our business to him, and he  
appeared very friendly to us, &  
he went into visit. Ministers of all  
denominations, and they were  
all very friendly, and with  
Gentlemen all night every day  
we lay 2 Nights at Mr  
Spruce's, and then we were  
invited by Mr<sup>r</sup> Jones a Brewer  
or hotelman and a good man  
and the whole family is very  
agreeable. We have treated with  
great kindness. —

Sabb<sup>th</sup> Jan<sup>r</sup> 24 in the afternoon  
preached in Doct<sup>r</sup> Duffield's M<sup>o</sup>  
in the evening. Preached in Doct<sup>r</sup>  
Spruce's meeting, and they  
made collections for me. —

This week visited every  
Day and found hundreds  
of all sorts of People

Feb<sup>r</sup> 3: on Sat<sup>r</sup> in the

of People.

This evening a number of Ladies

to take Tea with Capt Schofe  
in his Ship. he is a Dutch

took good leave of the Company  
and returned to our Quarters -

and they made me a collection -  
This week went on in our pit  
amongst all Denominations  
were kindly treated, equally -

Sabb Feb<sup>ry</sup> 17 I went in the morn  
ing to Do<sup>r</sup> Spence's and it was a  
Sacrament Day. Mr Green Prayed  
and I partook the sacrament  
with them, and it was a solemn  
Day with me, and I believe with  
others. in the after noon, I went  
to Baptist Meeting, and heard

Mr Duffield of the Baptist  
Minister in the City and we were  
now getting ready to leave the  
City, and it was hard work to  
take leave of the People, for all  
Denominations were exceedingly  
kind to us, bid us with a great

Friendship, and had good success  
in our applications, and  
the Friends or Quakers here  
in Philadelphia, in order to us they have  
contributed their Substance to  
us more than any other People  
in this great City, were sit  
and Dined with them from  
Sunday to Sunday

Friday Febr 22. About 10  
we left Philadelphia, and  
at last had Crossing the
