LORD BROUGHAM.

There are but few persons of the present generation who can remember the greatness of Henry Brougham; he has been dead but four years, and even now lives mostly in tradition. There was a time when England could but poorly afford to spare him. he sacrificed his hopes of future political promotion to become the Attorney-General and confidential adviser of Caroline, the murdered Queen of Brunswick; when he clothed himself in the mantle of Law Reform, which fell from the dead shoulders of Sir Samuel Romilly; when he braved the favor of the Sovereign, and defied the prejudices of the subjects, all England joined in admiration for "Brave Brougham." This was more than half a century ago, and he was not then a young man. He was nine years older than Lord Byron, and yet when Brougham died Byron had been sleeping forty-four years under the grass in the graveyard of Hucknall Church. He was older than Daniel Webster, and had made a great name before the latter had begun that career which has left a distinguished mark in history, yet the grave of Webster, who died an old man, had been listening to the roar of the surge at Marshfield sixteen years when Brougham breathed his last.
