

London March 11: 1766

My Dear Wife

I send you with this ^{letter}
some Cloathing, for our Family, there is 7 1/2 yards of
Broad Cloth and some Shalloon, to make a Suite of
Cloaths for Mamma, and what is left you may do as
your self pleases, you may make Blankets or
Coats of it, - and a piece of Stuff about 30 yards
and Striped Flannel between 30 and 40 yards,
and 30 yards of Check'd Linen, and about as
much white Linen - they go by way of Bristol,
and M^r Peck will send them to Newwick Landing
to M^r Whitaker, for her things and our things
are all in one Box - By the Mercy of God I am
in good Health, and I hope and pray these may
find you so - Trust in the Lord Jehovah, for
in him is everlasting Strength - about a qua-
ter after 3: this after Noon, I was inoculated
by M^r Whitaker, and you will have heard
whether I am well off or find fault with it -
the Cloathing is by the Rev^d M^r Whitefield
and the Pins and Books by Madam Whitefield,
and the Coffee Pot and 3 Brass Crows by one M^r
Willey, - you must ^{put} narrow the Pot on the fire,
the Brass are to hang Cloaths on - from
your Husband
