My dear Friend & colleague:

I have delayed answering your last letter in the hope of hearing something definite from Amherst Seminary. But this plan was either never fully matured or has been abandoned. In the meantime another project has been suggested by me to extend your usefulness in America without taking you away from your important post in Germany. Prof. Adams, has already the worthy President of the Union Theological Seminary, has already written to you and ^{repeatedly} ~~wishes~~ me to follow his letter with additional particulars.

The Faculty of our Seminary invite you to deliver before the Students and friends of the institution, in November of the present year, or, if more convenient by you, in the year 1876, a course of from six to ten lectures on the Evidence of Christianity such as are prepared from time to time by eminent divines and scholars in compliance with the terms of the "Ely Lectureship." The manuscript of the lectures (in English, of course) becomes the property of the Seminary and is published in uniform style. I send you, besides a catalogue of our institution, the last two courses of lectures, the one by President McCosh, the of Princeton, the other by Prof. Peabody, of Harvard University, that you may judge for yourself.

While we could not restrain you in the preparation of your programme, I beg you to suggest that you give us a historical survey of the conflicts and triumphs of Christianity with Judaism, classical Paganism, Mohammedanism, the corruption of Paganism, and the modern forms of infidelity, as English Deism, French Atheism, German Rationalism & Pantheism; to which may be added one or two lectures on missionary Christianity in present conflict with Brahminism, Buddhism and other false religions, and the prospects of its ultimate victory all over the world.

Considering the great distance and the inconvenience of ^{crossing the} ocean Mr.



Adam has offered you for the preparation & delivery of such a course of lectures and the manuscript ready for the printer a sum twice as large as the one we have given heretofore.

You are at liberty to publish the lectures also in Germany and thus to make them doubly useful. It's only when the English copy.

If you leave Bonn in September October and remain with us till the close of November or beginning of December you can be back in your study before Christmas. All I hope the minister of public worship who so cheerfully extended the duration of the Russian delegates to the General Alliance Conference, will not deny you the same privilege a second time. If necessary, I shall back up your application to Mr. Felt with some strong arguments.

I hope you will carefully consider this invitation and gratify the Faculty of Union Seminary and your many friends in this country by an early and favorable reply.

Our project of an illustrated popular Commentary has come to crisis which seems to make a change inevitable. As you are already informed, our friends Messrs. Scribner, Armstrong & Co. have committed themselves very largely to Dr. Thompson, father & son, in the illustration department, and the older Dr. Thompson who returned to Britain, seems to be committed to Mr. Nelson for a somewhat similar enterprise which might become a serious rival to our own. Hence Mr. Nelson's proposal of a transfer. Unless such a transfer or combination is made, the whole enterprise may fail though. For Messrs. Scribner, Armstrong & Co. consider the illustration department essential to success, and expect you to share the expense with them equally, though it will far exceed the original calculation. They have already advanced a large sum.

Now can you not form a combination with Nelson & Sons whereby you can retain your interest in the Commentary and let them with their extraordinary facilities assume the illustration department altogether? They no doubt could do it much better and cheaper than it could be done in America. Or, should you in view of the increased expense to withdraw altogether, Mr. Nelson must of course assume all your and my responsibilities to the English & American authors. This is an essential condition on which I must insist. If necessary, I ^{will} go myself over to England next summer to arrange matter personally with all contributors. If it were not for these or for the late & money already spent, I would so well give up the enterprise altogether and devote the time to the completion of my Church History.

Whatever decision you may come to, it shall of course not interfere with our amicable relations in the least, and only give a new impetus to our joint large enterprise which is now rapidly drawing to a successful conclusion. With the best wishes for many happy new years by & your family

my addition to your pamphlet of on the political aspects of the
Vatican Decree. I sent copies to Dr. Vollmayer, Prof. v. Schulte,
Dr. Dorner and other friends and prominent scholars on the
Continent and received some laudable notices and acknowledgements.
I hope in a few months to send you a copy of a general history
of the Creeds of Christianity, Greek, Latin, & Protestant, of
which the chapter on the Vatican Council and Papal Infallibility forms
a part. To the Collection of Greek & Latin Creeds I shall add also the
consensus creed proposed by the Conference of Old Catholics, Orientals
and Anglo-Catholics in Bonn. I hope that this Conference will lead
to a larger, broader & more liberal movement that shall embrace
the various interests of the Church of Christ. There is a strong undercurrent
of a positive union of all true believers in spite of the sectarian divisions
and strife. May God speed the complete fulfilment of the sacerdotal prayer.

already more or less advanced in their preparations. If necessary
I shall cross the Atlantic again to settle with you and the
British contributors the best way. The work must go on
in some shape or other.

Rev Dr. Adams, President of the Faculty.

My dear Friend: I desire to begone broad you, in trust, for the benefit of the Union Theological Seminary, a prospective donation of five thousand dollars (\$5000) in the shape of a life Policy No 78,735, which the Equitable Life Insurance Society of the U.S. (No 120 Broadway, N.York) is bound to pay at my death, together with such dividends as the Society may declare, from year to year.

I also send an order authorizing the Treasurer of the Seminary to deduct from my salary as Professor the sum of two hundred and eighty five dollars and ten cents (\$285.10) every year, and to apply this sum towards the payment of the annual premium in full, due Feb. 27, till my death. In case of resignation I shall make such other provision as may be necessary to serve the benefit of the Policy & the Seminary.

It is my desire that the Board of Directors should appropriate this donation in due time towards the endowment of a Theological Tutorship: the Tutor to be selected, ^{chiefly} from those graduates who gained the Price Fellowship and completed their studies in the Universities of Europe and the Lands of the Bible, and to teach such breviaries and attend to such other duties as may be assigned to him by the Faculty. A Tutorship will make the Price Fellowship permanently useful to the Seminary, serve at a small expense the benefits of an assistant professorship, and a new teaching force every two or three years, and serve as a training school for regular Professors. The Tutor ought to live in the Seminary among the students and conduct the morning devotions in the Chapel.



Should the Board see proper to decline this proposition, the donation may be applied towards a special department in the Library containing books of reference for the convenience of the Faculty and the Students, or to any other object connected with the welfare of the Seminary.

I wish I had it in my power to erect monumental buildings in a commanding and central location worthy of the leading theological institution of America, and of the princely endowment of the professorships by our venerable friend, Mr. James Brown. But I have no doubt that his noble example will in due time be followed by others who appreciate the luxury of doing good as the Lord has prospered them.

Permit me to assure you in conclusion that your connection with our beloved Seminary as the head of the Faculty has more than realized my high expectations and has become personally a source of unmeasured pleasure and encouragement as well as a proof that the Lord is with us.

I am willing to make the transfer, provided you buy the stock on hand or wait until it is disposed of by the present publishers, Messrs. Lindsay & Blakiston. They informed us this morning that they have on hand

My dear Sir: I am glad you found a publisher for your proposed translation of Schürer's Lehrbuch des N. T.lichen Rechtsgeschichte.

After consultation with Dr. Smith, my colleague, and Messrs. Scribner, Armstrong & Co., my publishers, we have concluded to accept your translation of Schürer into our Theol. Library on the following terms:

1. The literature must be supplemented from English or American sources, the additions to be carefully distinguished from the original.
2. A special Chapter ought to be inserted on the political and religious states of the Greek and Roman world at the time of Christ, to make it a complete picture of the *orbis Romanae* as far as it came in contact with primitive Christianity.
3. Throughout the work judicious selections might be made from Schuerenberger, Hausrath, and similar works.
4. Yet the work should not exceed one volume. Two vols. would be fatal to the commercial success, & be out of proportion with the other parts of our library. Some of the Beklagen pp. 669 sqq. might be omitted.
5. It is desirable that you should put yourself in communication with Dr. Schürer to get the benefit of his latest corrections.
6. Our publishers allow for the volumes they issue $7\frac{1}{2}$ percent on the retail price to the author or translator, and $2\frac{1}{2}$ percent to the General Editor. Considering that our publishers will purchase a number of copies and that our agent in London will do the same and give the book all the advantages of the series, your publisher ought to make a similar arrangement.

My dear Prof. Gardner:

I am glad to learn that you like the specimen of the Illustrated Popular Commentary, and are willing to prospect on the plan submitted; but you wish to know first the fairer terms of the publisher.

The work is a joint enterprise of Messrs. Scribner & Co. of New York, & Messrs. Clark & Co., Edinburgh. They divide the cost and the profits. Mr. Clark settles with the English contributors, by paying them a pound a page (including title) in full; the Am. publishers pay the American contributors. The payment pro rata upon the matter they supply each volume, if the work is published in the regular way, or $3\frac{1}{2}$ per cent if it is published by subscription or through agents (in which case the discounts, freight and expense of publication are much larger, but the sales and profits also in proportion). It is probable that they will adopt the second plan. They expect to give the Commentary a wide circulation.

If these terms are satisfactory to you, you may select the first or second book of Samuel as you may prefer. Two of my English contributors, and two American co-workers on Lange desire one book of Samuel, but I have made no final arrangement yet, and may be able to satisfy all parties.

Please let me know definitely at your earliest convenience.

My dear Dr. Hollinger:

I send you the enclosed proof of the agreement of the last Bonn Conference on the Filioque controversy, intended for the second volume of my forthcoming *Bibliotheca Symbolica Ecclesiae Universalis*. The text is taken from Prof. Reuter's official Report. The English translation by Dr. Buel has not yet appeared owing to the delay of Dr. Nequin's Preface. Should there be any mistake, I would thank you for the correction.

I see Mr. Gusey in the *Times* opposes the agreement and declare his assent to the Latin doctrine of the procession; while Mr. Meyrick defends the Bonn thesis on the ground of a distinction between to issue & to proceed. This distinction is not authorized by the German text which uses ausgehen (s. Art. II.).

Permit me to remind you of your promise to prepare an article on the Roman Catholic Church for Johnson's Universal Cyclopaedia. I wish a condensed historical view of the origin & progress of the Roman Catholicism in its three phases, mediæval, Tridentine & Vatican, such as no one can give so well as you from the abounding stores of your learning. I would also like two articles on Treaty, Council of, and on Ultramontanism. All three might frontispiece printed Quarto pages; but condensation is very desirable, ^{& necessary.} I shall send you ten dollars per page. The article ought to be ready in March, at least the first; the other two will be in time in April.

My dear Mr. Blaikie.

We held another meeting this afternoon in consequence of your letter of Jan. 18, and very influential requests of Presbyt. clergymen in New York & Philadelphia, & discussed the question of postponing the next Presbyterian Council for another year. It was resolved (with but one dissenting voice) that such postponement is expedient and desirable if it at all can be done without causing too much inconvenience to your Committee. You will be informed by telegram at once of this action.

I was always of the opinion as you know, but had no idea how general it is, that, and consequently I voted with the majority at the preceding meeting, determined to take the best of an impromptu appointment which it seemed at the time could not be avoided. Our Allianc Conférence was twice postponed - first to 1870, then to 1873.

I am sure you will have a better meeting in 1877. You can make your preparations still more comprehensive and secure a larger representation from the country and from the Continent. Suppose you go yourself, or send such a man as Dr. Canisius to Holland, Germany, France & Switzerland next summer to engage prominent Reformed divines and ministers. Personal application goes much farther than mere correspondence. Indeed it is necessary, however, if I may judge from our experience in the General Conference of the Alliance. You must have representation from established as well as free Churches, and tell the former in their individual capacity, for they cannot represent their government officially.

I can hardly promise to attend the meeting so far abroad; but having been appointed, I shall endeavor to do, and prepare a paper on the Consensus of Reformed Opinion. I hope you will engage Prof. Miller & Prof. Kraft for the same object. With my best regards to your family, Yours truly, Philip Schaff

Dear Brother:

I am glad that after a vacation delay of a whole year for which neither you nor I are responsible, the work on Popular Commentary has been resumed. I received from the printer Chas. D. W. of Matteson, and return you the proof with my corrections and queries, leaving you to put it in final shape. The Octave should be inserted by all means in the morning readings. I think the comments are as good now as we can make them. I have no fear of the success of the work, if the publisher will do his part. If I had my way I would push it in every direction and have the title set up as it comes in. Several contributors are quite or nearly done with their part and are ready waiting for to carry it through the press.

What has become of the balance of Introduction? It ought to have been set up first. The future must be changed.

I shall forward my corrections to you always, and expect a set of plate proofs for comparison from the printer. Next week I shall be absent for a few days, but this will cause no delay. I thank you for the transmission of proofs of Popular Commen-
tary, pp. 41-46. I have read them carefully and sent them with corrections and
suggestion to Dr Riddle who will put them into final shape and read the revised.
This will verify the work. Be so kind as to furnish me with a set of founders' proofs
as I shall need them for reference. I have revised the MS. so often that I do not
expect to make many changes, and I know that you do your part admirably. The
pages look very well indeed. The title & name of the sections should be part of the running
title. The introductory section on Mark, Luke, & John should have been set
up first (after p. 22), and the folios must be changed accordingly. I suppose Dr.
Riddle has directed your attention to some errors in the specimen, e.g. p. 26 Jeremiah
for Acknowledgments (third list of names).

I am very glad that after a vexatious and discouraging delay of a whole year,

The Ms. on John will be in time by May 1877. It will take all winter & finish the first three Gospels.

Mr. Clark is at liberty to publish the first volume in 2 parts and thus to give you more time. The American publisher will wait till John & Acts are stereotyped, which I trust will be done in Edinburgh & London under your own eye. It will be less trouble to come & transmit duplicates of the illustrations to Edinburgh than to transmit Ms. & proofs to and from N. York.

As to the size, I am shut up to the original programme, viz. 2 vols. of the New Testament. This makes it necessary to put the Gospels & Acts in one volume, and for this no more than 600 pages

can be allowed; or the commercial reputation of the Publishers will be defeated.

I trust therefore that you will be able to condense your Commentary on John within 150 or 200 pages. I cannot allow more for Matthew or Luke or Acts, and much less for Mark. Of course, literary work cannot be measured by the yard stick. The genius of saying multum in parvo is quite beyond, and a Beagle with his pregnant brevity can only live in a century. I do not want a dry skeleton of a Commentary, but living flesh & blood. I must leave you to your own best judgment & tact, only urging you to keep as far as possible within the limits mentioned.

I had complete my Introduction to the Four Gospels by 10 pages on John, of which I enclose proof. You will see from p. 28 that I hope for a fuller introduction from you or Mr. Moultan.
