

Born in Texas, reared in West Virginia, graduate of Hampden-Sydney and Union Theological Seminary in Virginia; served in First World War; pastor in Texas; professor in Union Seminary since 1922; distinguished lecturer, teacher and author; president of THE PRESBYTERIAN OUTLOOK's Board of Directors and writer of the weekly Sunday school lesson.

Because it is evident that many Southern Presbyterians are deeply concerned for their church, longing and praying that it may soon reach a day of grand achievement, THE PRESBYTERIAN OUTLOOK sets itself to press toward, to prepare for, to promote and to herald that better day.
