The Honorable Commissioners
In Connecticut New England for
propagating Christian Knowledge &
Littérature among the Indians, seeing
ing Naturally consulted the Expediency
of sending some fit Person to Europe
to collect assistance from good People
at Home in this heavy and good work
and appointed the Rev Nathaniel
Whitaker to go - and thought it
good to send me to accompany him -
and accordingly, not doubting the
Call of God, and my Duty to go, on
Thursday the 21 of Nov^r do a bore;
in obedience to the Storage Call
of Providence, having committed
my self Family and Friends to
the Care of Almighty God, took
Leave of them about 11 A.M: and
went on my Journey towards Boston

Boston in order to take a
Voyage from thence to Europe

Saturday Nov^r 23 arriv'd
at Boston about 3 in the
after noon, and put up at
M^r Moses Peck and was
very kindly receiv'd by him

- on Wednesday following M^r
Whetaker, ^{Little} whose I had, to tra-
vel return'd to Boston from
Portsmouth, met with good
encouragement by Friends
Dustland, he brought with
him, almost enough for our
Voyage Passage, - Here we stay'd
in Boston near 4 weeks,

Friends in this place to the
affair we were upon appear
as near as I can see as
ever and increase daily -

The Admirals stand at
a Distance & like them
But they don't speak a
Word as they did, they now
continue their Project in
Secret, and it is supposed
they are preparing to
send us (Letters) ~~to~~ to
send to Europe by the same
Ship, we are to go in
Monday Dec^r 23 about
9 in the Morning went
a Board in Boston Purchas
a Ship, John Marshall
Cap^t & we at 9 and half
we spread Sail to land - Trust
ing in Living God - there was
four Passengers w^{ch} John
Williams and M^r Thomas Brom-
field of Boston, M^r Wheelaker
and 3 -

we had very agreeable Company.
The worship of God was Carried on
Daily, and had a Sermon every
Sabbath, the goodness of God is very
great to us, I we had favourable
Winds except 3 short Spells of hard
Gail, we lay low, and when we
got within 200 Leagues of Land
End, Moderate Easterly Winds
met us, And stopt us 20 days
and remarkable warm weather.
we had most of the Time - and
then we had some favourable
winds, - and Sabbath the 2^d Day
of February ¹⁷⁸⁶ about 10 in the
morning we discover'd the Land
of England, - and the Wind head
ed us again, and the next Day
which was 3^d of Feb^r we set
a Shore on great Briton in
a Tuff Boat, and Land at
a Place call'd Brichsham, &

Just after ^{the} sun ^{had} set, ^{with} great
at one widow woman's House
Blessed be thy great Name O
God for thy goodness to us over
the waters, and hast brought
us upon the Land, Lord with
a Law of thankfulness in our
Hearts, and preserve me on
the Land as thou hast done
on the ~~Sea~~, and deliver
me from all evil, especially
from the Evil of the

Job 4. Went on our Journey
Early in the Morning on Horse
Back, got to Exon about 11 pm
30 M from Brighthelm

We were called up half after 10 in
the Night, & went off in a coach
at 11, from Exon pretty large
City and reached to a City called
Salisbury about 10 in the evening
We went a 100 miles the Day

But we had very Cold Days,
Thanks be to God for his goodness to
us hitherto —
Wednesday Feb^r 6. We were call'd
up a gaine about before 2 and at
2 in the Morning we went on
our journey, and by the goodness
of God, ^{we} arriv'd to London about
4 in the Evening, and we fell
upon M^r Tabbot, and were kin
ly receiv'd, and lodg'd there, in
the Morning M^r Smith of Wantage
Came to see us, and conducted
us to M^r Whitfield, and we were
Extreamly well receiv'd by him,
O how mercifull is Gods goodness
to us this far — M^r Whitfield &
other Friends here advise not to
be open as yet, we rode with
M^r Whitfield ^{with his wife} a good Friend,
but we were hidde about it,
Lodg'd at M^r Whitfield's —
Saturday Febru^r 8. Was at
M^r Whitfield's Conventicle — and
on Sabbath 9th Feb^r was still there

Monday Febru^y 10th Mr Whitfield
to Mr Holmby and I in his Coach
and introduced us to my Lord Dart-
mouth, and appeared like a hearty
and indeed, Mr Whitfield says
he is a Christian Lord and an un-
common one — after he paid
our Compliments to my Lord —
Mr Whitfield carried us to my
Lady Holmby's, and she received
us with all kindness, and she is
an aged woman, and a Mother
in Israel, and we found what
both in the City and out, — the
Land about the City in the Coun-
try is like one continued Gar-
den. — Left Sabbath Evening
walk'd with Mr Wright to carry
a letter to my Lord Dartmouth
and saw such confusion in the
neighbourhood of — there was
some at Churches singing psalms
& preaching, in the Streets some
Cursing & Swearing & Damning

one another, thro' low hollowing,
whistling, talking, giggling, ^{laugh-}ing,
Canting and footmen p^{er-}ping
and rappling, Crossing and
Cross-Crossing, and the poor Beggers
Praying, Crying and Begging
on their knees - Tuesday ^{the} 12th
with Mr. Savage, and in the evening
Mr. Whitefield and his people had
Love Feast at the Chapel. Mr
Whitaker and I went with them
Wednesday Feb^r 12 rode out again
Thursday Feb^r 13 Mr. Whitefield
carried to the Parliament House -
there he saw many Levellers,
from hence went over Westmin-
ster Bridge across the River
Thames made all of London -
thence went to Greenwich,
and a glance of Hospital there
but in a tedious cold rainy day
it was - we were introduced by Mr
Whitefield to Mr. Faulconer a Quaker -

got home again in the Evening
Friday Feb^y 14 Early in the
morning M^r Whitefield carried us to
M^r Komain and introduced us to
and to M^r Madin, ^(London) and to M^r
Singenbagan and old Professor
German Minister, and returned
Home again

M^r Whitefield takes unwearied
Pains to introduce us to the religi-
gious Nobility and others, and
to the best of men in the City of
London - You he is a tender father
to us. he provides every thing
for us, he has ^{got} a House for us,
He would reward him a thousand
a thousand fold - He is indeed
^{a father} in God, he has made him a
Spiritual Father to thousands
and thousands, and God has
made him a Temporal father
to the poor. His House is

Surrounded with the poor,
the blind, the lame, the halt
and the maimed, the widows, &
the Fatherless, from Day to
Day. God continue his life-giving
grace.

Sabbath ¹⁶ Preached in M^r White-
field's Tabernacle to a great
Multitude of People; I felt
Monday Febr^y 14 M^r Whitefield
presented us to D^r Gifford a
famous Baptist Minister and
we were received extremely well
and dined with him.

We went immediately from seeing
The King, to dine with a Noble
man My Lord Dartmouth a most
religions Nobleman and his
Lady also, the most singular
Couple amongst Nobility in
London. This Day also went
to Westminster Abbey, and had
a full View of the Monuments
in the Evening we returned again
to Mr Whitefields

Thursday Febr. 20 This is
the Queen Charlottes Birth Day.
was conducted to St James where
the Royal Family and the Nobi-
lity were to be together to keep a
joyful Day - but we were too
late, however we ^{saw} some of the
Nobility in their shining Robes
and a throng of People all a-
round, - the sight of the Nobi-
lity put me in mind of David and

and the Rich Glutton, and the
poor reminded me of Lazarus -
What great Difference there is
between the Rich and the Poor -
and what Difference there ~~will~~ is
and will be, between Gods poor
and the Devils Rich &c
O Lord God Almighty let not my
Eyes be dazzled with the glit-
ting Toys of this World, but let
me, as first and my soul long

ing went into our House while
Mr Whitefield provided for us
and all the Furniture also -
and a Man to wait on us -
Blessed be God, that he has
sent his dear Servant before
us -

from Home, and added, I had
been Ordained six Years in a
Dissenting way.

by my own Relations, I had

and by the first Day of April
I was Intirely well, all my
Pocks Dried up, and Scabs
Dropt off — O how great is
god's goodness and Mercy
to me — O that god would
enable me to live Answera-
ble to the mercies and fa-
vours I enjoy — and that he
would Cure my Soul of

all Spiritual Diseases by the
Blood of J^h which Cleanseth
from all Pollution —
and that he ^{shall} fit and prepare
me for himself —

April 4. went to some Distance
from our House —

Sabbath April 6: took my
last Physick after my Pok —
just at Night My Lady
Huntington came to M^r.

Whitefield, and we were
introduced to her by M^r.

Whitefield, and she is most
Heavenly ^{woman} I believe in the
World, she appears like a
Mother in Israel indeed — a
woman of great Faith —
