My dear friend

This will probably be handed you by my mother who goes up to accompany my father home to New York. It will serve to express the kind remembrances & affection of yourself and family, and I hope to receive a reply which will inform me of your welfare. If my mother continues any time in Satmar she will endeavor to call at your brother's, and if she does you will oblige me by showing her my old house and the state in which my furniture is. I should be glad that you could find opportunity to dispose of all or any of the articles in the east room, the bedsteads &c. Dr. Wyllie wishes the horse wagon and harness to be sold, and I give you full power to dispose of the whole for what they will bring. I think they ought to bring something like \$150 - they cost originally upwards of \$400. - Perhaps Mr. Webber or Rott-Spirin would purchase the wagon & a little alteration would make it a good article.

Mrs. M. Lead and Wyllie are in tolerable health, no annuals yet. I would like much to hear some particulars of the state of things in the congregation now. How is Mr. Hawthorne? He generally well.

The epidemic seems to be somewhat abating here. For the last two weeks we have had on an average 100 deaths per day.

If you should dispose of any of my articles I would most charitably allow you a just compensation on them.
