana, 1852-1854; professor in Geneva College, Northwood, Ohio, 1855-1860, and President of same, 1858-1860; studied theology in the Seminary of Allegheny, Pa., being licensed by Lakes Presbytery in 1862; ordained by Pittsburgh Presbytery as pastor of the Slippery Rock R. P. congregation, near Rose Point, Pa., April 16, 1863-April 19, 1889; Cincinnati, Ohio, July 19, 1889-until his death, March 12, 1900. Moderator of the R. P. Synod in 1896. Married Miss Sarah A. McCartney of Bellefontaine, Ohio, Aug. 9, 1855; Miss Keziah E. Patterson of Bellefontaine, Ohio, June 22, 1898. A speaker on reform questions.

DAVID STRANG, M. A., was born at Buchlyvie, Stirlingshire, Scotland, June 14, 1800; graduated from St. Andrews University, Scotland, in 1826; studied theology privately at Cambridge, N. Y., and in the Associate Seminary of Canonsburgh, Pa.; licensed by Chartiers Presbytery in 1835; ordained by Stamford Presbytery as pastor of Covington and York Associate congregations, Peoria, N. Y., Sept. 16, 1836-Sept. 12, 1855; home missionary in the South and West; in charge of the Geneva Collegiate Institute, Northwood, Ohio, 1862-1864; supply, while residing at Monmouth, Ill., 1865-until his death, Dec. 8, 1872. Married Miss Jeanet Moodie of East Greenwich, N. Y., Oct. 14, 1836.

NATHAN ROBINSON JOHNSTON, D. D., was born near Hopedale, Harrison Co., Ohio, Oct. 8, 1820; graduated from Franklin College in 1843; teacher at St. Clairsville, Ohio, 1843–1845; studied theology in the Seminary of Cincinnati, Ohio, 1845–1848; editor of the Free Press, New Concord, Ohio, 1848–1849; studied theology in the Seminary of Northwood, Ohio, being licensed by the Lakes Presbytery in 1850; ordained by New York Presbytery as pastor of the R. P. congregation of Topsham, Vt., Nov. 10, 1852–May 16, 1865; also a missionary among the contrabands about Port Royal, S. C., 1863–1864; President of Geneva College, Northwood, Ohio, 1865–1867; Principal of the Academy of New Castle, Pa., 1867–1870; same at New Brighton, Pa., 1870–1871; teacher in Geneva College, Northwood, Ohio, 1871–1872; Principal of the Academy of Blairsville, Pa., 1872–1873; home missionary at Elliota, Minn., 1873–1875;

journalist, and missionary among the Chinese of Oakland, Cal., 1875—1890; editor of Our Banner, Philadelphia and Beaver Falls, Pa., 1890—1894; teacher and lecturer at Oakland, Cal., '94-'98; retired at Baltimore, Md., and Brooklyn, N. Y. Died, at Topsham, Vt., March 21, 1904. D. D., from Franklin College in 1902. Published "Looking Back From the Sunset Land," 1898, pp. 624. Married Miss Eliza A. Y., Dec. 7, 1881-Oct. 28, 1884; supply, and agent for the Equitable Insurance Co., Warren, Ohio, 1885-1887; financial agent for Geneva College, while residing at New Brighton, Pa., 1887-1888; pastor of Springfield and Centerville, Pa., Oct. 12, 1888-Oct. 13, 1891; lecturer for the American Sabbath Union, residing at Brooklyn, N. Y., 1891-1893; pastor of Oil Creek congregation, near Titusville, Pa., Nov. 30, 1803-; also lecturer for the American Sabbath Union, while residing at Warren, Ohio, 1893-1907; New Castle, Pa., 1907-. 
