I rise at 5. Lava at 6. The

P.M. whenever the "fobs" like it -  
In the evenings after breakfast  
we sit in the back porch and read -  
In the ~~evenings~~ do in the front  
porches - The weather has been  
essentially dry - and the thermometer  
ranges from 80 to 90 - 5 for the dish  
mouth - The have not suffered, even  
at night, from the heat - our cham-  
ber is so thoroughly ventilated -

As to our next session's prospects, we  
cannot predict - our new Board &  
Rector cannot but be better than the  
old - but we shall see - Quite soon
