

Louisville June 29th 1837.

Dear Soph:

I arrived here this morning, and write this to deposit in the P. Office when I go to seek a letter from you. In Bethel I received a letter from Margaret, the only communication of any kind since I left N.Y. All men well. You have however doubtless heard by Dr. Wylie up to a later date than mine, what was May 29th. By the date affixed to this you will perceive that I am detained much longer than I expected. Instead of the 4th July, it will probably be the 10th or 12th even I reach Philad^a. On Sabbath, I expect to be in Cincinnati, and on Monday will start for Wheeling when I will take Stage for Baltimore, and remain two days at least.

With things about Cousin Wylie's I was pleased, the Country is very different from that about
